SHEEP AND LAMBS ADVANCE A QUARTER

CATTLE MARKET SHOWS MUCH MORE ACTIVITY
Wheat at Many Points Shows Marked Advance at Close of Market Over Opening Quotations.

(From Wednesday's Journal.)
Business was brisk at the yards this morning and values were considerably stronger than yesterday. An advance of 25 cents was announced on sheep and lambs, a lot of 63 head, averaging 77 pounds, bringing \$5.75, the best price paid for some time. There was considerable activity in cattle, and hogs were firm at \$7.25, a price that has been ruling for some time. The receipts of hogs continue light as compared with the demand. A year ago today hogs brought \$10.25, an advance of 5 cents over the ruling price at that time. These hogs were in fine condition, but the market was nevertheless very firm and there was a big demand for hogs. The high prices held two days and then there was a drop of about 10 cents.
