NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

Stranger Dies.
Dayton, Wash.—There was received at D. B. Wiltshire's undertaking parlors the body of a man supposed to be W. J. Todd of Bellingham. Deceased died suddenly at the office of Dr. John Huntington at Starbuck.

Sand Chute Deals Death.
Portland.—While standing on top of a sand chute at the foot of Salmon street, from which a teamster was drawing sand below, Frank Sobier, aged 63, an employee of the Columbia contracting company, was drawn into the chute yesterday and smothered before he could be released.

Powder Plant Blows Up.
Everett, Wash.—The Union Powder company's plant near Marysville, seven miles north of Everett, was destroyed by an explosion last night. Samuel Sutter of Seattle, an employee, was killed and E. G. Corwin, of Seattle, and a boy named Carl seriously burned. The financial loss was small.

To Investigate Wreck.
Salem.—Railroad Commissioners Aitchison, Campbell and Miller left yesterday for eastern Oregon to begin an investigation into the causes of the wreck on the Oregon Trunk line which resulted in several killed and many injured. A report will be submitted as soon as all the facts in the case have been collected.

Stricken With Paralysis.
Sumpter, Ore.—Mrs. Van R. Meade, wife of a local timber cruiser, was stricken with paralysis here a few days ago and is still in a precarious condition with little hope of her recovery. Mr. and Mrs. Meade are pioneers of Sumpter, having resided here for the past twelve years.

Plasterer Drowns.
North Yakima.—Will H. Lane, a plaster contractor and brother of former City Councilman Frank Lane, was drowned in the Schanno ditch, half a block from his home, near Cherry and Custer streets in Modern addition. The body was found this morning at 5:30 o'clock by Bert Gatchell, an employee of the ice plant.

Idaho Banks Fourth.
Boise.—Idaho has forged into fourth place among the wool producing states of America. Only Montana, Wyoming and New Mexico now lead the Gen state in the tonnage of wool produced and the number of wool producing sheep. Utah which ten years ago occupied fourth place, has dropped into the sixth station.

Rancher Catches Baby Eagles.
Pasco, Wash.—Councilman Cox of Pasco, is the possessor of an eagle, three weeks old, which was captured in the hills in the north end of the county by a rancher named Ford. Ford caught two small eagles, but had to kill one to free his hand from its sharp claws. Councilman Cox will keep the bird on his ranch this summer. Its wings measure 20 inches from tip to tip.

Horse Kicks Twenty Feet.
Castle Rock, Wash.—Elmer Huntington, ex-sheriff and at present member of the city council, was painfully injured in a peculiar accident. He was standing about 20 feet from a buggy to which had been hitched a sulky horse that had manifested its disapproval by lying down. The owner struck the animal with a whip and it jumped up and began kicking. The animal finally kicked out the piece of iron which is inserted in the end of the single tree, with such force that it flew and hit Huntington over the left eye, cutting a deep gash about an inch and a half long, and knocking him unconscious.

INDIAN DIVORCES ARE RECOGNIZED AS LEGAL

Oklahoma City, Okla.—The Oklahoma supreme court handed down a decision recognizing as legal divorces obtained according to the old tribal customs of the Indians. The decision was rendered in the case of Xaxier Dedonies, a Canadian by birth, who came to the United States and settled among the Pottawatomies, by whom he was adopted. He married an Indian woman who died, and subsequently he married a woman not a member of the tribe. He later divorced her, according to the customs and usages of the tribe. Azelda Cyr, the divorced woman, brought suit against his heirs to obtain possession of some of his property on the ground that the divorce was illegal, not having the sanction of any court. Under the Pottawatomie laws a man could divorce his wife merely by "taking up" with another female member of the tribe.

HE LOST \$1,500,000 BY GOING TO CIVIL WAR

Greeley, Colo.—In order that he might fight for the union 51 years ago, F. W. Garun left his homestead of 160 acres and 20 tons of fine hay and went to the front. Yesterday en route east, he stopped here and said his property embraced what is now the heart of the city, which is worth no less than \$1,500,000.

Boy Drowns at Corvallis.

Corvallis, Or.—Falling from a log boom on which they were crossing Marys river, in this city, Oliver Mumford, a 12-year-old boy, the son of Mrs. C. E. Howes of Corvallis, was drowned, and Wallace Peck of the same age, was saved only by quick action of Tommy Whitehorn, aged 14, who swam to his relief. The drowned boy, whose stepfather is a prominent local business man, was highly regarded for his good character. His body was recovered.

COMPOSER DIES SINGING.

Noted Vocalist Goes Out of World to Music of Own Tunes.

Chicago.—Singing snatches from his own composition, John P. Jones, noted Welsh composer and vocalist, died at the age of 88. The seventeen year old granddaughter of the composer sat at the piano.

The player began to strum the melody of "Congress Street," Mr. Jones' favorite among the hymns of his own composition, the aged singer took up the words. Almost as clear and rounded as in earlier years, his voice rose above the accompaniment. Then came another favorite to the

INDIAN COMMISSION NOT A COLLECTION AGENCY

Spokane, Wash.—Claims aggregating several millions of dollars, presented by creditors against Indians on various reservations throughout the United States, are being tabulated by the office of Indian affairs, says C. F. Hauke, acting commissioner, in a letter to the Spokane chamber of commerce through United States Senator Poindexter, in reply to a complaint by the Commercial club of Covada, Wash., as to the settlement of Indians' debts, adding:

"As soon as that part of the scheduling which covers all claims presented by creditors of the Indians of a given reservation is complete, steps will be taken to promptly and impartially adjust these claims according to the resources of the debtors and the merits of the claims."

Commissioner Hauke emphasizes the fact that the department of the interior has restrained his office from acting as a collecting agency for creditors of Indians. Continuing he says: "Through the allotment of land to individual Indians and the consequent acquisition by them from proceeds of their lands of individual
