CHINESE BATTLESHIP WILL PAY UNCLE SAM A VISIT

Washington.—For the first time in more than 30 years and the second time in the history of this country, a Chinese warship will visit an American port this summer. The Hai Chi, the largest vessel of the Chinese navy, will arrive in New York from England, where she has been a participant in the international naval review in connection with the coronation.

The Hai Chi is a cruiser of 4300 tons displacement, and has a speed of 24 knots. She is the chief ship of the new navy which China is building. The United States has obtained a share in the construction of the new Chinese navy, and an American firm is now building a gunboat for that nation. Other orders for warships are expected in the next few years.

PAWNEE INDIAN CONVICT AN ARTIST

PRODUCES WONDERFUL WORK WHILE CONFINED

Refuses to Reveal Secret of Wonderful Tribe Colors, Which He Effects on Bare Carvings.

Tokeka, Kan., July 3.—In corroboration of the theory that savages and ancients had secrets in art which civilized man cannot discover, Charles Morrison, a Pawnee Indian, has carved a miniature guitar out of a piece of slate gouged from the coal mine where he works in Lansing.

Morrison was sent from Emporia to the Penitentiary in February, 1906, for grand larceny and assault with intent to kill. He had always been queer, seclusive and always busy. It was discovered after he left for Lansing that he was an artist, for several works of art were discovered about his home.

Expert in Carving.

In Lansing he spends his spare time working on trinkets and trying colors. The guitar, which is his latest piece of art, is a paper weight. It is very brightly polished, which is said to be difficult with slate. The carving on the instrument is in weird shapes, scroll work, daisies, crosses, crowns and doves; emblematic of the transition from the Indian superstition to the Christian religion.

The colors were blue, gray, a delicate yellow, green and gold, all on a body of jet black. What the pigments are Morrison alone knows. They are very beautiful and cannot be rubbed dim by anything tried on them. Accompanying the paper weight was a small note from Morrison to Robert Heinzelman. Mr. Heinzelman is the governor's pardon clerk.

CONVICTS MADE SPURIOUS MONEY

SUSPECTS IDENTIFIED WITH NOTORIOUS GANG

Counterfeiting Plant Is Operated by Inmates of Tennessee Penitentiary Without Knowledge of Authorities.

Nashville, Tenn., July 3.—Evidence that there is a gang of counterfeiters—convicts—operating within the very walls of the state prison was offered this morning at a hearing before United States Commissioner Luck in a counterfeiting case. The defendants were Wash and Thomas Burton and James Wilkerson, the latter now residing in Nashville and the other two near Carthage.

Authorities Baffled.

Foster Bradford is the convict who has been identified as a member of the gang operating a spurious mint inside the prison walls. Just how many is in the gang is not known, as Bradford will not talk.

In the last few months many complaints of counterfeit money being in circulation have been received, the usual form being dollars and nickels. The officers have been somewhat perplexed as to the source of this spurious money, but with the evidence that the false coin has been manufactured inside the walls of the state prison the mystery is somewhat cleared up.

Arrests Made.

Wash and Thomas Burton, brothers, living near Carthage, and George alias James Wilkerson, of Carthage, but more recently of Nashville, were arrested by Deputy United States Marshal T. G. Brown Tuesday near Dixon Springs on a charge of having in their possession and passing counterfeit coins. At the preliminary hearing before the United States commissioner today Wilkerson pleaded not guilty. Wash Burton, who is Wilkerson's son-in-law, and Thomas Burton were the principal witnesses against Wilkerson.

NEWS GATHERER SUICIDES.

End Two Days Spree by Shooting Self Before Mother.

Medford, Ore.—Crazed by excessive use of raw alcohol, to which he has been addicted the last year, Thomas Ragshaw, printer and newspaper reporter, committed suicide at Jacksonville late yesterday afternoon. Ragshaw took his life with a revolver—the property of his father, D. W. Ragshaw, editor of the Jacksonville Post, in which office the son was employed.

Ragshaw was out dissipating Saturday night and his family had seen little of him until he came home Monday afternoon, when he went directly to his room after answering his mother's query regarding mail. She noted his strange attitude and followed him, only to be rebuffed by a locked door. She called a neighbor, but before the latter's arrival the shot was heard. Breaking down the door Lytle and the mother found the dying youth on the floor, a bullet wound in his breast and his clothes on fire from powder burns.

This is the first suicide in Jacksonville in 25 years. It has stirred the sleepy place as she has not been aroused in years, since the days of activity in the Sterling placers, when Jacksonville was the chief town of the Rogue River Valley.
