NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST.

Finda Tatantula in Bananas. Lacrosse, Wash.—While cutting an order from a bunch of bananas in the Hoover store yesterday Lester Armfield was frightened by a big black tatantula crawling up his shirt sleeve.

190 Fail Out of 1200. Salem, Or.—Figures not quite complete, but approximately correct, were given out at the office of the state superintendent of public instruction and show that out of 1200 taking the teachers' examinations recently there were 190 failures.

Brady Cleared at Baker. Baker, Ore.—The grand jury returned no true bill against Thomas Brady who was bound over as the result of the shooting scrape last month at the Whittier shearing plant near Huntington.

Wallowa Stockman Is Hurt. Wallowa, Ore.—C. A. Hunter, a prominent stockman of this city, was severely hurt in a runaway between La Grande and Island City. The team took fright at a traction engine and collided with the guy wire of a telephone pole.

Current Kills Operator. Colfax, Wash.—L. M. Guyton, aged 21, single, son of John Guyton of Sulligent, Ala., acting as relief operator on the Spokane Inland Electric line at Oakesdale, was found electrocuted at his keyboard by Agent Fitzgerald and his wife.

Kills Steptfather. Baker, Ore.—George Chase, a Rock Creek rancher, was shot and instantly killed by his step son, Emmet Blood, seventeen years of age, following a quarrel, believed to have been brought about by domestic troubles in the family of long duration.

Heat Kills Etopia Babe. Eltopia, Wash.—The 14-month-old baby of Mr. and Mrs. Frank A. Recor died at their ranch, eight miles northeast of here, after an illness of three hours. The excessive heat was the cause. Interment will be made in the Woodmen's cemetery here. The mercury touched 101 in the shade here.

Pasco Girl Wills in Sun. Pasco, Wash.—The first sun stroke of the season was reported, the 10-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred McKenzie being the victim. The weather has been unusually hot the last three days, the mercury lingering about the 100 notch. The nights have been cool.

Runaway Girls at Home. Forest Grove, Ore.—Goldie Nichols and Anna Duffy, the two runaway girls who were found in Oregon City, and for whom the Washington county officers had sought for several days, returned home last evening from the Clackamas county seat under charge of Sheriff Hancock.

Cuts Throat; Takes Acid. Dayton, Wash.—Myrtle Gardiner, age 46, who was married the second time a year ago, committed suicide by cutting her throat and taking a large quantity of carbolic acid, and afterward swallowing turpentine. She was found by her daughter in a shed in a dying condition. The son is in the state asylum. The verdict was death caused by poison self administered.

Grief Pursues Family. Sheridan, Or.—To the succession of calamities that have befallen the family of C. H. Baker, whose wife and son, Morris, were killed in the wreck of the Oregon Trunk south-bound passenger train in the Deschutes canyon, is added the announcement that amputation of both arms of the father is necessary if his life is to be saved.

Snyder Is Hurt at Pasco. Pasco, Wash.—George Snyder was picked up in the railroad yards here having fallen off a car of ties where he was resting. According to the story, he formerly owned a mine in Idaho, but on account of trouble with his eyes he was compelled to sell the mining property for \$12,000 and of this amount he spent \$4800 for doctors' fees.

13-YEAR OLD GIRL IMITATES A BANDIT.

Points Pistol at Clerk, Demands Cash But is Arrested.

Akron, O.—Edna Goble, a 13-year-old Akron girl, is under arrest charged with attempting to hold up the Cuyahoga Falls bank in Western style. She walked into the bank and asked for the cashier, J. N. Wolfinger.

He happened to be out, and D. R. Gensemer, a bookkeeper, was in charge. The girl then pointed a gun in Gensemer's face and demanded that he "give her all the money that was in the vaults." He told her the safes were locked and he had no keys to them.

"Then give me all the money you have in your pockets," she said.

"Sorry, but I have no money with me," answered the bookkeeper.

The girl then backed to the door, covering Gensemer. He called to the town marshal, who was in the street near the bank, and the girl was arrested.

BOTH STATES GET INHERITANCE TAX

Salem, Ore.—The Attorney General's office has rendered an opinion on the question as to whether or not the state of Oregon is entitled to an inheritance tax on property located in this state while the certificates of ownership of the same are being held in California. It is held that inasmuch as the statute of this state provides that the state shall demand an inheritance tax, and as the property is located in this state, the state is legally entitled to the tax, while California, if that state has an inheritance tax law, is legally authorized to collect a tax on the certificates. Under this holding, both the states of Oregon and California are empowered to collect a tax from one piece of property.

COLLEGE BOY A FORESTER.

O. A. C. Lad Named by State Forest Service to Help Fight Fires This Summer.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore.—Walter L. Dutton of Lakeview, a sophomore in the forestry course at Oregon Agricultural College who begins his junior work this fall, has been appointed to the state forest service, and called to Chewaucan valley for the summer, to assist in controlling such forest fires as may break out there during the dry season.

GIVES LIFE FOR HER FRIEND.

Young Woman Drowns Trying to Rescue Companion.

Evansville, Ind.—In an attempt to save her friend, Anna Griffith, from drowning while they were bathing in the Ohio river Bonnie Waldon, 21 years of age, was drowned. Miss Griffith was rescued by Hamilton Hopkins in a gasoline launch but he could not reach Miss Waldon.

The mother of Miss Waldon was a member of the party that helplessly watched her sink. She was the daughter of Dr. William Waldon of Newburg, Ind.

BOYS IN SUMMER CAMP PUT UNDER QUARANTINE

Seattle, Wash.—One case of diphtheria in the Y. M. C. A. summer camp for boys at East Sound, resulted in the quarantine of camp under orders from the city health commissioner. Fifty-two boys in the camp are affected by the quarantine. The health authorities will permit the boys to return to Seattle five days after they submit to a treatment with anti-toxin.

TIMBER LAND TAPPED.

Toledo-to-Siletz Line to Be Built Within Year.

Toledo, Ore.—A contract was signed by a group of citizens of this county to build and operate a railroad from Toledo into the Siletz timber country. Under this agreement the local promoters agree to furnish right of way and depot grounds at Toledo and Siletz.

It is announced that work will begin in 60 days and that the road be completed in one year. This road will open up one of the heaviest timber belts in Oregon and its promotion has only yielded the assurance of deep water from Toledo to the ocean, this water is now assured by the dredging in operation by the Port of Toledo.

Names of those behind the project are withheld for the present.

MONITOR SURVIVOR DIES.

Stoker in Famous Sea Fight Ends Days in Soldiers' Home.

Sawett, Cal.—Michael Mooney, said to be one of the three survivors of the crew which manned the "Monitor" when it fought and vanquished the Confederate ram "Merrimac," died here, aged 74 years, at the National Soldiers' Home. On the last anniversary of the battle, Mooney sent a letter recalling the events of the day to another survivor, who lives in Philadelphia.

A third surviving member of the monitor's crew is William McCready, 75 years old, watchman at the Puget Sound Navy yard. Among Mooney's papers was found a complete list of the vessel's officers and men, including his own name as a stoker.
