Excellent program for Tuesday's change:

1. The Railroad Raiders of '62. Kalem. A true incident of the American civil war. Here is a picture of real men, making real war. Sustained action in every scene. A story that proves truth stranger than fiction.

SCIENTISTS LAND AT NOME.

Smithsonian Naturalists Picked Up by Schooner on Way North.

NOME.—The gasoline schooner Polar Bear arrived from Seattle, whence she sailed on June 16th. On the way north the Polar Bear picked up A. C. Bent, Rolla H. Beck and Fred McKenzie, members of an expedition sent out by the Smithsonian Institution, who had been gathering specimens in the Aleutian Islands. NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

Arrest Carlson at Spirit Lake. Spirit Lake, Idaho.—P. J. Carlson was arrested on charges preferred by Newport parties for false pretense and embezzlement.

Yakima Guests Must Register. North Yakima, Wash.—Hotel keepers of the city have been notified by the sheriff that they must obey the law requiring all guests to register before occupying rooms.

Ferdale School Open to All. Freewater, Ore.—At a meeting of the Ferdale high school patrons this week it was decided to extend the privilege of the high school to non-resident pupils free of charge.

Chicken Has Three Bills. Union, Ore.—R. W. Clark who is incubating chickens by aid of the hot springs on the Levy ranch, has a chicken just hatched with three eyes and three bills.

Hay Burns at Hauser Junction. Hauser Junction, Idaho.—Fire broke out in the McCrea & Merryweather hay field and burned between 75 and 100 tons of hay. The loss is estimated at between \$2000 and \$3,000.

Lassoes Monster Snake. Pleasant Valley, Wash.—In true western style Jesse Goldberg roped a huge rattler and dragged it to death at the heels of his pony. The monster reptile measured over six feet and possessed 16 rattles and a button.

Dayton Suicide Buried. Dayton, Wash.—The funeral of Mrs. Myrtle Gardiner, who committed suicide by drinking carbolic acid last Saturday was held from R. D. Wiltshire's undertaking parlors. The Rev. A. W. Roberts, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church, conducted the rites at the ceremony.

Milton Green Corn on Market. Freewater, Ore.—H. D. Lamb, manager of the Milton-Freewater Fruitgrowers' union, reports he has closed a sale of silver pines at \$28 f. o. b. This same variety last season sold at \$20. He has sold summer apples at \$1 a box the choice varieties selling at \$1.75. Green corn is now plentiful, retailing at 20 cents.

Men Are Few at Huntington. Huntington, Ore.—Lack of labor is delaying the O-W-R. & N. building wider and better bridges for the double-tracking between this place and Baker. A large force of men is at work on the north side of Burnt river loading gravel for the cement piers to replace the old wooden bridges.

Ask Pardon for Caseday. Canyon City, Ore.—A strong effort is being made by friends of Joseph Caseday who has twice been sentenced to death for complicity in the killing by a mob of a man placed in his custody as deputy sheriff, to receive clemency. When the crime was committed Caseday was nearly mobbed himself. Several copies of a petition to the governor are being circulated.

Bury Operator at Oakesdale. Oakesdale, Wash.—The remains of L. M. Guyton, operator, who was electrocuted here Saturday while using the telephone, was buried here with full Masonic rites. The funeral sermon was preached by the Rev. John Evans of the Methodist Episcopal church. Mr. Guyton was a member at Sulligent, Ala.

Bury Girls at Sandpoint. Sandpoint, Idaho.—The funeral of Lucy Bitterick, Elsie Bitterick and Nora Robinson, the three girls who drowned in Chuck slough Sunday evening, were conducted here. The Rev. J. C. Collins of the Baptist church conducted the services. Members of the Modern Woodmen of the World and Eagles' lodge attended the services.

Ellensburg to Try It. Ellensburg, Wash.—At a council meeting a petition asking the holding of an election on the adoption of commission form of government under the provisions of the Allen law was received. The document was referred to a committee for investigation and for checking, but, as a majority of the councilmen signed the petition it is understood that the election will be called well within the time limit of 60 days.

SHE BEATS BEAR WITH PAN.

Kaslo Maid Resists Embraces of Friendly Bruin.

Kaslo, B. C.—As Miss Maggie McKenzie was returning home from her downtown place of business carrying a sash in her hand, a young bear in an apple orchard barred her progress to the house, which is a mile from the postoffice. The young woman did not want to go back and neither did the bear, which advanced and tried to give her a hug. The bear did not appear cross, and the woman backed down the hill, always facing him, and keeping out of reach of his arms, which were extended toward her. When at last the bear made an attempt to claw her she became thoroughly alarmed and belabored him soundly about the head with the sash until he turned and ran to the woods while Miss McKenzie fled in the opposite direction.

Monterey Has Bread Famine. Monterey, Mexico.—This city of 66,000 inhabitants is in the midst of a bread famine, owing to the strike of bakers, and is practically subsisting on tortillas. Thirty of the more important bakeries have closed. The strikers want increased wages.

JURY FIXES BLAME FOR WRECKED TRAIN

The Dalles, Ore., July 20.—One of the most complete and thorough investigations ever conducted by a coroner's jury came to an end last night when Frank P. Phillips, William Vogt, Henry H. Smith, Harrie S. Oliver, J. S. Fine and Frank Gardiner, the jurors impaneled by Coroner C. N. Burget to investigate the Oregon Trunk wreck on July 19, which caused the deaths of seven people, reported their findings, holding Engineer Thomas Myles, Conductor Cass, Assistant Roadmaster A. S. McCurdy and the railroad company responsible for the disaster. Coroner Burget and his jury spent nine days probing the wreck and left no stone unturned to get to the bottom of the affair. Their verdict, meets with general approval.

FIRE ON IDAHO RESERVE.

Rangers Discover Blaze from Look-out on Peak.

Wallace, Idaho.—From their lookout point from the top of Sunset peak forest rangers gave the Wallace forestry office the first fire report of the season. This blaze, discovered by means of field glasses, was located nearly 10 miles away, near the Interstate mine. On orders from the local office the fire was at once extinguished.

Lightning started a small fire on the north fork of the Coeur d'Alene river Sunday, but it was extinguished by rangers before a report reached this office.

From now until after the fire season Sunset peak, the highest point in the Coeur d'Alene forest, with an altitude of nearly 7000 feet, will be continuously occupied by rangers. With their glasses they can look over the country for 20 miles around.

Telephone connections permit an immediate report of located fires. A similar station will be established at Stevens' peak before the end of this week.

EXILED SHAH IS IN PERSIA.

Mohammed Ali Mirza Back to Regain His Throne.

Teheran, Persia.—Mohammed Ali Mirza, the exiled shah of Persia, has returned to his own land to make another bid for the throne. The former shah is now at Gumesha Tepe, a small port on the Caspian sea, near the Russian border, and it is said a Russian vessel conveyed him there. Soon after Mohammed Ali Mirza was dethroned in July, 1909, he proceeded to Russia. The Russian government undertook by protocol to keep him under strict surveillance and prevent all intrigues with others. Notwithstanding this, the deposed shah has traveled without molestation from Odessa to Gumesha Tepe, a distance of about 1500 miles. What forces Mohammed Ali has is not known.
