RAILROAD NOTES. The formal merger of the Maine Central and its leased lines takes effect July 1.

The Indiana railroad commission has issued an order to all the steam roads of the state calling for information concerning the installation of block signals.

The Business Men's League of Montgomery, Ala., has started a movement to inaugurate an independent steamship line between New York and Mobile. Its object is the betterment of freight rates in Alabama, Mississippi and Georgia.

A "personal contact" campaign has been started by the Illinois Central management, the object of which is to have as many of its leading officials as possible meet patrons and business men generally in cities and towns through which its lines pass.

President Markham believes this plan will enable the high officials of the road to find out first hand how much the road is liked and where it can be improved.

The railroads of Ohio, according to a ruling just handed down by the commission of that state, must in future, accept freight for transportation from one point to another within a city. This reverses the practices observed by the railways for years. They have refused to make a rate for such service on the ground that it would have the effect of throwing open their public steam tracks and terminals to other roads.

To maintain its standard the Texas Midland Railroad, of which Edward H. B. Green, son of Mrs. Hetty Green is head, will expend large sums and keep its shops at Terrell in full operation during the summer. The rolling stock will be renovated and preparations made for the heavy movement of cotton and other traffic this fall. The roadway, buildings, equipment and general service of the Midland are considered superior to anything usually found on a short, independent road.

On Saturday next the Chicago, Indiana and Southern Railway will run its first train into Evansville, Ind. Chicago will be the northern terminal and Evansville the southern. Traffic agreements by which passenger trains of the Chicago, Indiana and Southern will run to New Orleans and Pensacola over the Louisville and Nashville, giving the New York Central lines a Southern outlet and the choice of two Gulf ports are being planned.

CHANGES PLANNED FOR FAIR PAVILION

In order to accommodate the large crowds which are expected to be in Pendleton during fair week this fall, the Third Eastern Oregon District Agricultural society is planning extensive changes in its pavilion. These changes include improvements in the entrance, in the platform, booths and seating accommodations.

Instead of the two little gateways for entrance and exit, there will be one large royal arch at the corner of the pavilion, on each side of which will be the ticket windows. This arrangement will not only greatly improve the exterior appearance but will do much towards facilitating the handling of the crowds.

The large music shell will be moved back against the wall and a platform extended out from it for speakers and vaudeville performers. The Umatilla county booth which has heretofore occupied a central position in the rear of the pavilion will be moved to one side, thus increasing the seating and standing room for the visitors. Additional seats will be constructed and everything done for the comfort of the many who will be present during the afternoons and evenings.
