CROPS IN GILLIAM ABOVE AVERAGE

London, Ore., June 29.—Gilliam county has received its second rain storm within the past week. In the first rain 47 of an inch of water fell and in the rain received Monday night and yesterday morning .78 of an inch fell. This rainfall at this time has saved such crops of this county as were planted late in the spring. Fall grain is looking excellent and after the rain in the latter part of last week early spring wheat advanced to a stage where it looks as fine as the fall wheat.

Farmers and merchants who carried long faces for a week prior to the rains of last week and yesterday are today predicting more than an average crop. At any rate it is stated by conservative individuals that the yield will exceed last year's when Condon alone received 150,000 bushels of wheat.

CHIEF LIMITS REPORTERS.
 Tacoma Police Try to Suppress News of Crime by Freak Order.

Tacoma, Wash.—Another new "freak" regulation developed today when Chief of Police Fraser issued an order that newspaper reporters would not be allowed in police headquarters more than two minutes at a time. The information concerning crimes, accidents or arrests is to be gleaned from the arrest blotter.

Effort has been made recently to suppress all information concerning burglaries, holdups and robberies, numbers of which are said to have occurred in the city recently. Further strength was given to the order by an implied threat that the police reporters would find themselves in the street if they spent any more time at police headquarters.

PURSUES SLAYER OF BROTHER
 California Man Urges Authorities to Spare no Expense.

Vancouver, Wash.—A telegram was received from T. W. Barhydt of Pasadena, Cal., today urging the authorities to spare no expense in their efforts to apprehend the slayer of his brother, Edward Barhydt, whose body was found Sunday on Halls mountain.

Barhydt is said to be wealthy and to have been formerly president of the Burlington and Northwestern railroad company at Burlington, Iowa.

No clue to the whereabouts of Charles W. Hammond, the dead man's hired man, has been found.

PIONEER OREGON ATTORNEY SLAIN

FUED OF TWO YEARS STANDING, RESULTS FATALEY

Wealthy Widow's Favor, Said to Have Been Sought by Aged Slayer and Victim

Faker, Ore., June 29.—George Barnes, a prominent pioneer attorney of Oregon, who was the first attorney to locate in Prineville, Crook county, in the early days, was shot and killed at Canyon City by George Anderson, a resident of Canyon City, who is now in jail charged with murder.

The events that led up to the killing of Barnes cover a period of nearly two years, during which time Barnes has been a resident at Canyon. The ill-feeling had its origin in a suit brought by the latter against the estate of Alex. Bowman, for the hand of whose widow, it is said, both Barnes and Anderson were aspirants. Anderson had been awarded a judgment for \$2000, and Barnes, after his marriage to Mrs. Bowman, took up the fight and succeeded in having the judgment in Anderson's favor revoked.

Anderson met Barnes face to face and pulling an automatic gun from his pocket, sent three bullets into his rival, who fell to the ground mortally wounded and died in a few minutes.

The dead man is 70 years of age, and has for years been a well-known character in legal circles in eastern Oregon. He has always practiced at Prineville until his removal to Canyon City two years ago. He has relatives in Prineville and Portland, and is a member of The Dalles lodge, No. 305, B. P. O. E.

GOSSIP OF GOTHAM.

New York, June 29.—"Mrs. Robert Ingersoll, daughter-in-law of the late Col. Robert G. Ingersoll," was recently arrested, according to the New York papers, on a charge of having failed to provide the required tag for her automobile. The matter was satisfactorily explained and the young woman released. The most interesting portion of the story was omitted, however, as the newspapers failed to explain how a woman could be the daughter-in-law of a man who had no son.

Over in Bloomfield, N. J., Rudyard Kipling is serving a sentence of 30 days in the local jail, having been convicted of drunkenness. The announcement of the accused man's name produced something of a sensation in court.

"Rudyard Kipling is my name, and I'm not unknown to fame," hiccupped the prisoner when arraigned.

"Yes, another stole my name but I'm Kipling just the same," continued the accused in response to a question from the magistrate.

"My home is on the ocean blue, and sailor's work I often do," the culprit rambled on. "I will not try to give you bunk. I know your honor, I am drunk. I've often tried to mend my ways, but I s'pose you'll give me thirty days."

"You're not much of a poet," commented the magistrate, "but as a prophet you are all right. Thirty days."

"Is Jesus God?" is a question which the courts of New York may pass upon. Under the terms of the Foley bill, just signed by Gov. Dix and which will become a law on September 1, the presentation of any theatrical performance in which the Deity is represented by a living character is absolutely prohibited. Within the last few years various imported plays in which Jesus appears have been produced in New York, and it is understood that arrangements have been made for the production of others next season. It is likely that such dramas will be abandoned, however, rather than force the matter to an issue in the courts. Under the terms of the act it becomes impossible even to produce "Parafal" or "Everyman," the old English morality play in which the Deity is one of the characters.

Nearly 2700 new voters will be manufactured in New York next month. That number of aliens are waiting to be naturalized and unless they receive their final papers by August 8, they cannot cast ballots in the coming election. To prevent such a catastrophe, several supreme court justices have volunteered to sit through July and feed the hoppers of the citizenship mill.

It is his intention to use them in the propagation of the species in his native land, where the frogs are all small and not edible.
