DIES DEATH HE DISCUSSED.

Man Goes to Spring, Drowns
Him in Its Waters.

Danville, Pa.—Prophetic of his own
death a few minutes later, Mark
Connelly discussed a similar tragedy
of a year ago with friends, and was
then drowned in a spring, where he
had gone for a drink.

The drowned man was found by W.
H. Buzzard, who had gone to the
spring for water. He lay on his side
at the foot of the concrete steps, with
his head in the water.

There was a deep gash in the scalp
and it is the supposition that Con-
nelly had been in the act of descend-
ing the steps when he lost his bal-
ance and fell, striking his head on
the sharp edge of the stones forming
the jamb of the door, and been ren-
dered insensible, falling in this con-
dition into the water.

Two Killed in Explosion.

Eaton Ind.—Albert Henry, 28, and
Smith Pullen, 18, employed at the
Paragon paper mills, were instantly
killed here when twin boilers in the
engine room exploded. The cause of
the explosion is not known.

BABES VIE WITH CROPS AT HERMISTON

Hermiston, Ore., Aug. 18.—The
Hermiston (Umatilla) project not only
holds records for its immense yield
of alfalfa, fruit and truck, but ac-
cording to Frank Carpenter, press
agent and C. J. Blanchard, statisti-
cian of the United States reclamation
service, in competition with thirty
other government projects, it holds
the record for producing more babies
than any other one of the project.

WOMEN ARE NEATER WORKERS THAN MEN

Boston, Mass.—Women are neater
than men, they are steadier and, al-
though they sometimes leave to get
married, they do not leave more often
than men do to seek new positions,
according to Jasper N. Kellar, presi-
dent of the New England Telephone
and Telegraph company.

In a report Mr. Kellar, who has 6,000
women in his employ, says that
his views of their usefulness in busi-
ness differ from those expressed by
some large western corporation men
who recently have decided to employ
no more girls.

Mr. Kellar says that his company's
experience in trying young men to do
the work now performed by girls on
telephone switchboards shows that
the male operators are often imperti-
nent or lazy, while the girls are al-
most invariably polite, attentive and
efficient.

FALLING WINDOW KILLS BOY.

Child Attempts to Get Into House
and Dies When Caught by Sash.

Canton Ill.—In an attempt to enter
a window to get his clothes to go to
Sunday school, Lloyd Weston, aged
