## NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

**Montana Man Drives Biplane.**  
Great Falls, Mont.—T. T. Maroney made a successful flight in his aeroplane. Mr. Maroney is the first Montana man to drive his own biplane.

**Dutton Store Is Destroyed.**  
Dutton, Mont.—The general store of Mr. Dutton was destroyed by fire, causing a loss of \$1700, with insurance of but \$1000.

**Sectator Goes to Penitentiary.**  
Ellensburg, Wash.—Fred Sartoris, who attacked a 12-year-old girl in the Elms early in the week, pleaded guilty to assault before Judge Kauffman and was sentenced to 5 to 15 years in the penitentiary.

**Bankrupt Is Arrested.**  
Hillsboro, Ore.—S. F. Weirick was arrested by Constable McQuillan, at Eugene, on a warrant charging him

with obtaining \$1000 from W. H. Wehring, president of the Hillsboro National bank, on false pretenses.

**Hunt Is Hurt by Horse.**  
Eureka, Wash.—Arthur Hunt, an employee on the L. W. Sheffer ranch, near this place, was severely injured by a horse. The animal kicked Hunt on the leg. He was taken to the Walla Walla hospital.

**Stockmen for Federal Control.**  
Conrad, Mont.—Petitions are being circulated among stockmen praying congress to pass a bill providing for federal control and leasing of the grazing lands of the state and its meeting with favor among cattlemen.

**New Cannery Nearing Completion.**  
Astoria, Ore.—The building for the new cannery which the Union Fishermen's Co-operative Packing company of this city is erecting on Grays Harbor is nearly completed and the plant will be ready for operation during the coming fishing season, which will open on August 1.

**Big Battlesnake Killed.**  
Grants Pass, Ore.—A rattlesnake with 22 rattles and a button was brought to Grants Pass from the Dry

Diggers three miles out of town, where a few years ago, hydraulic mining was carried on with success by pumping water out of Rogue River. The snake was nearly five feet long and seems to have lost four or five of his original rattles. It was killed by Sidney Woolfolk.

**Gold Beach Pioneer Dies.**  
Gold Beach, Ore.—From the ranks of Oregon pioneers who have passed away is Kenneth Cuniff, who died. For some time he had been quite feeble. He was born in Ireland, March 9, 1828, and settled at Gold Beach, Curry county, in 1857. He is survived by his wife, who was Margaret McElroy, also born in Ireland, October 27, 1819, and three children, Mrs. Alfred Miller, of Rogue River; Mrs. John Howell, of Harbor; Kenneth Cuniff, Gold Beach.

**No More Meals for Tramps.**  
Walla Walla, Wash.—Refusal of several "hoboes" yesterday to work for meals given by the Sisters of Mercy at St. Mary's hospital, has brought about the collapse of a system by which for many weeks tramps camping a few days in the "jungle" will be deprived of "square meals."

Yesterday 50 tramps were fed, so widespread had the hospitality of the sisters become.

## Vale Wool Prices are Best.

Vale, Ore.—The fact that Vale again this year topped the prices received for wool in any part of the state has attracted the attention of the flockmasters in the interior and they will bring their wool to this place for sale hereafter. The fact that there has not been sufficient warehouse facilities has prevented this heretofore.

## WIND STEALS \$470 CHECK.

East Hours Paper Down Street With "Check" in Pursuit.

Eugene, Ore., July 11.—A little wind blown across of white paper yesterday afternoon led the entire force of the sheriff's office and a "troop" of citizens a mad chase over the courthouse, the court yard and down East Eighth street, finally ending the pursuers and disappearing over a barn.

The fugitive bit of paper was a check for \$470 and it was given to Sheriff Brown by Eli Bangs in payment for goods just purchased at sheriff's sale.

Mr. Bangs made out the check and handed it to Sheriff Brown, who was standing just in front of an open window. As the sheriff was in the act of handing the bit of paper to his deputy, a gust of wind caught it, blowing it through the office out into the corridor and thence into the courtyard.

## LIFE SAVING DEMONSTRATION.

Government of Mines Will Educate Miners in Avoiding Disasters.

Washington.—In an effort to educate the miners and mine owners throughout the country in preventive methods against explosions and other disasters, the Bureau of Mines has arranged for a National Miners' Life Saving Demonstration, to be held at Arsenal Park, Pittsburgh, Pa., on September 16.

This demonstration will be the most unique exhibit of its kind ever held in this country. The bureau expects that 20,000 and 30,000 miners will attend and that coal companies will send their trained first aid and rescue corps to participate. Among the speakers will be President Taft, Secretary of the Interior Fisher and Dr. Joseph A. Holmes, director of the bureau.

Arsenal Park is the site of the testing station of the Bureau of Mines. The first aid to the injured work will be one of the features of the day. The teams from the various coal mines will not compete but will give exhibitions of their skill in bringing injured miners from the mines and binding their wounds.

In addition to this work the miners will witness gas and coal-dust explosions in miniature which will be staged in the great explosives gallery of the bureau. In Arsenal Park there will also be an explosion gallery which will resemble a coal mine. This will be placed at the bottom of a natural amphitheater where the experiments can be watched by thousands of miners.

Gas explosions will take place in this play mine; miners will be entombed and one of the government rescue corps in oxygen helmets will enter and "save" the men. One side of the miniature mine will be open throughout its entire length so that the on-lookers may witness everything that happens in an underground horror, except the loss of life. The famous oxygen helmets which have saved many lives since their adoption by the bureau will also be on exhibition.

It is the opinion of the bureau that this demonstration will be of great practical benefit.

## TOO LATE FOR DINNER.

A farmer who sold provisions to the contractors often reached the place where the men were at work at meal-time. He was greatly impressed at their voracity.
