

HOGS SCARCE AND REACH TOP PRICES

PORTLAND CATTLE MARKET SITUATION IS SEADY

Supply of Sheep Greater Than Demand, With Much Stuff Being Carried Over—Wheat Crop Short.

(From Thursday's Journal.) Only one load of hogs came forward to the North Portland market today and the best sale was at \$7.15, the former top. Notwithstanding the fact that hogs are costing much more money to land at Portland from the east than the local market has been offering, killers are still holding to previous quotations and all attempts to boost the price a dime have failed. One of the lots sold at \$7.15 this morning, averaged 181 pounds, and was composed of toppers. Outside of the nominal local show-

ing there was a record breaking run of swine from Nebraska. In all a total of 12 cars came forward from the Missouri river territory for local packers.

At South Omaha today there was an advance of 5¢ to 10¢ in the swine trade with tops at \$6.30. This means that it costs packers \$7.40 to land western supplies at their packing plants.

At Chicago the hog trade was steady today with no change in prices.

Cattle Market Steady. There was quite a fair run of cattle in the North Portland yards during the past 24 hours. Receipts showed a total of 235 head compared with 372 last Thursday.

Sales of California steers were made around \$6@6.95, but as they were not of top quality, the market may safely be considered unchanged for best at

the quarter mark.

Cows sold this morning as high as \$5.15, while calves sold up to \$7.25 for light stuff of quality.

At South Omaha there was a stronger tone in the cattle trade, with prices generally 10¢ higher, with steers at \$6@6.25 and cows and heifers \$4.50@5.65.

There was again a very good amount of stuff offering in the sheep and lamb trade at North Portland. Although offerings did not reach the totals of the past few days, the supply was more than equal to the demand. Total receipts in the sheep and lamb pens were 372 head compared with 2713 last Thursday.

Quite a lot of stuff has been carried over in the days during the past few days. While poor quality has contributed mostly to this condition, killers are full of sheep and lambs and therefore would favor a restricted movement at this time.

While top stuff is still selling at previous prices, poor quality does not meet with favor even at the decline. Best lambs sold this morning at 5.35 and \$5.50 or an advance of 15¢ over previous quotations.

At South Omaha there was a firm tone in the sheep and lamb trade with yearlings \$4@5, lambs \$5.50@7, wethers \$3.50@4.10 and ewes \$3@4.

At Chicago the sheep and lamb trade was firm today with no change in prices.

Wheat Crop Short.

Chicago, June 30.—Secretary Smiley of the Kansas Grain Dealers' association, reported that the prospects were for a crop of but 55,000,000 bushels of wheat in that state this season. This compares with a crop of 61,060,000 in 1910 and 85,478,000 bushels in 1909.

Such a reduction in the wheat crop outlook had been unexpected by sellers, and after a lower opening the market advanced and closed at a slight advance over yesterday.

There were general rains in the central west and this caused the disposition to sell at the opening. Foreign markets were quiet.

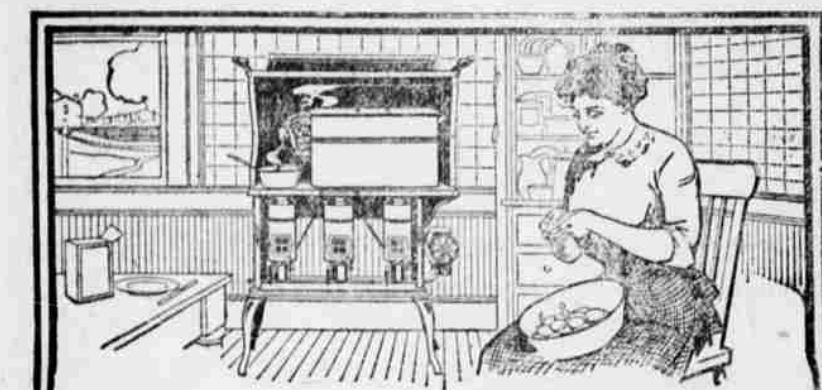
