CRAZY HERE, SANE THERE.

Irish Courts Free Man Imprisoned Here.
New York.—Jeremiah Goggin, a former inmate of Bloomingdale asylum and an heir to a large estate in Ireland and who two months ago was granted a leave of absence from the asylum, has been declared sane in Dublin, Ireland. In the eyes of the law he is still insane in this state, and should he return to this country, can be taken back to Bloomingdale.

Coggin's brother, Cornelius, a prominent merchant of Dublin, applied to Supreme Court Justice Morschauer for an order allowing him a vacation of one year, so that Jeremiah could visit his relatives in Ireland. Several physicians at the asylum said it would benefit the man's health, so permission was given. Judge Morschauer, however, decided that William Bradley, attendant at Bloomingdale asylum, should accompany the patient to Ireland and return with him within a year.

Guard Returns Alone.
Bradley returned home today without his patient. He explained that after he and his charge reached Ireland they went to reside at the Four Courts hotel in Dublin. The proprietor and guests of the place became interested, and it was on their complaint that the matter was taken to the High Court of Chancery. The ostensible cause of complaint was that a lunatic was at large. The court appointed Sir Arthur Chance and Dr. J. O. C. Donelan, both eminent mental specialists to make an examination of Mr. Goggin. Their report read:

"Having carefully and repeatedly examined Jeremiah Goggin, we are of the opinion that it is quite unnecessary to have him under the care of a special mental nurse or attendant. Some time ago he was under treatment in an American asylum for the insane, the chief ground for his detention being that he entertained certain ideas regarding his wife's character, which were considered arrant ones."

"Assuming these ideas were delusional and that she stood in some danger at his hands while they were in the same neighborhood, this risk no longer exists now that the Atlantic ocean separates them, one being in America and he in Ireland."

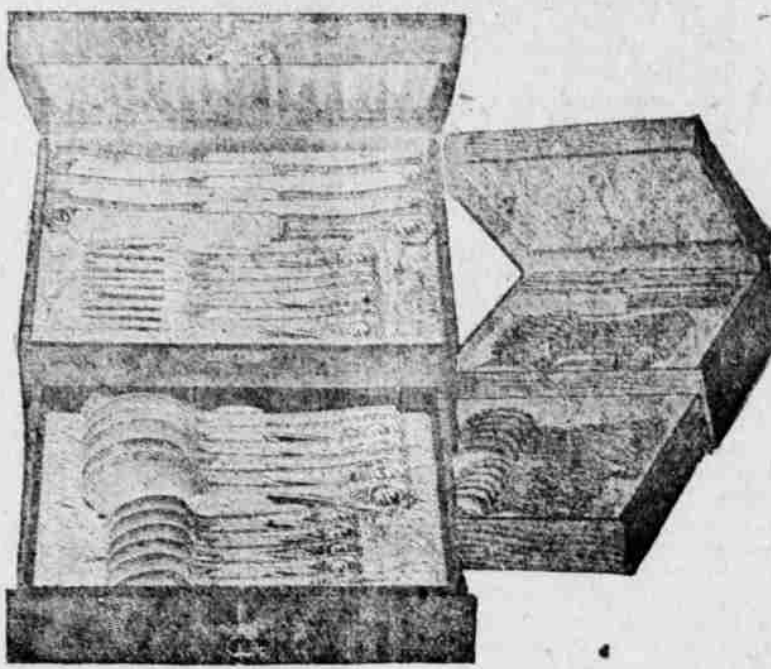

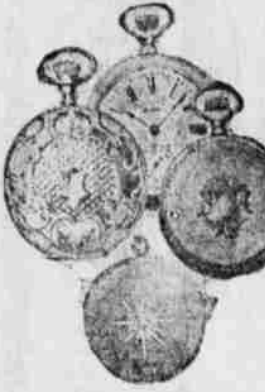

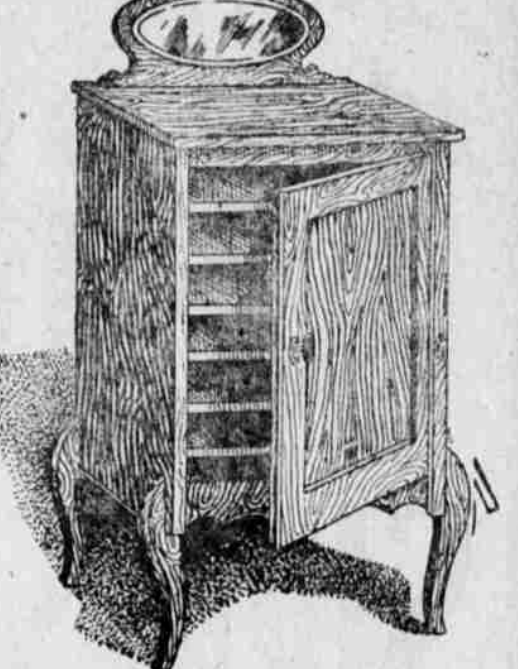

PRISON CHAPLAIN QUILTS.

He Was Criticised for Marriage of Woman to an Ex-Convict.

Jefferson City, Mo.—Because of criticism growing out of his connection with the courtship and marriage of Miss Ethel Faeken to Harry Van Warringa, a former convict at the Missouri penitentiary, the Rev. J. J. Martin, chaplain of the state penitentiary, has tendered his resignation to Warden Henry Andrae, to take effect August 1.

When Dr. Martin was asked the cause of his resignation, he said: "I am resigning because of that Van Warringa matter. I have been criticised for the unfortunate part I had in the affair. My resignation is in the hands of the warden."

Dr. Martin was chaplain of the Perry-Park general assembly. Since his appointment he has introduced many innovations in the way of music and special exercises which have greatly popularized him with the inmates of the prison.

She called out the window for help and Louis J. Baum of 527 South street entered the house by crawling along the window ledge from his own dwelling and with the help of Police-

man Flemming of the Third district carried mother and children to safety by swinging down the awning rods, the fire in the lower floor, used as a store, cutting off the stairs.

The cat was not forgotten and an extra trip brought tabby to the sidewalk.
