WOMEN DECLINE JURY SERVICE

Sheriff at Ritzville Summons Them, But They All Send Regrets.

Ditzville, Wash.—Luis Bishop and May King of Lind were before justice of the Peace Harry Grimes on a charge of selling fishy without a license and before Judge O. R. Holcomb of the superior court on a charge of vagrancy. The first jury of women ever drawn in the county was called to try the case in the justice court. The law which makes women eligible to serve on a jury makes it the duty of the sheriff to inform them when he summons them that they need not serve unless they so desire. Each of the women declined to serve.

The following women were drawn for the jury: Mrs. L. N. McCollom, Mrs. Tilla McGrath, Mrs. Edith Gilson, Mrs. George McCollom, Mrs. A. R. Pettijohn and Miss Gale Thompson. After the jury refused to act a plea of guilty was entered by both of the defendants and they were fined \$20 each and costs.

THINK GARDINER IS INSANE.

Man Who Killed His Wife Watched in Ellensburg Jail.

Ellensburg, Wash.—T. H. Gardiner the traveling preacher who murdered his wife with a club and afterwards attempted to commit suicide, has been under observation in the county jail here for the last week by Dr. John M. Semple of the eastern Washington hospital for the insane, and according to Dr. Semple is probably insane. Gardiner has been irrational ever since he has been confined in the jail, and his made repeated attempts to commit suicide. Last week he set fire to his beard and ate several matches.

The man professes no remorse for his crime and says that he wants to be sent to the insane asylum in order to escape the hangman's noose.

STOVE EXPLOSION BURNS HOME

Hatwal Creek Residents Barely Escape With Clothing.

Lewiston, Idaho.—Escaping only with the clothing they were wearing the family of E. G. Dickson, a farmer, living on Hatwal creek, northeast of Lewiston, were compelled to stand powerless and watch their home and its contents consumed by fire, which originated in the kitchen from the explosion of an oil stove used in canning fruit.

HIGH COST OF LIVING? ON 26 CENTS A WEEK

Geo. Ward, Connecticut's Aged Pedestrian, Says It's Sinfulness to Spend More Than That Amount for Food.

Middleton, Conn.—To prove that a man can live comfortably and be healthy, happy and strong on a total outlay of 26 cents a week for food, George H. Ward, 73 years old, the champion long distance walker of Connecticut, has invited the daubing editor of the New Britain Herald to be his guest for one week on the 26 cent plan.

Mr. Ward's menu is a simple one, but that there is virtue in it is proved by his past walking feats. For the past three years he claims to have eaten nothing but cereals, potato chips, crackers and peanut butter, the latter of which he terms "the new staff of life."

By request he wrote down his menu for last week as follows: Oatmeal, 12 cents; crackers, 5 cents; peanut butter, 4 cents; flour, 2 cents; tea, 3 cents; total, 26 cents.

Mr. Ward is as hale and hearty as a healthy boy of fifteen and he has the rugged glow of youth. His step is elastic and all his faculties in good condition. A year ago he walked from Middletown to New York and back in five hours, eating nothing on the way but one-half pound of peanut butter and one-half pound of crackers.

He has issued a challenge in vain to any of the young men of the vicinity to join him in walking 500 miles in ten days on a cracker diet. Mr. Ward says if the New Britain editor accepts his invitation to board with him a week he will make a new man out of him in that short time and all on twenty-six cents.

ASKS FRIENDS TO MAKE MERRY AT FUNERAL

New York.—Before Carl Schietter, 55 years old, a broken down music master, took his life by hanging himself in the modest little furnished room he occupied for many years on the top floor of the house at 14 Fayette street, Williamsburg, he made arrangements that his friends have a "good time" the day of his burial.

Pinned to his body when found by Mrs. Mary Hoffman, his landlady, was the following note:

"Good bye, old friends of other days. We have had our last good time together. When you next hear from me I will be across the Great Divide, but don't worry, old friends, for I have arranged that you all have a good fashioned German time the day these weary bones of mine are being laid away beneath the summer soil.

"A fraternal order owes me \$50.—when I am dead, you boys are going to have a time on part of that eighty. I have instructed Mrs. Deodd of No. 1447 De Kalb avenue, Brooklyn, to look after my burial, but only \$55 is to be spent on me; the other \$25 is for you boys to have a good time. Take the \$25, go to Labor Lyceum, drink and be merry. Be sure the good time is on the day of my funeral. Sing all the German songs I loved. Don't mourn."

AT THE PICTURE SHOWS

The Orpheum.

Biograph feature for Sunday and Monday.

1. "Her Sacrifice." Biograph. Never condemn, even though appearances may be convincing. The young son of a wealthy Mexican widow falls in love with a poor girl and she returns his love. The mother, finding the efforts to break his attachment for the girl futile, appeals to her, showing that by such an alliance the boy would lose his name, his high honor, trying to prove that if she really loved him she would give him up. Accordingly she feels attachment for a former sweetheart and the man leaves her in anger. As soon as he departs she spurs the other, who sees that she loves the young man, so follows him with sinister men. She follows and throws herself between them in time to receive the fatal shot. Her only recompense was her dying in his arms, he now knowing the extent of her love for him.

2. "Transportation in Siam." Pathé. In this finely colored picture the two chief carriers of Siam are shown—they are elephants and bullock carts. The film is interesting and ends with a race between these two bullock carts.

3. "The Sublime Fardoun." Pathé. This film is beautiful, not only because of very good acting and artistic settings, but the players are graceful and pleasing. It is photographed perfectly.

4. "The Little Rebel." Lubin. This is a dandy story of love with scenes laid during the civil war. The main action occurs in the southern mansion occupied temporarily by a detachment of northern officers. A lieutenant falls in love with a fair southern girl who lives with her mother in the mansion. At the sacrifice of his own reputation he shields her when she is accused of treachery. But not a sign does she give of being thankful to the young officer who worships her. Does he marry the fair southern maiden? Well, just see the last scene. The story throbs with real love interest.

5. "Easter Babies." Vitaphone. When little Dot and little Tot hear about the Easter eggs the stork and the Easter bunnies, they are very anxious to be the possessors of a little baby brother and sister. They start out shopping for Easter eggs which they find in a shop window and which they purchase. They take the eggs home, then go out on the street

and kidnap a little white and colored baby whom they place in the eggs and cover with the lid to bring about the proper results. Their mother and father come in the room very much amused at their efforts and notions, but imagine their parents' surprise when they open the lids of the Easter eggs and discover the infantile study in black and white. One year later the stork visits the home of Dot and Tot, bringing them a real live little brother and sister.

"Tested by the Flag." Vitaphone. A story of love and war. A victor in the first is a hero in the second. He stands by his colors and the girl of his choice rallies under the same standard. Miss Story makes a pretty heroine. The early scenes are in New York. The heroine has difficulty in choosing between her two lovers. One is a lieutenant and ordered to the Philippines, where he leads an infantry charge against a galling gun. The other stays at home and is accepted by the girl. He evidently doubts the depth of the lady's sentiment for he steals the hero's letter to her which says that he is on his way home. For some reason he also hates the flag. The hero returns and proves him a villain. He is compelled to kiss the flag and then is dismissed. The setting gun scene is thrilling.

"The Taming of the Shrew." Shakespeare's greatest farce. Perfectly presented by acknowledged stars.

The story: Baptista a rich merchant of Padua, has two daughters, both of whom he wishes to see happily married. But as Katherine, the elder, is of a particularly shrewish nature, he states that no one can marry Bianca, his younger daughter, until Katherine has found a mate. Detractors, a spirited young nobleman, learns of Katherine's great beauty and ungovernable temper. He resolves to win her as his bride and to master her tyrannical will with which the whole community is familiar. Under his excellent training she soon develops into an ideal wife.

"Rescued in Time." Lubin. A heart-stirring picture of love on the frontier. The pretty widow has two lovers, the one who is a villain is rejected. The plot leads through a dozen exciting incidents. The villain pushes away from the bank the rowboat in which the widow's little girl is sitting and it is with difficulty that the child is rescued.

"The Way of the Transgressor." Seawoman and child are made happy.

"The Stranger's Plate." Powers. A poor Indian comes to a settler's cabin and is nursed back to health. The mother and daughter refuse to have him set at the table, though the father pleads for him. So the father gives him a big basket of food and sends him away.

The girl is captured by Indians and is sold at auction. The Indian who was befriended buys her and brings her home, and no place is too good for him, no honor too great.

"Air Bubbles." Ambrosio. A novelty in pictures, with an unusually fine and fresh idea, exquisitely colored and with a story of such beauty that it leaves a powerful impression. The bad boy, blowing soap bubbles, sees in the bubbles visions of his future life filled with shame and disgrace, while his mother dies broken hearted. Repentant he hurries back to home he had left and his dear old mother, who receives him with joy. It's a gem.

"Twistedwood Is Late." Ambrosio. The poor fellow was late to his wedding; vainly he tried by horse, motor car and other ways to arrive on time. Finally determined to be married, he is spliced to a washerwoman. Good comedy.
