GIRL DIES IN TUB OF WATER.
Fifteen-months-old child is drowned while at play.
Modesto, Calif., July 22.—Margaret Menini, the 15-month-old child of Mr. and Mrs. John Menini, living in the Westport district, was drowned in a tub of water in the rear yard of her home this morning. Mr. Menini had left the child playing in the yard for a few minutes while she went into the house, and returning five minutes later found the body in a tub of water. The parents are prostrated at the death of their only child.

OBJECT TO SUNDAY BURIALS.
Undertakers at Coming Convention to Demand Day of Rest.
Stockton, Calif., July 22.—Fore-shadowing a general movement to close the cemeteries of this city to Sunday funerals, Father McLaughlin of St. Mary's church has ordered that the gates of the San Joaquin cemetery be closed on Sundays except in emergency cases. This order was put into effect some time ago and the people conformed to it without protest. Local undertakers also desire to close Rural cemetery on Sundays. B. C. Wallace, president of the California Funeral Directors' association, has signified his intention to lay the matter before the undertakers of the state when they assemble in San Francisco next month.

PASTORS COMPLETE A CHURCH IN ONE DAY.
Spokane, Wash.—Fifteen pastors in hod carriers' garb and armed with saws and hammers raised and covered the rafters and boarded the front, rear and side walls of a building for the Minnehaha Methodist Episcopal church here by working from 9 o'clock in the morning until 5 o'clock in the afternoon, with an intermission of one hour for lunch, which was served by the women of the congregation. John Ward, a journeyman carpenter directed operations and was assisted by Rev. H. E. Greening, pastor of the church. Rev. H. C. Kohr, pastor of Vincent church, flattened his forefinger in driving a nail, but continued work until the job was finished. Rev. Henry Brown, president of the Methodist Ministers' association, called to cheer the pastors, but did not assist them. The men of the cloth worked rapidly. Trained craftsmen will do the interior work and finishing and it is expected to have the building in readiness for dedication about the middle of August, when pastors from all over the Pacific Northwest will be in attendance.

Forest Fires Under Control.
Medford, Ore.—Three forest fires on Elk creek, Beaver creek and near Brown's cabin, some distance from Prospect, are now under control. The fire situation here is good compared

with what it was last year at this time but Supervisor Ericson is placing his forces advantageously and is preparing for the worst. The late rains have delayed the fire season considerably.

19 HELD, 24 WANTED, AS RESULT OF GIRL'S STORY.

Special Grand Jury Finding Results in Wholesale Series of Arrests in Peru, Ill.

Peru, Ill.—Nineteen Peru men have been arrested and Sheriff Mischke and his deputies are in search of 24 others as a result of the finding of a special grand jury called by Judge Eldredge at Ottawa after hearing the story of Flora Bell Todd, a 14-year-old miss of this city.
The girl was arrested on a charge of delinquency and when brought in to court for trial told a tale of such startling nature that Judge Eldredge immediately called in a special grand jury to investigate the matter.
This jury has returned indictments against forty-three Peru men, many of whom are married and have children older than the little girl whose story has startled the entire county. Nineteen of these men have been arrested and it is expected that the sheriff will have the others in custody by Monday. Some have left for parts unknown.
The greatest indignation prevails in the community and close to a score of divorce suits are expected to be one of the results.

INNOCENT MAN IS FREED.

Convicted of Murder, Served a Year, When Another Confesses.
Phoenix, Ariz.—Governor Sloane signed the parole of Harry Joss, committed to the territorial prison nearly a year ago to serve a life sentence after having been convicted on circumstantial evidence of having killed another Indian, Rex Chiquita, near Globe.
