## HERMISTON TO VOTE ON BONDS SOON

### NEW WATER SYSTEM AND PARK PROPOSED

Knights of Pythias Install New Officers and Tender Banquet to Visiting Members.

Hermiston, Ore., July 7.—On Monday, August 7, there will be held at Hermiston a special election which is for the purpose of allowing the voters to express their wish in regard to the four measures which the city council has referred to them.

These measures are first: The proposed city water system. Mr. Hinkle the city engineer has drawn the plans for the new water system which provide for 250,000 gallon reservoir on Rocky Butte and a deep well to be used as a source of water supply.

Second, the purchasing of a strip of land, that lies next to the railroad tract, to be used for park purposes. This land lies directly next to the O. W. R. & N. railroad, the limit for the purchase of this tract of land is \$4000.00, this is left to the people to decide whether they wish this land for a park or not.

The third measure is for the carrying of the bonds for the water system, and the fourth measure is similar to the third only a regard to the purchase of the land for the park.

Hermiston is soon to have a sheep camp. Mr. Gerald Stanfield of Stanfield, Oregon, has purchased the land owned formerly by Mr. E. W. Long, 120 acres in Section 2, composing 120 acres. Mr. Stanfield is now erecting a camp and fencing the entire 120 acres. He will ship to this land, several hundred head of sheep as

### GAGE PROSPERITY BY BEER.

Safe of 63,000,000 Barrels in U. S. Last Year.

New York.—No less than 63,000,000 barrels of beer were sold in the United States during the 12 months ended June 30 last, or an increase over the previous 12 months of 6.21 per cent, according to the annual report of the beer and whisky sales made public today by the United States Brewers' association.

Notwithstanding the increase, which the report contends indicates that the country is prosperous, the spread of prohibition has affected the trade considerably, it is declared.

The whisky bill of the United States for the year, according to the report, is \$146,972,000, an increase of nearly \$5,000,000, or 5.5 per cent over the preceding 12 months.
