RURAL ROUTE AND ROADS WANTED

(Special Correspondence.)

Stanfield, Ore., June 28.—The regular monthly meeting of the Stanfield Commercial Club was held Tuesday evening and several matters of importance were considered. One of the principal items brought before the meeting was the question of a rural mail route, which is greatly desired by the residents of country west and northwest of this city and a petition is being circulated with a view to asking that a route be established, the delivery to start from here.

Another matter of special importance was that with reference to roads leading into Stanfield from the east and southeast. Special committees have these matters in hand and it appears likely that several new roads

will be constructed leading into this place, which will make it much more convenient for those to trade here who wish to do so.

To Banquet Hill.

Berlin, June 28.—David Jayne Hill, the retiring ambassador of the United States to Germany will be the guest of honor at a great banquet to be given here tonight under the auspices of the American Association of Commerce and Trade. The most prominent men in the diplomatic and business circles of Berlin will be present and former Minister of Colonies Reinberg will make the chief speech.

It is said that Ambassador Hill, who is preparing to leave Berlin on July 1 has declared that his leaving is not entirely voluntary, but that the state department forced him out. In spite of assertions to the contrary from Washington, it is believed, in the light of the still unsettled potach controversy, that the failure to reach an agreement on this subject has had a great deal to do with the retirement of Dr. Hill.

Congress of Pastors.

San Francisco, June 28.—"The Pastor of the Sunday school" was the general theme of today's congress of ministers, the closing feature of the International Sunday School convention. Among the topics on the program were: "Pastoral Leadership of Sunday School Forces," "The Relation of the Pastor to the Sunday School from a Layman's Point of View," "The Pastor's Privilege in the Sunday School," and "The Pastor's Opportunity in the Sunday School." The delegations to the convention began scattering today, but many of the visitors will visit various points of interest in California before returning east.

BANK EXAMINERS OF 4 STATES MEET

NATIONAL AND STATE OFFICERS WILL ATTEND

Comptroller of the Currency Plans Sessions for Discussion of Country's Financial Affairs.

Spokane, Wash., June 28.—National bank examiners of the tenth district, taking in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana, and the bank examiners of the four states and their deputies will meet in Spokane on July 5. Frank H. Luce, chairman of the district, will preside.

Besides National Examiners Luce, Loveland, McLean and Yeager, the following superintendents and examiners of state banks are expected to attend the meeting: J. L. Mohundro, state examiner of Washington; Will Wright, state bank examiner of Oregon; V. W. Platt, bank commissioner of Idaho; C. E. Kumpke, state examiner of Montana; F. E. Barbour, deputy state examiner, Spokane; A. V. Hayden, deputy state examiner, Tacoma; and William C. Pierce, assistant bank commissioner, Boise, Idaho.

The meeting is one of the 11 in session throughout the United States about the same time when the bank examiners will discuss financial questions. It will also be the first time in the history of the office of the comptroller of the currency that the state and clearing house examiners have been invited to meet with the national examiners.

The annual meetings are part of a plan conceived by Comptroller of the Currency Murray shortly after he took office. He divided the several states into 11 districts for closer cooperation between the several bank examiners. One of the examiners of each district was made chairman. The reports from each district will be sent to the comptroller.

U. S. CONSUL ASSAULTS SWEETHEART BEFORE CLERGY

Pensacola, Fla., June 28.—Leonard J. Boutwell, who says he is the son of ex-Senator Boutwell, and is himself consul to a part of Switzerland, beat the young woman he was to marry when they met for the ceremony at the house of Archdeacon Allen of the Episcopal diocese of Pensacola. He then attempted suicide. Today Boutwell is in jail, refusing to explain. The young woman's name is kept secret.

Today he got the marriage license and the two met at the archdeacon's home, the assault followed. Leaving the girl bruised, Boutwell hurried to his room, and locking the door turned on the gas. The door was broken and he was revived and taken to the police station. The young woman is at Archdeacon Allen's home, confined to her bed by her injuries.

Kentucky Educators.

Owensboro, Ky., June 28.—Seven hundred teachers were present today at the opening of the Kentucky Educational association's annual meeting. A wide variety of topics, embracing all phases of educational work in common and high school and colleges, will be taken up at the various general sessions and round table conferences.

Physical education for both boys and girls will be discussed by experts this afternoon. Exercise as a restorative of brain tissue will be considered by Dr. James Sprague, of Lexington, while Leut. James Lindgren of Louisville, will discuss the medical principles of Swedish gymnastics.

Naval Station Soon Ready.

Chicago.—The United States new \$4,000,000 naval training station located in North Chicago, finer in many respects than any other three in the country, will begin on July 3 to take rough edges off young men recruited in middle west for the American fleet. It is because the government needs several thousand men to man the Utah, Florida and other battleships nearing completion that the work of opening the station was hurried. The station will accommodate 1250 embryo tars who will be kept drilling four months before being sent for duty at sea.

TEACHING BOYS TO GROW GARDENS

CONTEST BEING CONDUCTED BY AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE

Lectures by Professor Bouquet and Song to Youngsters Interested in Bulletin Forna.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., June 28.—One phase of extension work now being carried on by the Oregon Agricultural College terminated in the close of the contest of 125 boy gardeners of the city of Portland by an exhibition of vegetable products grown by themselves for prizes given by various generous merchants.

While the contest has been directed under the control of the Young Men's Christian association of Portland, with G. C. Holt in charge, the work has been carried out under the auspices and guidance of the horticulture department of the Oregon Agricultural college. This is the first time that the extension work has reached boy gardeners, and the results of the contest have been gratifying.

The object of this departure in extension work has been to stimulate interest among city boys in agricultural practice, to give them a working knowledge of the growing of vegetables in approved ways, as well as to beautify the city and add to its prosperity by cleaning up and utilizing the "back yards." In addition some phases of the instructional work of the college have been shown by the work.

Arthur G. B. Bouquet, instructor in vegetable gardening at the college, gave the lectures to the boy gardeners, and is the author of the bulletins issued to them, of which copies can be secured by persons desiring such information, by application to the division of horticulture at the college. The subjects covered include hot bed and cold frame construction and management; growing vegetable seedlings under glass; seeds and seedling; soil preparation and fertilization; the transplanting of celery, tomatoes, etc.; garden cultivation and irrigation; phases of tomato growing; methods of growing, bleaching and marketing celery; and the preparation of vegetables for market and for exhibition.

WOMAN WHITE SLAVE DEALER GOES TO JAIL

Portland, June 28.—Mrs. Iva Bennett, the first woman convicted in the United States courts on the Pacific coast for violation of the white slave traffic law, was sentenced to serve five months in jail by Judge Bean this morning.

The woman was found guilty by a jury of assisting in sending Emma Lane, a 15-year-old girl, to a town in Washington, where she entered a house of ill-fame. She attempted to prove an alibi, and denied that she knew the girl, who testified against her.

Sell Masterson, convicted on the charge of selling liquor to Indians at Madras, from the Warm Springs reservation, was sentenced to six months in jail and to pay a fine of \$100.

Tipton Family All in Jail.

Dayton, Wash., June 28.—Sheriff Ed Davis has arrived with Joe Tipton, his son John Tipton, aged 23, his daughter, Mrs. Elizabeth Reynolds, aged 27, and Isaac Johnson, aged 23, all of whom were arrested at Coyote, Ore., charged with having stolen a band of horses belonging to C. N. Pentecost, who lives near Starbuck. The Tipton family has a reputation for horse and cattle rustling, one daughter, Myrtle, having died three years ago after serving a four years term for stealing horses.
