NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

Lostine Seeks Laborers.
La Grande, Ore.—The contractor in charge of constructing the Lostine water system is advertising for 40 laborers before he can commence work.

Farmers' Union Gets Grain Bags.
Farmington, Wash.—The farmers' union has received 110,000 grain bags from the Kerr-Gifford Grain company of Portland, Ore.

New Paper at Colville.
Colville, Wash.—Alonso Melville Doty, editor of the Statesman-Index, launched the Colville Daily Bulletin, a 4-column quarto newspaper.

Sells First Wheat at Endicott.
Endicott, Wash.—The first wheat of this season's crop was sold to T. H. Lordson of the Pacific Coast company by R. L. Vannice, Mr. Vannice selling 7000 sacks and the price received was 70 cents.

Loses Fingers Under Saddle.
Whitebird, Idaho.—Billy Hill of Joseph lost the index and middle fingers of his right hand while riding. The clinch loosened and when he grasped the saddle horn to tighten it the rope lacerated his fingers.

Weiser Stores Are Burned.
Weiser, Idaho.—Fire destroyed the stock and fixtures of the millinery and dressmaking establishment of Mrs. M. M. Baker and daughter. Everything in the building was destroyed. The stock was insured for \$1200, which will nearly cover it. The tobacco stock of Robinson's cigar store next door was badly damaged. It was insured for \$500.

La Grande Talks Commission.
La Grande, Ore.—To economize in the government of La Grande by instituting the commission form of government, 12 leading business men of La Grande will meet to take the matter under advisement. La Grande's water system is a revenue-producer as well as its police department, the records showing \$1800 receipts from this department for the first half of this year, with \$1650 paid out for this

service, making a balance on hand of \$250.

Fall of Wagon Is Fatal.
Walla Walla, Wash.—Edwin Kirkpatrick fell from a load of straw a few miles this side of Walla Walla and received such injuries when he struck the edge of a board that he died before reaching town. Kirkpatrick was working with a road crew "strawing" a stretch of road. He was brought to town in an automobile.

Pole Falls on La Grande Man.
La Grande, Ore.—John Young, who has been employed by the La Grande Light and Power company, is in the Grande Ronde hospital with both legs broken as a result of a heavy pole falling on him. Young was assisting in setting poles at the junction of Union and Cove lines when his pole broke, letting the heavy pole fall.

Tipton Guilty at Dayton.
Dayton, Wash.—Interest was paramount here in the trial before the superior court of the alleged horse thieves, Joseph and John Tipton, father and son. The horses were taken from the ranch of Charles Pentecost, a rancher living near Starbuck. The animals were found in the possessions of the Tiptons near Heppner, Ore., some weeks after. After less than half an hour the jury brought in a verdict of guilty.

San Francisco.—Within half an hour after the announcement that the Panama exposition site had been selected, testified before the police commission that a \$50,000 peanut combine had been formed to control the sale of peanuts at the exposition. As a result of the showing, the new weights and measures ordinance probably will provide that nuts and fruits shall be sold by weight. It was asserted at the hearing today that a similar combine at the Seattle fair enforced a rule that only 13 goobers should be sold for a nickel.

FURIOUS STORM AT MEDFORD.

Thousands of Dollars' Worth of Fruit Destroyed in Oregon Town.
Medford, Ore.—Destroying thousands of dollars' worth of fruit and blowing down a number of flimsy structures, an unprecedented storm

raged here.

There was a furious wind and the Medford opera house was twice lifted off its foundation by the force of the hurricane, windows were broken by flying objects and wires were blown down, leaving the city in darkness for two hours.

FROM PRISON TO ALTAR.

Bride, an Actress, and Bridegroom, Broke Released to Marry.
Cincinnati, Ohio.—John W. Maines, 29 years old and a bookkeeper of New York, and Frances Stokes, an actress, were married here after Safety Director Small and others raised money to enable them to buy a license.

Maines was released from the workhouse by Judge Hunt of the common pleas court, that he might wed, and Mr. Small released Miss Stokes. Maines was sent to the workhouse recently on a charge of selling a ring, the value of which, it is charged, he misrepresented, and in response to his appeal the actress-sweetheart came to Cincinnati to help him. Her arrest as a suspicious character followed. The bride says she was formerly a member of Henrietta Crossman's company.

FROM PAUPER'S GRAVE.

Body of Former Countess Is Taken Up and Reburied.

Denver, Colo.—Once laid in a pauper's grave at Troy, N. Y., the body of Countess Margaret Van Der Pant, formerly a New York social favorite, has been exhumed and given burial by her Denver niece, Mrs. George D. Hawkins. The countess succumbed to infirmity and disease at the beginning of the present heated term. She was penniless and her body was given hasty burial, with only a number to mark her grave. Her Denver relative was advised of this and at once sent money to Troy to pay all necessary expenses.

ACCUSED OF POISONING WIFE.

Woman Has Been Unconscious for About Two Weeks.

Sebring, Ohio.—On a charge of poisoning his wife, Arthur Sturgess, 35, is under arrest here. No motive has been discovered. Sturgess was taken before Mayor Richard Jones last night, who ordered the prisoner held pending the outcome of the woman's illness. Mrs. Sturgess has been in an unconscious condition about two weeks.

DYING MAN'S AIM DEADLY.

Arizona Deputy, Fatally Wounded, Kills Outlaw Who Shot Him.

Clifton, Ariz.—After having been fatally wounded, John D. Barnett, Chief Deputy Sheriff of Clifton, shot and killed Ben Palomont in a duel here. Barnett expired in a few minutes.

The duel followed an attempt by Barnett to arrest Palomont, who a short time previously had taken a revolver from Frank Ringgold, another deputy, and beaten the latter into insensibility.

JILTED MAN KILLS SELF.

Brother Marries Girl to Whom He Was Engaged.

Los Angeles.—Coming from San Francisco two days ago to present a handsome diamond ring to the girl to whom he was engaged to be married, Fred Schable found that she had been married two weeks to his brother.

Last night, as he was being taken to jail for an attempt to kill his brother, Al, he sent a bullet into his breast and will probably die. The revolver with which he attempted suicide was bought with the proceeds of the pawning of the ring.

LEARNING SHE IS HEIRESS, NURSE IS UNPERTURBED

Macon, Ga.—While nursing the sick wife of Mr. Lott Lawton last night, Miss Blanche Jackson, a very pretty and attractive graduate nurse, was suddenly apprised by a lawyer, who came here from New York, especially to see her, that she had been left an estate of \$600,000 by an uncle who died last month in New York City. Unperturbed by even this astounding intelligence, she proceeded to sit at the bedside throughout the night, and when daylight came to day she went to her room and calmly went to sleep.

Miss Jackson will leave in a few days for New York, where the vast estate will be turned over to her. She is an orphan girl, who has been working her way as a nurse.

When asked by a newspaper reporter how she felt, now that she was so suddenly enriched, she said that she felt like her breath had been taken away.

"I'm going to remember all of my friends," she stated. "Being rich is not going to change me a bit." Miss Jackson lives with Mr. and Mrs. P. H. Gambrell, on Hardman avenue.

BREAKS IN CHURCH TO WORSHIP ALONE

New Orleans.—New Orleans police are on the lookout for a mysterious and wary person who prefers to enter St. Patrick's church after the doors are locked, light the candles on the altar and worship all by himself. Four times within less than a week Sexton Frank Bentz has been surprised after he had made his last rounds for the night to find the altar candles ablaze. Last night the sexton discovered the lights again and saw the shadowy form of a man moving about, disappearing before the police arrived.

That the mysterious worshiper is not bent upon theft is the belief of Father Raymond Garra, as several money boxes in the church have not been molested.

AT THE PICTURE SHOWS

1. "Juarez After the Battle." Mexico Kalem. The first motion picture ever made of a besieged city directly after the battle. The illustration of a fight for municipal ownership of water-works by the women of the town and the difficulties which beset the owner of the paper when he refuses to print suffragette items because the political boss told him not to do it. There is plenty of life in this picture and is full of legitimate comedy situations.

4. "Boil Your Water." Pathe. This film is a microscopic examination of a drop of stagnant water. The scientist's assistant is seen getting some water from a nearby stream, then in the laboratory the chemist makes a slide, utilizing a drop of this water. As he examines it under the microscope the things he sees are thrown upon the screen. Among the things shown is the germ that causes typhoid fever; also a diptera, an ostracoda, which wriggles most delightfully. Also a ratifer who is noted principally for his peculiar method of spinning. Another is the copepoda, carrying her eggs which resemble bunches of grapes. The ostracoda meanders along by means of a spiral spring which he seems to release and thus shoot himself into space. Finally the scientist boils the water and shows it clear and health giving.

The pictures adorned Goodwin's office during the Rawhide mining boom, three years ago and were sold to satisfy a judgment against Goodwin's mining company.

Will Return Souther.

Sacramento, Cal., July 27.—Governor Johnson honored yesterday the requisition papers of the governor of Oregon, who asks for the return to Portland of W. G. Souther, who is wanted for embezzlement. The request was first made last May but was delayed on account of Souther, who was ill in a hospital in San Francisco. Within a few days when a state agent came from Portland to obtain custody of another prisoner, he visited Souther at San Francisco and then made application to the governor for Souther's extradition. While the papers have been issued it has not been decided whether Souther will be taken to Portland at once or not. The final decision will depend upon the recommendations made by Souther's physicians.
