NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

Man Murdered; Wife Beaten.
Libby, Mont.—Joseph Cechlovsky, Sr., this afternoon was murdered by an unknown man, and his wife was beaten into insensibility at their home at Ripley, five miles east at Libby.

Chinese Plead Guilty.
Walla Walla, Wash.—Lee Gee and Seld Wing, Chinese proprietors of a restaurant and noodle joint, respectively, pleaded guilty to selling liquor on Sunday and were fined \$60 and costs each.

House Supt. Resigns.
Salem, Ore.—J. M. Garrison, who was appointed superintendent of state house grounds by Secretary of State Ben Olcott several weeks ago, tendered his resignation and George H. Dunsford was appointed in his place.

Vale Oats Seven Feet High.
Vale, Ore.—That some of the wheat fields in Malheur county will yield as high as 75 bushels an acre is the statement of C. W. Thebaud, who has a ranch three miles from this town. He declares that oats stands seven feet high on his place.

Asotin, Wash.—A. R. Arledge and wife of Big Trails, Wyo., are in Asotin on a visit to Mrs. Arledge's brother, S. G. Peters. This brother and sister last met in Colorado 37 years ago.

Two Teppenish Houses Burned.
Tuppenish, Wash.—Fire destroyed two houses, one a single story and the other of two stories, owned by John McKane and located in McKane's addition. The loss was covered by insurance. Origin of the fire is unknown.

Children, Matches and Hay.
Benge, Wash.—Children, some matches and a pile of hay played equal parts in starting a fire in Frank Benge's barn Saturday that resulted in a loss of \$2500. The barn, three horses and outbuildings were destroyed. One of the horses was a fine stallion. No insurance was carried.

Fire Danger Past.
Wallace, Idaho.—Eighty-four hundredths of an inch of rainfall in four hours in the city of Wallace and similar heavy rains in all parts of the Coeur d'Alene forest reduced fire danger in this section of north Idaho to a minimum. Supervisor Roscoe Haines said last night that he anticipated no serious fires now for at least two weeks.

Dynamiters' Plot Fails.
Baker, Ore.—The people of Richland, a small town in the Eagle valley, 40 miles northeast of this place, are wrought up over the attempt recently made to blow up the soft drink establishment of Charles Keller. Five sticks of dynamite had been placed in the building. In their haste to get away the would-be dynamiters pulled the caps out, with the result that the fuse burned, but failed to ignite the explosive.

North Coast Workman Killed.
Walla Walla, Wash.—John McCarthy, a workman at camp No. 3, of the North Coast construction on the Snake river, was instantly killed by the slipping of a wire cable guy wire, which whipped from its fastenings and tore out his eyes and crushed his face. Coroner Hennessy returned last night without deeming an inquest necessary. This is the second death on this piece of work, the other being that of an engineer who was suffocated in a coyote hole.

Fights Fire and Faints.
Dayton, Wash.—A heroic and all but futile effort was made by Mrs. Van Atkinson to put out a fire which occurred in the barn of the Atkinson ranch at Bundy hollow. Mrs. Atkinson, on discovery of the fire, being alone, immediately telephoned to the nearest neighbor and then proceeded to fight the flames. She succeeded in preventing the fire from reaching the newly harvested hay and then became unable to do anything more. When found shortly afterward by the neighbors Mrs. Atkinson was lying in a swoon on the barn floor.

Man Drowns.
Glens Ferry.—Robert Stahl, a fireman on the Short Line, running between this place and Nampa, was accidentally drowned in the Snake river here while in swimming with a number of other men. Stahl, who was a good swimmer, was evidently taken with cramps and sank before assistance could reach him.

Heroic efforts were made to recover the body, many heavy charges of dynamite were exploded in hopes it would cause the body to rise, but without avail.
Mr. Stahl was well known here and in Nampa, his parents residing in the latter place.

NORTHERN PACIFIC SAVES LAND BY BUILDING ROAD

Spokane, Wash.—Construction work is being rushed by the Great Northern Railway company on 25 miles of new line through the San Poll valley to Hellgate, across the Colville Indian reservation, northwest of Spokane, to save a valuable right-of-way, acquired by congressional grant more than 20 years ago. The race is to beat the legal procedure instituted in the federal court here by the Attorney General of the United States for the purpose of compelling forfeiture of the franchise as the terms of the original grant were not complied with by the railroad. Judge Frank H. Rudkin, sitting in the United States district court here, already has ruled that a grant of this kind can be revoked only by a congressional act. In reply the Department of Justice applied for a restraining order. This action is supplemented by a petition from the Spokane & British Columbia Railroad company, headed by W. T. Beck, which has plans to extend its Nelson-Republic line through the reservation to the city of Spokane. The Great Northern company expects to have its track laid before the action is determined.

WASHINGTON WOMEN SHY AT DOING JURY DUTY

Spokane, Wash.—Ten women drawn for jury duty at the coming term of the Spokane county superior court declare they will not serve unless compelled to do so by law. Mrs. Sarah Witherell, living at 1528 Ninth avenue, the first woman drawn for the venire, voiced the sentiments of her sisters in saying that while women should use their franchise in voting for good government she believes jury duty is a man's work. "I voted because I am a taxpayer," she added, "and because I had the right to vote." Mrs. Flora P. Atchison, 508 Shannon avenue, said: "There are certain cases where it is all right for a woman to serve on a jury, but they are scattered. I will not serve if called. My home is the place for me. I am not an advocate of the equal suffrage cause, although I think that women will be able to accomplish much good with their votes." Mrs. E. G. Hubbard, 2116 North Madison street, told her story in a few words: "I prefer to stay at home, for I think that is the woman's place."

FAINTS ON SEEING BEARD.

Hermit Looks in Glass for First Time in His Life.
Pittsburg, Pa.—Jacob Steinman, aged 85, a hermit living back of Reserve township, for the first time in his life saw himself in a mirror. He immediately fainted, and when revived ran to a barber shop and got a shave, an experience he had not had for forty years.

For the first time since he was a young man, Steinman came to town and visited his cousin, Mrs. Sarah McCune, in Perryville avenue. It was there by accident that he glanced in the mirror.
"Great, Scott!" he exclaimed and fell in a faint. When revived he remarked: "What a great change has come over me since I saw myself in a fishing pond just forty years ago." Then he seized his hat and ran to the nearest barber shop, where he was shorn of his beard, which was three feet long.

No fair or exhibition can be wholly successful if run from the amusement standpoint only. To be sure, fair visitors want amusement, must have lots of it—but in addition there must be many educational features of real value. One of the most interesting of



these demonstrations at the Spokane Interstate Fair last year was the model roads exhibit made by the Spokane County Good Roads association. This will be enlarged this year, and visitors at the fair during the week of Oct. 2 may learn much of the science of real road building at this exhibit.

In fact, there will be many more educational features in connection with the 1911 Spokane Interstate Fair than have ever been seen at one interstate fair before. Both the Washington State college and the Idaho State college have agreed to send up large exhibits, and all the Spokane educational institutions will be well represented. It has been necessary to provide new room for the Spokane schools exhibit, as they completely filled and overflowed the space allotted them last year.

Outside of the strictly educational exhibits there will be the dairy show, which will present this year a complete line of dairy machinery, including milking machines, and the apary show with all the bee and honey exhibits and paraphernalia. Down at the apary department Professor Frank G. Odell will hold forth twice daily, and the tricks he does with the bees are almost beyond belief. When he stands with a hat full of bees on his head, a quart tacked away inside his shirt next the skin and thousands crawling over his body, up his trousers and out of his collar, all the time talking like a Gatling gun about the marvels of bee life or the wonderful achievements of scientific agriculture his auditors bawl over with enthusiasm.

FRANCE NAMES LECTURERS

Prof. Diehl and Lanson to be First Sent Here Under Exchange Plan.
Paris.—The Minister of Public Instruction has delegated Charles Diehl, professor of Byzantine languages, and Gustav Lanson, professor of French literature at the Sorbonne, as the first French lecturers under the recently devised exchange scheme with American universities. They will open their courses with Harvard and Columbia, respectively, in 1912. Professor Davis of Harvard, who exchanges with Professor Diehl, will begin his course at the Sorbonne at the same time.
