There have been many theories advocated for the cure of the divorce evil, but it remained for Judge DeLacy to urge the "Love Wave" method. These waves, he it understood, have no connection with any other kind of wave known to science—they are extra-material and highly sensitized. By them, according to his honor, a man can win back the lost love of his wife and a wife can force her spouse to care for and love her even in the face of numerous and even more attractive affinities.

"Use a little mental suggestion on your wife if you want to win her back after she has ceased to love you," is the theory of the judge, recently expounded during the course of a non-support case in which the husband claimed that his wife had stopped loving him. CAR MEN'S NARROW ESCAPE

Kill a Child and Mob Nearly Runs Over Them.

New York.—Three year old Morris Goldberg, weakened by a seven days fast, was run over by a trolley car in front of his home.

Two thousand persons thereupon stormed the car, captured the motor-man and conductor, laid them on the tracks and were about to run the car over them when a lone policeman seized the ringleader at the controller. Reserves then dispersed the mob. It was ascertained later that the entire Goldberg family of nine were in a starving condition.

WATER FAMINE IN EAST.

Charlotte, N. C., Reservoir Empty and Sewer System Abandoned.

Charlotte, N. C.—With the big ponds which have furnished Charlotte's water supply for many years, mere stretches of sun-baked mud, and the stop cocks to the small supply in the reservoir shut down tight since Friday, this city is undergoing a period of serious distress.

The danger of disease and fire is growing every hour.

No rain of consequence has fallen in this city for weeks. With the famine of water the sewer system has been abandoned and this has brought about such a menace to health that stringent sanitary regulations have been adopted.

HONOR STIMSON AT SAN JUAN.

Secretary of War is Guest at Governor's Palace.

San Juan, P. R.—Governor and Miss Colton gave a reception at the palace in honor of the American secretary of war, Henry L. Stimson. The secretary today made an inspection of the irrigation work in the Guayama district and the Cayey military post. The American visitors were entertained at Jajome Alto, the governor's mountain home. There will be a review of troops tomorrow and the secretary expects to have a long conference with Governor Colton on Porto Rican affairs.

SEES HIS FIANCÉE DROWN.

Young Man Nearly Loses Life in Rescue Effort.

Vancouver, Wash.—Miss Eva Trombley and Frank X. Thibodeau, her uncle, were drowned in Bachelor slough, near Ridgefield, and George Young, affianced of the young woman, nearly lost his life in attempting to rescue them. Young is still in a precarious condition. Thibodeau was a well-known business man in this city. The drowning occurred in plain view of nearly a score of friends who were on a picnicking excursion.

After luncheon several of the party went in bathing. Miss Trombley being the first to enter the water. Within a few seconds she got beyond her depth, and Thibodeau went to her assistance. The drowning girl drew her uncle under water just as Young swam up to them. Thibodeau gripped Young and drew the young man under water, where Young struggled to free himself. When Young was almost exhausted a fisherman who had seen the accident and had hurried to the place in his boat pulled alongside and lowered a rope to who was drawn with Thibodeau still grasping him, to the surface. As Young was being pulled into the boat Thibodeau's body broke away and sank. Neither body has been recovered.

Gustave Ellison, a bridge worker was also drowned while fishing in Bachelor slough, seven miles north of here.

PARK BEARS ON RAMPAGE.

Tear Cage Bars Loose, Are Finally Subdued by Streams of Water.

San Francisco.—The presence of mind of Policeman Mangan of the park police station saved several hundred visitors to Golden Gate Park from a stampede and perhaps from serious injury when two vicious bears in the pits on the south drive came near making their escape from their cages.

The beasts had pulled loose one of the bars of their prison and were endeavoring to get through when Mangan was called to the scene by the cries of a hundred men, women and children who had been watching the bears.

With a shove Mangan beat back the bears. At one point one of the brutes wrested the shovel from his hands. They growled and snapped at him and tried to drive him away. In the meantime the spectators had fled to a safe distance.

For fifteen minutes Mangan guarded the broken place in the den until a park attaché came to his assistance. The attendant then secured a hose and turned on the water. With the stream of water Mangan and the attendant finally drove the bears into another cage and locked them in. Yesterday the broken bars were mended. The two bears which came near making their escape are two of the most vicious in the park zoo.

ARREST IS SOUGHT AS AID TO HEALTH

San Francisco.—William G. Souther, a real estate dealer of Portland, was arrested here yesterday after a court proceeding of the most unusual character.

Some months ago, following a family disagreement as to the method in which he had handled certain properties of an aunt, Mrs. Caroline Dunlap, he was indicted by a grand jury of Portland and arrested here while he was on his way south in the hope of curing a tubercular trouble.

Upon a showing that he was too ill to be taken north the sheriff and district attorney of his county, who were here, refused to take the responsibility of taking him on the journey.

At the suggestion of Attorney John T. Williams, whom Souther retained, a fugitive warrant was sworn to here, and yesterday, Souther's condition having somewhat improved, he surrendered himself to Detective Cashel and Webb of the Central police station, having previously secured bail from Judge Weller. He is not a fugitive, but his unusual proceeding was resorted to that the records of the Portland office might be protected, and the man be in someone's custody pending the outcome of the battle for health.

Souther's story is that his aunt went to Europe, leaving some eight hundred blank checks in his possession, and that he managed her property while she was gone. One of his transactions, he says, did not please her upon her return, and the arrest followed. He is charged with "larceny by receiving by bailor," the amount in dispute being some \$6,000.

ICEBERG LIKE SHIP.

Huge Effigy of Hudson's Half Moon Is Seen at Sea.

New York.—A vision in ice of Hendrik Hudson's famous "Half Moon" as she is to have looked when she sailed up the Hudson river years ago was sighted by the passengers on the steamer Nieuw Amsterdam.

The iceberg was 400 feet long and 165 feet high and so near were the passengers to it that some of them claim they could make out the icy figure of a man at the tiller.

Even the masts and deck gear were clearly outlined and Captain Roggeveen remarked that it was the strangest of the many strange icebergs he had seen at sea.

\$10,000,000 FOR TOLLERS.

Austria Will Advance Money for Building Model Dwellings.

Vienna.—To remove the congestion in small apartments the ministry of public works issued a decree providing for loans aggregating \$10,000,000 for the erection of workmen's dwellings. The money will be advanced to local authorities, building associations and contractors to acquire land on which to erect suitable buildings or to adapt existing houses to new purposes.

Negroes to Go to Africa.

St. Louis.—Plans for an "On to Africa Congress" to be held in this city a little more than a year hence, August 4, 1912, are now well under way. Negroes all over the country have become interested in the congress, which has for its principal object the colonization of American colored people in Africa.

According to Isaac B. Atkinson, president of the congress, millions of negroes are anxious to return to the African fatherland. Such schemes as have been broached before contemplated the forcible expulsion of the colored people, and they have naturally rebelled. Now that the prospective exodus is in the hands of people of their own race and is a matter of free choice, the negroes are said to be enthusiastic.

Atkinson says he thinks the congress will result in the removal of five million people from the United States to Africa. This would involve about one-half of the colored population of the country. An executive committee has been appointed to confer with the English, French and German governments, which own vast tracts in Africa. It is believed that these governments would be willing to loan money on long terms to pay the expense of the African exodus and for preliminary development of the country by a civilized people, which would make it of vastly more worth to the powers. The movement originated with the negroes of Oklahoma, who allege that they have been disfranchised by the "grandfather amendment," and is rapidly spreading all over the country.

It is understood that representations regarding the congress and its purposes will be presented before the Universal Races Congress, which began its first international session in London yesterday.

BIGGEST SHIP PLANNED.

London, July 24.—The plans for the new steamer Aquitania, which the Cunard company is building at Clyde Bank, have been changed to make the vessel the largest in the world.

Her length will exceed 900 feet and be ten feet greater than the length of the 50,000 ton liner Imperator which the Hamburg-American line will put into service in the spring of 1913.

It is also stated that the Aquitania will be one knot faster than her German rival.

He gives himself up to the person that the reward may be given to her to save her home. The man is proved innocent and freed. This play gives a decided tug at one's heart strings. It is a very worthy play, convincing and effective.
