Philomath Creamery Burns.
Philomath, Ore.—The Alsea creamery was entirely destroyed by fire.

Wittie Pleads Guilty at Colfax.
Colfax, Wash.—Deputy Sheriff Cole returned from Portland with Otto Wittie, who is accused of stealing four horses and two sets of harness from William Sellers in October, 1909. He entered a plea of guilty and sentence was suspended.

Second Machine Burned.
Colfax, Wash.—Only a few days ago it was reported that H. C. Pope's machine went up in smoke. He purchased a new one and soon after starting it caught fire. The special agent who came with the machine was on the ground at the time. Only half a bushel of grain was lost.

Try to Leave Lewiston Jail.
Lewiston, Idaho.—An attempted jail delivery was discovered by the sheriff's force, some of the prisoners having cut away the ceiling around the ventilator, so that in a few hours more they would have been able to gain access to the attic above the cell wing, from which escape would have been comparatively easy.

Will Destroy Hooper Beer.
Ditzville, Wash.—Deputy Sheriff Dick Stockman is enroute from Hooper with half a carload of bottled beer, which has been ordered destroyed by Justice Harry Grimes. This was found at Hooper when the five arrests were made for selling intoxicating liquor in dry territory. Growing out of these cases Prosecuting Attorney John Araux has instituted two civil actions to have the buildings where the whisky was sold declared nuisances. Under the law the buildings shall be closed until the owners furnish a bond in the sum of \$1000, approved by the court, that no intoxicants will again be sold therein.

Robber Confesses.
Coeur d'Alene, Idaho.—The man who robbed the store of Suter & Son in this city June 28 and secured \$150 worth of valuables, consisting of watches, guns, knives and other articles, has been captured and has confessed the burglary. He is William Burbin, who came to this city less than six months ago and began working in the lumber mills. He has been seen often going to a shack near Huotter and of this fact the officers were informed, and taking the advice of neighbors they investigated, finding there the stolen articles and later taking the man.

Woman on Colville Jury List.
Colville, Wash.—Judge D. H. Carey and County Clerk W. Leon Johnson drew the names of 45 jurors to report for duty September 13, at which time the full term of court will convene. There will be a large criminal docket to be disposed of, including three cases of murder. One woman was drawn on the jury, Mrs. Carl Johnson of Addy, sister of Senator A. W. Anderson.

Falls From Eltopia Bridge.
Eltopia, Wash.—While working on the Northern Pacific bridge just east of town Herbert Daigle fell 17 feet backward to the bridge timbers below breaking his left leg and receiving some very bad cuts and bruises about the head; the county physician Dr. O'Brien of Pasco, was called and after treating his wounds and setting the limb he accompanied Dr. Daigle to Pasco. The injuries are very severe and the doctor says the shock sustained will be hard to overcome.

BEATS HIS WHOLE FAMILY.

Heartless Man Gets Only Six Months in Jail.

Yonkers, N. Y.—John Wayte of 1 Washington street, was sentenced to six months in jail by Acting Judge Ell for cruelty in beating his child.

In sentencing the man the court remarked that it was one of the most heartless and atrocious cases of its kind he had ever heard of. When the child, Waddick, aged 7, was stripped, Dr. A. C. Benedict found large contusions and yellow spots on the boy's back and also marks of punctures.

The police went to the Wayte home and there they found a harness strap having nails fastened in it. The boy said that this was the instrument used by his father in administering beatings, not only by his father upon him, but upon his mother and younger brother.

Mrs. Wayte is in a maternity hospital. She corroborated her son's story, but nevertheless she pleaded for clemency by the court.

It was through Waddick going into the drug store of David Ruddy that the case came before the authorities. Waddick limped past the drug store. He was asked what the trouble was and told of having been beaten. He begged some medicine to relieve his intense suffering, and when the druggist went to apply some remedy he was horrified at the condition of the boy's body and forthwith notified the police.

SENT TO PRISON BY FATE.

His Term Over, Man Has Letters Showing Jurors Drew Lots.

Wilkesbarre, Pa.—E. A. Higgins, who was convicted in the courts of this county of larceny and breaking and entering, was liberated in the Eastern penitentiary. He shows a letter purporting to be signed by the jury which convicted him, which states that he was convicted in the juryroom by fate.

The letter says that the jury was locked up on primary election day and that the jurors were anxious to dispose of the case and get to the polls. The balloting stood 6 to 6. Twelve ballots marked "guilty" and twelve marked "acquittal" then were deposited in a hat and the jurors were asked to draw.

Seven drew "guilty" blanks and five "acquittal" and the prisoner was then returned to court as guilty and sentenced.

STATUES OF PURE GOLD.

Canadian Church Will Spend \$300,000 for Biblical Group.

Quebec.—An eight foot group of statuary, with all the figures carved from solid gold, will be erected in the famous Church of Ste. Anne de Beaupre, near Quebec.

The group, with its pedestal of Carrara marble, is to cost \$300,000, all of which will be collected by the French-Canadian colony in New York city.

The figures included in the statuary are Saint Ann, the Infant Christ and the Virgin Mary. The group will be taken to Rome to be blessed by the pope, and later will be exhibited in various churches throughout the United States and Canada.

TAFT SURROUNDED BY ANTI-REFORMERS

**WILL VETO ALL TARIFF
REVISION MEASURES**

**Men Who Know What They Do and
What They Do Not Want Hover
About Chief Executive on Eve of
Action.**

(By Clyde H. Tavenner.)

Washington, Aug. 14.—Today, on the eve of the momentous occasion when President Taft must sign or veto tariff legislation of vast importance to the people, he is still surrounded by men who know exactly what they want, just as he was when he was induced to sign the infamous Payne-Adams bill.

The semi-official statement given out by the white house publicity bureau (Secretary Hughes, manager) that the president intends to veto all tariff revision which congress may send to him, indicates that the men "who know exactly what they want," whose expression coined by the late Senator Dilliver, also know what they do not want.

The president's advisers are opposed, for instance, to legislation of any kind which gives to the American tariff trust immunity from competition by virtue of which they are free to charge consumers exorbitant prices without outside interference.

Why Taft Failed.

When the history of Mr. Taft's administration is written, it is hard to win the sympathy of the people who will doubt be attributed to his selection as advisers of men who are not in sympathy with the needs of the people of the country.

Let us see who the men are, surrounding President Taft, who know exactly what "they" want; and who, through having practically a monopoly of the president's ear, have been able to deceive him and the people that he is acting the part of a statesman in his vetoes legislation of the kind that he has promised the people to secure in order to secure their votes.

"Know What They Want."

In a cabinet of 14, Taft has Secretary of State Knox, a former secretary of the navy, a former general, a former senator, a former sugar trust attorney, and secretary of Commerce and Labor, a former attorney for the water-trust (coal) trust, and company.

Then in his immediate family circle the president has brother Charles Taft, who is so constituted temperamentally and financially that he can view legislation only from the viewpoint of "big business" views; and also Brother Henry W. Taft, a member of the New York law firm of Strong and Cadwallader, which represents the sugar trust, Wall Street and the great industrial corporations.

For substantiation of any advice the president may receive from these sources, he has but to call in Senator Lippitt, Michigan's successor from another island. Mr. Lippitt is one of the millionaire beneficiaries of the struggling cotton trust, and knows exactly what he wants. Others who know what they want and upon whom the president relies are Penrose, Smoot, Guggenheim, Du Pont and the valiance of the ring of special privilege servers in the senate.

And here is a list of the men whose advice is not sought by Mr. Taft: La Follette, Clapp, Cummins, Bristow and all genuine progressive republicans.

These facts tell their own story. There is no chance for the president to do anything for the people as long as he has his present advisors.

SIRE WOOS WIVES FOR FOUR LAP SONS

Owner of 1000 Reindeer at Seattle Seeking Five Brides.

Seattle.—There will be joy on the Kuskokwim and in all probability five separate sets of wedding bells when Sarah, possessor of a thousand reindeer and four stalwart sons, comes sailing into his home harbor. The father came south to get brides for his sons.

Sarah was a member of the first expedition of Laplanders into Alaska that looked to the propagation of reindeer as a means of saving the natives of Alaska from starvation.

Sarah was happy with four young sons and a helpful wife. The wife's death set the seal of loneliness upon the family. But the herd continued to grow.

When Sarah arrived in Seattle on the schooner Abla about 10 days ago he reported that he had left 1000 of the useful animals with his four sons, who are now grown.

He intended to take back four wives for them and was not averse to re-entering the state of matrimony himself.

Today came the word from Poulsbo, across Puget Sound from Seattle, where Sarah met other natives of Lapland in the extensive Lap colony there, headed by the wealthy Johan Tornes, that the doughty match-maker had scored his first success and that Miss Anty, with her father, a native Laplander, would accompany Sarah north.

Four others are to be wooed before the well-to-do reindeer farmer leaves Seattle and he has said that he will reserve his own choice of the girls until his sons have chosen, a decision which is likely to give rise to many heart complications before his journey home is ended.

THREW CRUTCHES AND FLED.

Cripple from Birth Forgets Infamy When He Shoots Girl.

Harrisonburg, Va.—A cripple from birth, Joseph Summers, threw away his crutches, and, crazed with fright after accidentally shooting a small girl, ran in his bare feet into the country. He fled so rapidly that he has not yet been overtaken.

The child, Ruth Enawler, 5 years old, may die. The shooting occurred while Summers was cleaning a revolver, which was accidentally discharged.

Says He Drove Off Robbers.

Baker, Ore.—William Gibbons, an aged and hitherto respected citizen of Richland, a small town in the eastern part of the county, is in jail on the charge of attempting to rob the Portland Trading company's store at that place. A clerk of the store alleges that he caught Gibbons boaring a couple of holes with a brace and bit in the building occupied by the store. Gibbons claims in defense that he saw the would-be robbers, and that he had merely picked up the tools when the clerk came along. He was bound over to the grand jury, which sits in September.
