Hope Burglars Leave Cash Box.
Hope, Idaho.—The box which contained money in A. W. Gordon's safe which was blown up was found on the beach Sunday in a good condition but empty.

Rancher Seeks Divorce.
Freewater, Ore.—Burtus H. Vallie, a prominent rancher of State Line, has filed a decree of divorce against Nettie B. Vallie, alleging cruel and inhuman treatment. Mr. Vallie has been married a little over a year.

Collision Victim May Die.
Rexford, Mont.—The Great Northern fast mail No. 27 struck a handcar of section men here. G. Polomboto, an Italian, was seriously injured and will probably die. The other men escaped.

Pays \$10,000 for Gifford Orchard.
Gifford, Wash.—The fruit orchard of M. D. Ettinger, three miles east of here, has been sold to Spokane buyers for \$10,000. Mr. Ettinger has taken as part payment residence property in Spokane.

"Wash Day" Unlucky.
Freewater, Ore.—The 4-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Dausener, while playing "wash day" with his little sister yesterday was feeding the wringer with paper when his finger caught in the machine and was badly crushed.

Rides to Chicago on Bet.
Ontario, Ore.—Riding on a \$1200 wager to reach Chicago in four months after leaving Portland, Richard Wilson passed through Ontario

on his way through Ontario on his bicycle. He left Portland three weeks ago and will follow the Union Pacific right of way all the way to Omaha. One of the conditions of the wager is that he must earn his living on the way.

Youth Drowns.
Newport, Or.—Julius Wienieski, 17 years old, son of A. Wienieski, was drowned while fishing with his brother, Tomie, from a small row-boat on the Siletz river, about nine miles from Newport. The boat ran on a snag in the river, causing the boat to capsize.

\$1000 Gem Lost.
Oregon City, Or.—While gathering peas in the garden of the Rev. C. W. Robinson, rector of St. Paul's Episcopal church, Miss Catherine Percival, of Philadelphia, lost a diamond ring valued at more than \$1000.

Hood Scaled from North.
Hood River, Or.—F. C. Howell, Albert Crocker, Charles Huggins, Fred Coshow and William Young, of this city, and a number of people from Portland and Vancouver, Wash., made the first ascent of Mount Hood from the north side for the season.

Aviator Flies.
La Grande, Ore.—Making good for his failure Saturday night, Aviator C. F. Walsh circumnavigated the half of Grande Ronde valley, crossed the city of La Grande and landed safely. He was gone 15 minutes and averaged 800 feet altitude.

Vandals Busy at Pasco.
Pasco, Wash.—Both the city police and the members of the sheriff's office are on the lookout for the vandals who did several hundred dollars' worth of damage to the new \$40,000 school building now being erected. All the pressed brick around the buildings have been pried out with a bar, and, according to the contrac-

tor, W. L. Archer of Spokane, it will take nine masons two days to replace the brick.

First Wheat Threshed.
Walla Walla, Wash.—The first to be threshed and hauled this year, 2000 sacks of 40-fold wheat, the property of J. W. Dalton of Lowden, is stored in the warehouse of the Pacific Coast Elevator company at that place.

Davenport Farm Home Burns.
Davenport, Wash.—The country home of W. H. Peart, three miles northeast of Davenport, was destroyed by fire with all the contents. The origin of the fire is unknown. Mr. Peart is proprietor of a general merchandise store in Davenport, and was in town when the fire occurred. The loss is about \$1500.

Breaks Leg in Mine Fall.
Mullan, Idaho.—Joe Stevens, a miner at the Morning mine, while working on the 800-foot level, slipped off a muck pile into an ore shoot, falling three floors (30 feet) breaking his right leg. Stevens was taken to the Providence hospital.

Nine Men in Wilbur Jail.
Davenport, Wash.—W. H. Kirk, Jr., a farmer residing north of Almira, who spent Sunday in Davenport, stated that revenue officers who attended the Fourth of July celebration at Nespelem came down with nine prisoners arrested for taking intoxicating liquor into the Indian reservation. The arrested men were placed in the Wilbur jail temporarily.

NEW YORKERS TO ERECT 100 STORY BUILDING
Cleveland, Ohio.—Vice-President Mortimer of the United States Realty company of New York announced to the National Building Owners & Managers' convention here that plans had been drawn for a 100 story building in New York which is to be

1200 feet high, the tallest structure in the world. Mortimer said the plans had been submitted to him just before he left New York. His company controls about \$50,000,000 worth of New York skyscrapers.

\$5,000 LONG FORGOTTEN.
Jersey City, N. J.—After lying in a pigeonhole of a desk for sixteen years, a certified check for \$5,000 was found by George T. Bouton, the retiring clerk of the Jersey City street and water board. The check was signed by the David Coal and Coke company as security for a coal bid the company put in to supply the city and was dated May 24, 1895. At the time the bid was turned down and the check forgotten. A messenger from the New York office of the company came over and obtained the time worn bit of paper.
