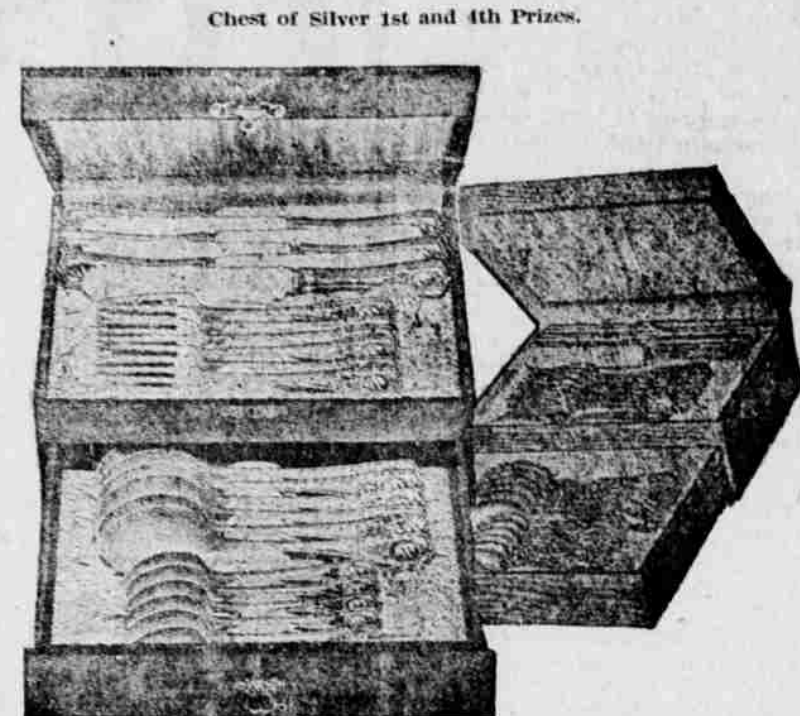
Sacramento 5, Angels 3.
