FELT HIS POCKET PICKED.

But Discipline Prevented a Soldier's Stopping It.

Rome.—A good story is told to illustrate the discipline and self-control of the famous carabinieri, that ancient body of military policemen who had their origin in Piedmont and about whom so much has been said during the Camorrist trial.

The other day a company of them was drawn up outside the railway station for the arrival of a royal prince. The prince appeared at the door of the station and all hands were raised in salute when a carabinieri felt a little tug at his pocket. Then he felt another stronger pull and remembered with anguish that all his pay and hoarded wealth was in a purse in his trousers' pocket which was being insidiously attacked, having been exposed by the raising of

his arm.

What should he do? The foreign prince was just opposite and to put down his hand and not salute was unthinkable, but at the same time could flesh and blood, and an officer of the law, too, deliberately allow himself to be robbed and ruined? His desperate state of mind was shown in the trembling of that hand, which, however, stayed glued to the forehead while the precious purse was slowly and surely abstracted. At last the agonizing moment came when he felt that the pulling had stopped and knew that the thief had made off.

Fortunately the theft had taken some time, as the thief evidently was not very bold, and just as he got the coveted prize in his hand the captain of the carabinieri turned to give an order, the saluting being over, and saw what happened. The order for pursuit was given and the carabinieri

who had proved the power of discipline over human nature was the one who caught his thief and recovered his property intact.

SQUIRRELS EAT KANSAS CORN.

Order Protecting Them Is Resented by Some Farmers.

Salina, Kan.—When Prof. L. L. Dyche announced the other day that farmers and their friends who killed squirrels for the protection of the growing corn crop would be arrested, he changed the plans of number of the farmers of Salina county and a number of men in Salina who enjoy squirrel hunting. The present summer has been an unusually favorable one for young squirrels and the woods along the rivers and creeks in this county are full of them. They are becoming quite a pest and many of the farmers had invited their friends out for a hunt.

"The squirrels destroyed fifty bushels of corn for me last year," Scott Mongold, a farmer on the Smoky Hill river seven miles south of Salina, said. "They are going to do the same thing this year, only their damage will be much heavier because of the increased numbers."

"Any man is perfectly welcome to hunt squirrels on my place," said Charles H. Brown, who lives on the river five miles south of town. "There are hundreds of them in the woods and the cornfield along the river is beginning to show that the squirrels are at work almost before the corn is in the roasting ear."

THIS IS THE SAME HEN

Fowl Which Helped Build Coop Now Lights Owner's Pipe.

Tarrytown, N. Y.—The white leg-horn hen owned by John Grohan of Glenville which recently helped him build a chicken coop by holding the nails in its beak, after he had smashed his finger, has learned a new trick.

When Grohan gets home after his day's work he is very fond of sitting on the porch and enjoying his pipe. As soon as Grohan sits in his easy chair it is a signal for the hen to go into the house, get his bag of tobacco and pipe, and bring them to him.

After Grohan has filled his pipe he puts a match in the hen's beak and she scratches it across the floor and then he lights his pipe. Grohan also expects to teach the hen to put out the match.

NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

Hartline House Hit by Bolt.
Hartline, Wash.—A severe hail storm visited Hartline, doing some damage to the unharvested wheat. During the storm the house of W. E. Blake was struck by lightning, knocking out several windows and severely shocking the family.

Overdose of Morphine Nearly Fatal.
Murray, Idaho.—Mrs. M. H. Robinson of Eagle City, four miles west of Murray, took seven grains of morphine and a hurry call was sent to Dr. George S. Lester of the Murray hospital, who promptly applied a stomach pump and saved her life.

From One Seed 183 Stalks.
Palouse, Wash.—Louis Schneider, a farmer west of Palouse, has on display in a real estate office here a stool of wheat containing 183 stalks, all grown from one kernel of wheat. The yield from this one grain is considered remarkable.

Rock Fall Kills Miner.
Mullin, Idaho.—Jacob Louma, a miner, working under a raise on the 600-foot level of the Morning mine, was instantly killed here by a slab of rock falling upon him. Mr. Louma was about 30 years old and single. He lived at the Morning boarding house. He has a brother, Erick Louma, living here.

High Price for Pears.
North Yakima, Wash.—The highest price ever paid for pears in the Yakima valley, according to commission men and growers, will be received by H. H. Green and Dr. W. H. Payne of Zillah, who have contracted a carload of Bartlett pears for Alaska at \$1.85 a box, loaded in the car at Zillah. The previous record price was \$1.75 two years ago.

Lightning Struck Two at Eltopia.
Eltopia, Wash.—One of the most severe electrical storms in the history of the country raged here, Eltopia, M. Brown, working in the harvest field, was knocked down and rendered unconscious, and E. M. Johnson, working with him, was stunned. Neither was seriously injured. Some slight damage was done to the standing grain from the high wind.

Yakima Robbers Caught in Act.
North Yakima, Wash.—Three employees of the North Yakima brewery watched Martin Feelan and Frank Burkey go through the pockets of Frank Brown, lying drunk in the alley back of the brewery. A telephone call to the police brought the officers upon the scene before Mr. Feelan and Mr. Burkey had completed their labors. They were arrested and turned over to the county authorities, charged with highway robbery.

Bees Invade His Attic.
La Grande, Ore.—Threatening to take entire possession of Judge J. D. Slater's residence, at the corner of Washington and Third streets, in La Grande, a swarm of bees was discovered entering the attic through a hole which formerly accommodated a telephone wire. The bees had set up housekeeping and already are fairly well prepared for winter. Judge Slater has begun proceedings against his trespassers and offers to give the swarm to any one who will take it away.

TO DECLARE ELOPER DEAD.

Wife Wants to Realize as Widow on Life Insurance.

Allentown, Pa.—Frank Jacobs an Allentown attorney acting for Mrs. Laura L. Haas, filed a petition in the Lehigh county courts to have declared dead on November 9, 1911, at 2 p. m., her husband, Charles C. Haas. In the spring of 1903 Allentown had one of its star sensations in the disappearance of Mr. Haas, who eloped with a girl of 17, leaving practically penniless his wife with four baby daughters. The sensation was all the greater for the reason that he was looked upon as a model young man, active in church and Sunday school matters, and highly successful in his butchering business.

It was discovered upon investigation after his departure that he had the day before hurriedly realized on various assets and that he had left with about \$6000. There were rumors that he had been seen with the girl in Philadelphia, various parts of the west and in Mexico, but all these proved false clues.

The petition to the courts asks that if no news be heard of him by November 9, the missing man be declared legally dead and letters of administration on his estate be granted to the petitioner.

Having a family of daughters to support, Mrs. Haas makes this as the first move to realize on the life insurance policies of her missing husband.

SAVED FROM DEATH.

SUED FOR DIVORCE.
Woman Who Wouldn't Let Hangman Have Hubby, Won't Have Him Herself.

San Francisco.—Warden Hoyle has said that the limit of the constancy of woman is three years. In the case of Mrs. Olive May Kelly Bennett, who is now suing her husband for divorce, the constancy does not seem to have such a limit.

Mrs. Bennett is the wife of that Murray Bennett, café entertainer, who had, on a November night of last year, the extreme misfortune to kill a young hotel clerk named Terriel of the Hotel Holland by hitting him over the head in the Mirror saloon.

Mrs. Bennett came promptly to the rescue. Before she married Bennett she was the widow of a rich scion of the richhouse of Kelly, Los Angeles. She met the fascinating Bennett, café entertainer, and exchanged the name Kelly for the name Bennett.

When Bennett was in stress because of the inadvertence of the chair and Terriel's head, Mrs. Bennett came promptly to the rescue. She paid Porter Ashe \$1000 as a fee and paid expenses right and left. As a consequence it became a sort of southern gentlemen affair, where the only question was, did the hotel clerk assault the gentlemanly entertainer? Police Judge Weller, a southern gentleman, sat in the case, and so, on December 31, the press was able to say:

"On motion of the assistant district attorney, Police Judge Weller yesterday dismissed the charge of murder against Murray Bennett, a young entertainer, who was arrested for causing the death of William Terriel, clerk at the Hotel Holland on Ellis street, by striking Terriel on the head with a chair during an altercation on the night of November 21 in the Mirror saloon on Eddy street, conducted at that time by Milton Levy."

But the joy that followed this southern gentleman decision by Police Judge Weller soon suddenly to have given place to gloom, for Mrs. Bennett, having freed her entertaining husband, now wishes to get rid of him—though she hated to let the gallows do its dreadful work. She has again employed Porter Ashe, this time to bring suit for divorce, alleging cruelty.

HOUSE FLY "TYPHOID FLY," SAYS ENTOMOLOGIST

Washington, D. C.—"The insect we now call the 'housefly' should be termed 'typhoid fly' in order to call direct attention to the danger of allowing it to continue to breed unchecked," says L. O. Howard, chief of the department of agriculture's bureau of entomology, in a farmers' bulletin just issued.
