## AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE MECHANICS BUILDING BEGUN

Ground Broken for New Structure at Oregon Agricultural College.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore.—Ground for the new farm mechanics building at the Oregon Agricultural college has been broken, and it is planned to rush the work so that the equipment may be installed and classes conducted at the opening of the college year the first of October.

The site chosen for the new building is a particularly convenient one, west of the drive which passes the boys' dormitory, Cuthbert Hall and south of that leading to the college barns, at the intersection of the two. It is to be two stories high, 122x232 feet in dimensions, and is to be constructed of brick and cement, with a steel roof. The cost will approximate \$15,000.

The readiness with which the manufacturers of farm machinery co-operate with the college in giving the students opportunity to become thoroughly acquainted with the latest models in farm labor saving devices is shown by the fact that a big carload of machinery valued at \$2000 and including a complete threshing outfit, a part of a consignment promised by various manufacturers, was sent to the college in April. As the college barns were already overcrowded by the class work and there was no place to store it, the machinery had to be returned to Portland, to be held there until this fall, when the building will be ready to receive it.

## GOATS PEST IN ALASKA.

They Have Worse Appetites Than Those of Hoboken.

Fairbanks, Alaska.—Reports from Mineral gulch are that the mountain goats which infest that section are becoming exceedingly troublesome to the miners. During stormy weather, it is said, they crowd into the tunnels that are being driven on the claims well up on the mountains, and it is only by throwing a dynamite cartridge into the tunnels in the morning that they can be driven out and the contractors get in to go to work.

It is also stated that they are likely to be the cause of considerable litigation among mine owners next year, as they have destroyed a number of location stakes by eating them. Owing to the fact that alder and willow comprises the only wood in the gulch, nearly all the location stakes are of these woods, which, in the absence of other food, due to the deep snow, the goats attack eagerly. A large number of the animals have been killed by the men at work in the gulch, but the number seems to increase rather than diminish.

### Instantly Killed by Train.

Missoula, Mont.—Pietro Georgia, a section laborer on the Northern Pacific, was struck by a westbound passenger train at Gold Creek and instantly killed.

Eccles, Shot Through Lungs, Better. Morris, Wash.—Willie Eccles, who was shot through the lungs a week ago with a rifle, is reported improving at Wenatchee hospital.

Snow in Loomis Mountain. Loomis, Wash.—Herbert Curtis, who recently bonded his tungsten mine to Spokane parties, has been working the trail between Loomis and the mine for a week. He reports much snow in the mountains.

Raymond Residence Burns. Raymond, Wash.—The residence of W. E. Church, in Riverdale Addition was destroyed by fire. The loss is \$2500, with about \$1700 insurance. Mr. and Mrs. Church were over in the city for the fireworks display.

Loomis Farmers Need Men. Loomis, Wash.—Hay harvest is in full blast and the crop is the best seen in 10 years. Though the farmers are offering \$2.50 and board for men they are not able to secure all the help they need.

Christian Congress; Portland. Portland, Ore.—The national reform association, through Clement H. Congdon, its executive agent, selected Portland for the session of 1913 of the World's Christian congress. The session will begin June 29 and close July 8.

Bury Fire Victim at Wallace. Wallace, Idaho.—The body of J. E. Beauchamp, one of the last fall's fire victims, will be brought to Wallace tomorrow from the temporary burying ground and placed in a cemetery. The widow, now in this city, is a resident of Benton Harbor, Mich.

Robber Suspect is Held. Corvallis, Ore.—A man suspected as one of the robbers of the Shasta Limited, June 16, is in the Benton county jail, awaiting arrival of Roseburg officers. He was arrested today by Sheriff Gellatly in Alsea Valley, where he has been working for a week.

Boy Dies on Train. Spokane.—Suffering from pneumonia, not thought to be serious, but greatly augmented by a change of altitude, John M. Heron, the 4-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. M. P. Heron of Great Falls, Mont., died near Bonners Ferry, Idaho, yesterday while en route to Seattle from Great Falls.

Falls City Farmer Fire Victim. Falls City, Ore.—The barn, granary, wagon shed and blacksmith shop of J. W. Lee, near this city, were destroyed by fire at 11 last night. Farming implements two horses and two sets of harness were burned. The loss is estimated at \$1500, with no insurance.

Boy Heroically Aids Chum. Coulee City, Wash.—John Green, aged 11, while playing with Marvin Hicks, aged 9, on the place of Dr. Rickards near this city, was struck by a rattlesnake three times below the knee. The Hicks boy sucked the poison from the wound and wrapped the leg above the knee with a bandage, applying a coat of grafting wax to the wound.

Robbers Get Jewelry. Medford, Ore.—Robbers secured \$500 in jewelry from Martin J. Reddy, a jeweler, at an early hour this morning. They forced an entrance through the rear door and carried away five trays of fraternal order pins and 35 bracelets. No attempt was made to blow the safe holding diamonds and watches. The police have no clue.

Governor Honors Requisition. Salem, Ore.—Police Detective Harry E. E. Green, of Oakland, Cal., today served requisition papers on the governor for the extradition of Stephen Terrara, who is wanted in Oakland to answer a charge of grand larceny. Terrara is now under arrest in Portland. The state's warrant for Terrara was issued.
