Work on Bridge Progressing.
Work on constructing the piers of the new main street bridge is progressing rapidly, workmen being set to digging on the preliminary work on the south pier this morning.

Land Sells at \$10 an Acre.
One hundred and sixty acres of land in the Coombs Canyon district about twenty miles southwest of this city has just sold for ten dollars an acre, Mary Cargill and husband, W. H. Cargill, selling to J. W. Fix.

He will not be tried until after the Fourth as Deputy District Attorney Pruitt will be absent from the city.

Druggist Buys Irrigated Land.
J. V. Tallman, the local druggist, has invested in land in the west end of the county, having paid \$100 an acre for a ten acre tract northeast of Stanfield. The land was purchased from the Inland Irrigation company and the deed was recorded this morning.

Round-up Folders Are Out.

The folders contain a brief story of the show and a sketch of every event so that a perusal will inform a total stranger of the nature of Pendleton's pride in a very short time. The folder is illustrated with cuts of various frontier "stunts" and on the back is a bird's eye view of Round-up Park. These folders were prepared by the association and are in addition to those which will be distributed by the O. W. R. & N. company.

Fair Paper Arrives.
Secretary Thomas Fitz Gerald of the Third Eastern Oregon District Agricultural society yesterday received a shipment of 300 pounds of advertising matter for the annual Umatilla-Morrow county fair. The shipment includes three sheet and one sheet posters of beautiful design, window cards, fair heralds and postal cards. The posters will be put up at once and the heralds are already being mailed out to the farmers over the two counties. The stuff is calculated to arouse interest and enthusiasm and should succeed in its purpose.

Al Richardson in Court Again.
An echo of the recent trouble among local colored people was had in police court this morning when Al Richardson, the bootblack at the St. George hotel, was charged with using obscene language on the street by Joe Watson. Judge Fitz Gerald suspended sentence on good behavior but warned the offender on repetition a jail sentence would go along with the customary fine. It seems that Al has been nursing his hatred in silence for so long that he could

not refrain from hurling a few choice epithets at his enemy when the latter came along the street yesterday.

From Lewiston by Auto.
R. Clyde Beach, who was a partner to C. E. Roosevelt in this city a number of years ago, arrived in this city today from Lewiston, having driven the distance in his 1911 model, six cylinder Franklin. He was accompanied by his wife and they will leave this evening for La Grande, after which they will return to Twin Falls, where they will quit their car and entrain for New York.

Carl Power Returns.
Carl Power, junior member of the firm of Power & Co., returned last evening from Portland, where he had been after making an overland horse-back ride from this city to The Dalles scattering Round-up dust along the way. He says everywhere along his trip he found an intense interest in the local wild west show and declares Pendleton will have a problem in caring for the great crowd which will be here.

Boosting for San Diego.
Captain R. M. Creswell, of San Diego, is now here, accompanied by his wife and they are visiting as the guests of the captain's cousin, J. A. Creswell. Captain Creswell is a native of Portland but is now in the steamboat business at San Diego, owning a line of seven steamers and ferryboats. On their present trip they traveled by auto to Portland and they have a specially made auto in which they sleep. Captain Creswell has a commission as special commissioner for the big exposition to be held at San Diego in 1915 and he is using his spare time boosting that exposition. From here Captain and Mrs. Creswell will go to Walla Walla thence to Spokane and Seattle and then back to California by auto.

FOREST FIRES RAGING.

Large Area Burned Over During Past Few Days.

Bend, Ore.—Forest fires are reported within a radius of 30 or 40 miles of Bend during the past week, and thousands of acres have been swept by fire, both in the National forest and private holdings. The government timber seems to have suffered the most, especially a few miles southeast of Pine Mountain. In the Pine Mountain section over 1000 acres have been burned over.

Assistant Forest Supervisor H. E. Deutch and Supervisor Ral Harvey of Bend, went out to the burning district south of Bend and succeeded in extinguishing the fires there.

There are fires reported in the vicinity of La Pine and Spring river. It is thought these were set by campers, but the most of the fires, it is believed, were set by the lightning. There has been a party of nine men sent out by private parties to protect their own holdings 16 miles south of Bend.

To Disburse \$230,000,000.

New York.—Disbursements of interest and dividend payments for the quarter ending Friday was commenced today by various railroad and industrial corporations. It is estimated that the total will amount to about \$230,000,000. New York brokers are anticipating a boom in standard stocks, as it is likely that a large proportion of the disbursements will be reinvested.
