Committee seemed to have slipped Montgomery's mind for, upon this announcement, he entered a mild protest against leaving the investigation to that committee stating that it was not the business of the committee to build ordinances but rather to pass upon such as were presented. However, on second thought he withdrew any objection he might have had.

Big Question, Says Mayor.
Mayor Murphy closed the discussion with the statement that he considered the subject much bigger than it was at first considered and that considerable time was necessary for a thorough investigation. The motion was then put and without a dissenting voice, it carried.

A Thorough Investigation.
The ordinance committee of the council is composed of Councilman Strain, chairman; Councilman Dyer and Councilman Stroble. Though the committee has not yet met to outline its work it is the intention of the committeemen to go deeply and thoroughly into the matter and to do so as quickly as possible.

Last night Mr. Strain left for the west end of the county to be gone for several days and before his departure he announced that the committee is desirous of securing all the data possible bearing upon the subject. Councilman Dyer, who seconded the motion to place the matter in the hands of the ordinance committee, is likewise favorable to thorough action.

Club Ladies Pleased.
Though they modestly ask to be excused from personal quotation the members of the ladies civic club admit today they are well pleased with the progress that is being made towards accomplishing the improvement they have desired so long. They say they did not expect anything like final action last evening and are entirely satisfied to have the matter left in the hands of the ordinance committee with authority to proceed with an investigation and to prepare an ordinance with deliberation.

Councilman Ell.
Councilman Joe Ell, who could not be found for an interview yesterday, declared himself today as favorable to removing the overhead wires provided a full investigation of the subject justifies such a course. In the view of Mr. Ell the placing of the wires underground would not necessitate the rewiring of buildings but would merely mean a change in the connecting wires.

Secretary J. E. Keefe of the Commercial association is in receipt of a communication from W. Bollons, O. W. R. & N. superintendent, stating that he will be in Pendleton within a week for the purpose of taking steps towards the installation of a warning bell at the crossing between mileposts 232 and 233.

Rooming House Man Arrested.

A warrant was sworn out against John Doe, proprietor of the Palace rooming house, today, charging him with permitting gambling in his house, and he will be brought before Acting Police Judge Hailey at 4 o'clock this afternoon. It was in the Palace rooming house that the four gamblers, recently arrested and fined, were caught in their play.

Water Commission Visits Agency.

Members of the city water commission and City Attorney Roy Raley went out to the reservation agency this afternoon to confer with the two Indian women whose land is wanted for the construction of a gravity water system and against whom condemnation proceedings have been started.

Coat Stolen and Recovered.

A farmer by the name of Miller came into town yesterday and left his coat in his wagon. Some thief took possession of it and later Mr. Miller discovered it in a pawn shop but his papers and check book had been removed. The loss which he feels most is that of a little book in which he had kept his accounts since 1901.

I. B. Richards of Spokane, general superintendent of the Northern Pacific, J. L. Force, superintendent of the Pasco division, J. C. Roth, superintendent of car service, J. G. Cutler, roadmaster, and C. Asylum Claim Was Paid.

Looking back among the cancelled checks showing sums paid out by the Pendleton Commercial club Secretary Jack Keefe has found the check that was sent the Baker Commercial club in payment of Pendleton's share of the expense incurred in connection with paying for the argument for the eastern Oregon branch asylum. Through a story in a Portland paper it had been charged by Bakerites this claim had not been paid. Secretary Keefe has written the Baker people calling attention to the cancelled voucher and to the date of payment.

Smythe Addresses Council.

President Dan P. Smythe of the Commercial association happened to drop into the council chamber during the session last evening and was called upon by Mayor Murphy for a speech. He responded by complimenting the council upon its action in working for street improvement, assuring the members that the Commercial association endorsed their efforts in this line.
