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CONDemn 26 SAILORS TO DEATH

Mutiny on Spanish Battleship Results in Courtmartial.

Madrid.—A courtmartial at Cadix condemned to death 26 men who took part in the mutiny on board the Spanish battleship Muncania while the vessel was at Tangier, Saturday. The men received communion at 9 o'clock in the morning and it is understood their execution followed immediately.

LIGHTHOUSE MAN KILLED BY DERRICK

Rotten Beam Breaks While Heather is Unloading at Destruction Island.

Astoria, Or.—John Enquest, keeper of the Destruction Island lighthouse, was killed by the breaking of a derrick while unloading coal from the lighthouse tender Heather at the island. The end of the derrick beam broke clear off, striking Enquest on the head, crushing it in a frightful manner. Death was instantaneous.

Near him at the time was Charles Moeber, second officer of the Heather and Alex Sanders, a deck hand, was unhurt. The broken timber was found to be one rotten clear through.

The body was brought here on the Heather this morning and was taken charge of by Coroner Gilbaugh. He was 35 years of age and well known in this city, and leaves a brother, Fred Enquest, who is a fisherman on the river.

FAILS TO FIND ANY CURE FOR INFANTILE PARALYSIS

Dr. Simon Flexner of New York Says It Cannot be Checked Until Doctors Learn How it is Transmitted.

Albany, N. Y.—No treatment, so far as is known, which can be regarded as a specific, or even effective, has been found in dealing with the problem of infantile paralysis, according to Dr. Simon Flexner of New York, who has been making a special study of the disease.

At a recent conference here of medical officers under the auspices of the state department of health, Dr. Flexner gave the following views in discussing infantile paralysis: "That we can succeed in determining how the disease is transmitted we cannot expect to accomplish its prevention."

"The source of entrance of the germs of this disease appears to be through the upper air passages, especially the nose."

"It would also appear that the most probable means of exit of this germ is through the nose and throat. It is therefore very important that the discharges from the nose and throats of cases suffering from infantile paralysis is promptly destroyed."

DIES AFTER BEE STINGS HIM.

Man Succumbs Half Hour After Insect Stings Him.

Dubois, Pa.—Phillip Dusch, a well-known resident of Brady township, died thirty minutes after being stung by a honey bee. Mr. Dusch went out to place a cap on a hive and was heard to call. His wife rushed to his side in time to see him fall. Before dying Dusch said he had been stung but once, and that right on the joint of the jaw. He was 62 years old.

STEALS TOBACCO: TWO YEARS

Poultry Theft Lands Californian in Folsom Prison.

Stockton, Cal.—Juan Vargas, convicted of stealing two packages of tobacco from a grocery store, was sentenced by Judge C. W. Norton of the superior court to two years in Folsom prison.

Thought a poultry theft was committed from a standpoint of value the intent to commit burglary, rather than the lack of success of the accused in his undertaking, prompted the sentence given.

PET BEAR FELS WOMAN.

Husband Knocks Brute Senseless With Scantling, Then Cuts its Throat.

Oroville, Calif.—A vicious attack was made on Mrs. Stegmiller by a pet bear raised since cubhood by Stegmiller at his home in this city.

Mrs. Stegmiller suddenly heard the bear's infuriated roar at her ear as it knocked her to the ground. The bear being chained, was able to strike her only once or twice before she rolled out of reach. Her clothing was badly torn.

Her husband knocked the bear unconscious with a scantling. Before it had recovered, Stegmiller had rushed into the house, obtained a butcher knife and cut the animal's throat.
