\$35,000 IS PAID FOR FAMOUS RACE HORSE

Second, Historic Pool of King Edward's First Derby Winner Sold at Auction.

London.—Sceptre, the famous mare belonging to Sir William Bass, was disposed of at the Newmarket Bloodstock sales for \$35,000. The purchasers were Messrs. Somerville and Rupert Tattersall, and the price paid was appreciably lower than was expected. Much turf history could be written of the wonderful performance of this mare. She was by Persimmon King Edward's first Derby winner of 1896.

On the death of the late Duke of Westminster, the famous Eton stud and horses in training were dispersed at a memorable sale at Kingsclere on which occasion Flying Fox, the Derby winner of 1899, was sold for \$157,500. Sceptre, then a yearling, made the record price for yearlings of \$50,000 being sold to Mr. R. S. Slevier. She ran three times as a two-year-old, and won twice. As a three-year-old she captured four of the five classic races, a feat never previously performed by a mare.

MUSIC FOR CONVICTS.

Orchestra Director Appointed at Atlanta Federal Prison.

Atlanta, Ga.—Believing that music has the power to work a reformation in the hearts of convicts, the United States department of justice is trying an experiment at the Atlanta federal prison. J. P. Matthiessen, of Atlanta, a director of several orchestras in the city and a composer, has recently been appointed by Attorney General Wickersham to take charge of the musical feature of the prison work.

For some time past there has been an orchestra at the prison, but there was no trained man to lead it. The men were so deeply interested in the work of the orchestra, however, and it seemed to give them so much pleasure that Warden Moyer believed it would eventually aid at least in bringing them to a better life. With this end in view he asked for the appointment of an orchestra leader.

OIL STREETS HURT EYES.

Connecticut Towns Report Curious Disease of Eyelids.

South Norwalk, Conn.—A puzzling eye disease, which is widespread in Connecticut towns this summer, is said by physicians to be caused by the use of oil on the streets.

The eyelids of those affected turn a yellowish color and the lashes fall out. Trolley motormen are the most frequent sufferers in this city.

More than 100,000 gallons of oil have been placed upon the streets here this summer.

ROCKEFELLER'S WEALTH A BURDEN DESTROYING ZEST

Cleveland, Ohio.—John D. Rockefeller admitted that great wealth was a burden and destroyed real zest of life and banished peace from the heart. He confessed it to the Rev. Carter Helm Jones of Oklahoma City following a sermon at the morning services of the Euclid Avenue Baptist church. Dr. Jones was supplying the pulpit in the absence of the regular pastor, the Rev. W. W. Bustard.

During the sermon the Oklahoma minister alluded to the "coronation crown of kings." He followed this up by a reference to the "crown of wealth and its incident anxieties and mental tortures."

Mr. Rockefeller listened intently to the pastor's words. He even leaned forward in his pew so as not to miss a single phrase.

"That was one of the best sermons I have ever heard in my life," said Mr. Rockefeller to the minister at the conclusion of the services. "Your words were full of solemn truth. Indeed, I was deeply interested."

"The coronation crowns of kings are all too heavy," said Dr. Jones. "This is evidenced in royalty throughout Europe. In like manner the crown of wealth is much too burdensome. In fact it is so heavy that all who wear it complain of its weight and eventually find that its burden takes real satisfaction out of life and banishes peace from the heart."

WOMEN IN POLITICAL CLUB. Walla Walla Wives Will Meet in Judge Drenth's Court.

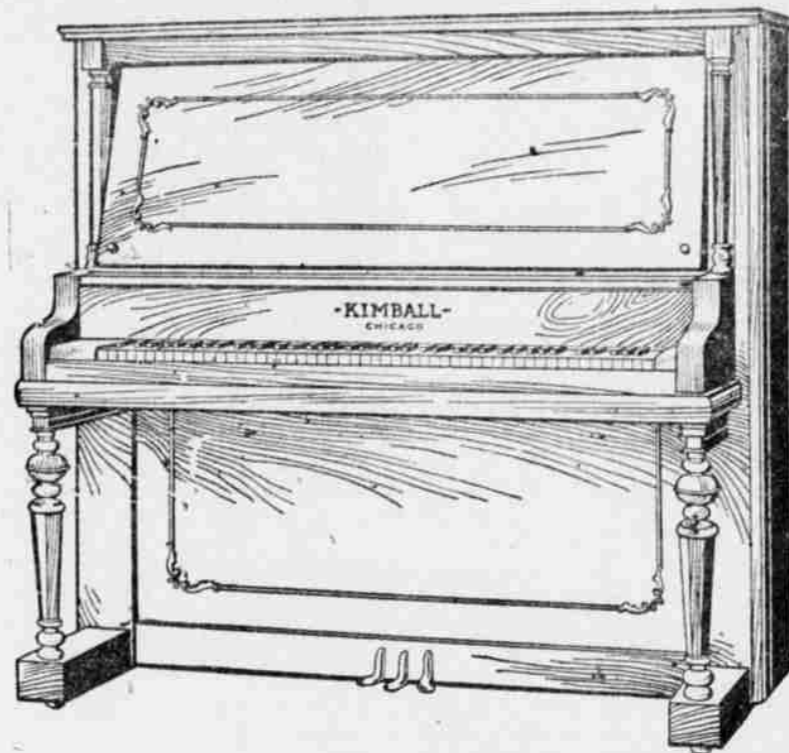

ONCE ESCAPED MURDER.

His escape then came under circumstances distressingly sad.

Unknown to any one, his elder brother became insane. His mania was of the murderous sort. The diseased mind conceived the plan of doing away with all the members of the family except the father. In pursuance of the plot the maniac invited his mother, his sister and Tristram to accompany him for a walk in the woods near the Indian Harbor hotel.

When the family assembled for the walk Tristram was not to be found. He had heard of a baseball game to be played and had quietly made his way to the grounds.

After searching in vain for his boy brother, the maniac accompanied his mother and sister to the woods. In the seclusion of the forest he stepped behind them and killed both with a revolver. Then he blew out his own brains.

SQUANDERS LEGACY; DIES.

Young Man's Heritage Leads Him to the Poor Farm.

Newcastle, Ind.—Burt Wilkinson, age 29, died at the county farm after squandering his inherited wealth. Wilkinson was born in Greensboro township, southwest of this city. His father owned a large farm and when he died, about fifteen years ago, Wilkinson inherited a sum of money. The boy, who had seen only life on a farm, started "to see some of the world and participate in the whirl." In a

few months he became the Beau Brummel of this section.

His wife obtained a divorce in the Henry circuit court and got possession of his two children.

Wilkinson was found recently dodging imaginary enemies and hunting things that existed only in his imagination. His condition became such that he was removed to the county infirmary so that he could get better attention.
