DUNHAM MYSTERY IS SOLVED AGAIN

Note Signed With the Name of Arch Murderer Reveals Human Bones in Cave.

San Jose.—The Dunham murder mystery has been solved again. James Johnson and Joseph Schmidt brought word to Sheriff Langford that they had found the resting place of the bones of James Dunham, the arch murderer who annihilated the McClintock family in 1888.

For years police officers in many parts of the country have tried to solve the mystery of Dunham's disappearance. He has even appeared in person or his bones have been found at least thirty times.

Johnson and Schmidt, who were hunting in the vicinity of Pine Ridge on the southern slopes of Mount Hamilton, stumbled upon a dusty bottle last Sunday. Inside they found this note.

"This is to certify that I am Jim Dunham, the murderer of Santa Clara county. You will find my bones across the gulch in a cave, due north. I gave you a good run, sheriff. Good bye to my darling boy, Jim Dunham. You surely are a poor sheriff. I could have shot you a number of times. You owe your life to me."

The men told attaches of the sheriff's office that they visited the cave and found a handful of bones. They did not, however, exhibit the relics to the deputy sheriffs. The handwriting on the note, which is faded with age, is not unlike that of Dunham, specimens of which are in Langford's possession.

Members of the sheriff's office are disposed to treat the discovery lightly, as they found several discrepancies in dates which figure in the mystery. One of the deputies said that Jim Dunham would be the last man to speak of "his bones."

WIFE SMOKED HIS CIGARS.

She Also Used Pistol to Get His Money, Says Husband.

St. Louis, Mo.—That his wife smoked his cigars without his permission and gave the "snipes" to his 18-year-old son to finish is the burden of Harry G. Schuermann's testimony in his suit for divorce in Judge Wurdeman's court at Clayton, Mo. Schuermann further declared his wife, to whom he has been married nineteen years, contracted the habit of chewing coffee.

The testimony throughout was characterized by such an outburst of slang that the judge frequently was called upon to demand a clearer interpretation. The husband also testified he gave his wife a check for \$500 at the point of a pistol. The check represented their savings.

He also charged she took a picture of his mother from the wall and buried it in the back yard.

BADGER FARMER LOSES BRIDE.

Held by Immigration Authorities, So He Hunts Another.

Baltimore, Md.—Gustav Cudnochowski, a wealthy farmer of Coleman, Wis., went to Germany last April to find a wife. He soon found the girl of his choice in Louise Krodzik, and two weeks ago they sailed for Baltimore, where they were to be married. Several days ago they arrived here in the North German Lloyd steamship Maine. The man was allowed to land, but Louise was found to have trachoma, a disease of the eyes, and she was ordered deported.

Cudnochowski refused to land without her, so he and the girl sailed back to Germany yesterday on the Maine, where he will look further for a wife.

SKELETON FOUND IN PUEBLO HOUSE

Bones, Denuded by Quicklime, Thought to Indicate Atrocious Murder.

Pueblo, Colo.—What is believed to have been an atrocious murder was revealed by the finding of a complete skeleton of a man in a closet in a cheap lodging house here today. The bones were wrapped in a newspaper dated January 1, 1911, and showed signs that the flesh was destroyed by quicklime. The police believe they were brought here after the crime was committed elsewhere.

JULIA MARLOWE OVERCOME.

Famous Actress, Affected by Heat, Abandons New York Engagement.

New York.—Made ill by the intense heat which affected her seriously after the play, "Macbeth," at the Broadway theater, Miss Julia Marlowe was ordered by her physician to refrain from further work. The engagement of the company, owing to Miss Marlowe's illness, has been canceled. Miss Marlowe's condition is not dangerous, but it is very probable that she will not be permitted to reappear again before the fall.

SPLASHES WATER; KILLED.

Swimmer Fatally Shot by Man He Playfully Taunted.

Idabel (Okla.)—The penalty William Sappington paid for splashing water on Walter Phillips while they were swimming near here today, was his life. After he had been splashed Phillips obtained a revolver from his clothes on the bank and shot Sappington while the latter was still in the water.

HOT WATER KILLS RATTLESNAKE.

Montana Rancher Uses Tea Kettle on Snake in His Home.

Bozeman, Mont.—The family of Mr. and Mrs. Grover Watson, near Bozeman, had an exciting experience with a rattlesnake ornamented with a dozen rattles yesterday morning and today. The little Watson boy encountered the snake in the grass a few yards from the house and angered the rattler by punching it with a stick. The snake struck at the boy and the frightened youngster ran screaming to the house with the reptile following.

The snake coiled on the door sill and refused to budge. All the doors and windows were closed and through a narrow opening of the door Mrs. Watson, with a poker tried to drive the rattler away, but the snake showed fight.

An hour later Mr. Watson came in from the field, climbed through a back window and taking a kettle of boiling water cautiously opened the door wide enough to admit the spout. He then poured the contents on the reptile, killing it.

ADMIRER OF BASEBALL DESCRIBES LARGE FAMILY

Pittsburg, Pa.—August Clondeaux,

42 years old, an expert glass worker of Ford City, near here, left for New York today enroute to Belgium, his native land, accompanied by his wife and twenty-four children. Incidentally he also takes with him a comfortable fortune made in the glass industry in the Allegheny valley.

Clondeaux and his wife came to this country twenty-one years ago, a short time after their marriage. The family was happy to day. Clondeaux was especially joyous. He is a great admirer of baseball and described his family and departure as follows.

"The score is 24 to 0." (He meant none of the children had died. "It was a great game, too. Thirteen singles, four two-baggers and a triple. Now we make a home run."

BUBONIC PLAGUE IN CHINA.

Sixty-Eight Deaths in Two Weeks Reported at Amoy.

Amoy.—Sixty-eight deaths from bubonic plague and three from smallpox were reported here during the two weeks ended yesterday. One death from cholera occurred at Kulang-Su island, the international settlement about one-third of a mile from this city. No other cases of cholera have been reported.

SAN FRANCISCO WILL AGAIN BE WIDE OPEN

San Francisco, July 6.—A big shake up occurred in the police department here today. Two score of high officers were transferred by Chief of Police White.

The move is generally accepted as meaning that San Francisco is to be a wide open town again.

ARCHERS HUNT BEARS WITH BOW AND ARROW

Atchison, Kan.—James M. Callies and E. Z. Jackson, attorneys and amateur archers of this city, left today for British Columbia, where they will hunt bears with bows and arrows. At Victoria, B. C., they will be joined by Will H. Thompson, a Seattle attorney, and Harry Richardson of Boston, champion archer of the United States.

BURNED AT STAKE BY MEXICANS

British Government Hears of Tortures Suffered by Canadian.

Shawnee, Okla.—Robert Swayze, a Canadian, was burned at the stake by Mexican bandits near Fort Munner, N. M., June 15, according to a letter received here today from Mrs. Emma Bingham, formerly of this city, and mother-in-law of the dead man. He was killed because he refused to reveal the hiding place of a large amount of money that had been left in his care by a Mexican railroad which employed him, the letter says. Mrs. Bingham has notified the British government of the case.

FIGHT BEFORE CAMERAS.

Paris Editors Cross Swords in Duel While Their Staffs Look on.

Paris.—The tolerance between the "Matin" and the "Journal" over the international aeroplane race arranged by the latter, resulted in a dramatic sword duel between M. Charlet, managing editor of the Journal, and M. Jouvenel, editor-in-chief of the Matin today. Each received a wound in the arm. The encounter was witnessed by a small army of journalists and photographers. Subsequently Henri Letellier, director of the Journal challenged M. Buena-Varilla, the owner of the Matin.

COURT O. K. ON BALL GAME.

Wife Objects, Then Go Away Says Judge, Defending Husband.

St. Louis.—Judge Hugo Grimm, in the circuit court today, told Cornelius Campbell that "married men are entitled to some rights in this world, and when a wife objects to her husband attending a ball game or any other innocent amusement, he should assert his rights and go anyway."

He gave Mrs. Lillian M. Campbell a decree of divorce because Campbell did not contest the suit. Campbell said they could not agree about anything.

Judge Grimm asked for some specific instance as to their disagreements and Campbell said:

"She refused when I wanted to attend a ball game."
