Fire Destroys Joseph Home.

Joseph, Ore.—Fire destroyed the residence of Louis Johnson. The fire was not discovered until too late to render any assistance, the family being away from home in the mountains gathering huckleberries. The loss sustained was about \$2000.

Mother Saves Her Baby.

Mesa, Idaho.—Mrs. Fred John, with her 12-months-old baby started down a flight of steps at her home. She tripped and fell headlong to the ground several feet below. She held the baby so that it was uninjured, but sustained bad bruises herself and cuts on her face.

Forest Fire Near Whitefish.

Kingsport, Mont.—In response to telephonic word that a forest fire, which started four and one-half miles west of Whitefish, had assumed threatening proportions, Warden Bourne led to combat fire fighters at Whitefish to assist the guards in extinguishing the blaze. Little apprehension is felt.

Arsonist Suspect Jailed.

Seattle, Wash.—Lloyd Karshak alias Dore, a C. was arrested in Vancouver, B. C., charged with being the head of an "arson trust" in Chicago was brought to Seattle and lodged in the city jail. Karshak said he would not fight extradition. He will be held here pending the arrival of officers from Chicago.

Egg Has Double Shell.

Newport Woman Hurt in Runaway. Newport, Wash.—Mrs. Ellen Baker

a homesteader, who resides near Priest river, was badly injured in a runaway accident near the Fidelity mill at Newport. While passing another team her horse became frightened and started to run, upsetting her buggy and throwing her out, breaking her right arm and several ribs and inflicting a scalp wound. Mrs. Baker is about 75 years old but the chances are she will recover.

Two Boys Set Shack Afire.

Beverly, Wash.—Winston Rogell and Ray Sallberg, both 5 years old, went into a shack standing open on Seattle street, which belongs to C. W. Cumstock, which is occupied by A. Gano Athey, and began to play with some matches. The little Sallberg had found a bottle which contained kerosene and poured it on the floor, then the other little had dropped a match on the oil and it immediately ignited. They got out of an open window. Mr. Athey lost all his clothing and a bed which belonged to him. The building was destroyed.

Daylight Robbery at St. John.

St. John, Wash.—At midday two men, one of them armed with a revolver, held up and robbed three harvest hands in a place known as the jungle on the banks of Pleasant valley creek, close to Leam. The victims had all been at work at Winona and had become acquainted with the men who robbed them.

Chief of Police Cummings started at once in pursuit and succeeded in capturing both of them. They gave their names as George Miller and Allen Jackson. The police here think the capture an important one and the men will be turned over to the sheriff for safe keeping.

WOMAN LAWYER TO FLX.

Mrs. Belva A. Lockwood Will Become Aeronaut.

Washington.—Mrs. Belva A. Lockwood, one of the leading women lawyers of the country, one time candidate of the women suffragists for the presidency of the United States, is to become an amateur aeronaut. She has taken a keen interest in the development of the aeroplane and it is stated that she made arrangements for her first air ride at College park in the near future.

Mrs. Lockwood has no intention of abandoning law for the aeroplane, but it is not improbable that she will own her own machine before long.

In speaking of her new fancy, Mrs. Lockwood said this was not her first attempt at flight. She said that when about 16 years of age she became intensely interested in the flight of swallows and decided to try the effects of flying. Obtaining all the umbrellas in her name she stole away to the roof of an "old" which ran back of the home. This afforded a 12-foot drop to the ground, opening the umbrellas she sprang into the air, but her lines as to the efficacy of umbrellas for flying were not justified and she came straight down, uncomfortably jarred but otherwise unhurt.

AVENGES MOTHER KILLED BY ESCAPED CONVICT

Pensacola, Fla.—News was brought here of a tragedy in Lee county Saturday night in which two persons, one a woman, were killed and another seriously wounded in a fight with an escaped convict. A Mrs. Weeks, wife of the postmaster of a small town in Lee county, and Willie Williams, the escaped convict, are dead, and a son of Mrs. Weeks is in a hospital suffering from serious wounds. Williams, who was serving a life sentence on a convict farm near the Weeks home for the killing of John White and Ed Dansby, white men, six years ago, escaped from the con-

vict farm, together with three other life-term prisoners Saturday night. Stealing four horses, they rode to the Weeks home, supposedly for the purpose of robbery. Thinking that it was her husband returning home, Mrs. Weeks went to the door. There, she was confronted by Williams who immediately opened fire, the woman being killed instantly. Awakened by the shots, Mrs. Weeks' 14-year-old son ran to the door and was also shot. He managed to crawl back to his room, and securing a revolver, shot Williams as he was about to enter the door. The three other men escaped, leaving Williams lying on the ground. He remained there all night and until noon Sunday when Weeks returned home to find his wife dead and his son unconscious from the loss of blood. Williams died in the yard some time later.

TEETH HAVE STRONG PULL.

Bring Famous Paris Dentist 6,000 Miles to Remedy Defect in Work.

Lon Beach.—Dr. Daniel Hally-Smith, a famous Paris dentist, whose patrons include some of the crowned heads of Europe as well as such personages as Anna Gould, her former husband, Count de Castellane, and others of prominence, arrived here from France for the sole purpose of rectifying some work performed eighteen months ago for A. G. Hubbard, the well known millionaire of Redlands. A portion of the work was not entirely to the liking of Hubbard and he so informed Dr. Hally-Smith. As soon as the latter could transfer his immense practice to the hands of a fellow practitioner, he did so, and came on to California to remedy the work. Dr. Hally-Smith is accompanied by his wife, who is the niece of John E. Reayburn, Mayor of Philadelphia. They will return to Paris in October.

BABE HIDES HOLDUP OF MOTHER BY DAY

One Thing Founders Infant While Other Takes Purse at Revolver's Point.


San Francisco.—In broad daylight Mrs. Mary Fath, 1970 Capp street, and her eighteen-month-old babe, which she wheeled in a carriage, was held up by two armed highwaymen at St. Mary's avenue and Mission street. While one of the men leaped over the infant the other pointed a revolver at Mrs. Fath, but kept it low so that persons in neighboring houses could not see. "Now, don't make any noise," said the man with the weapon, "but just hand us that satchel dangling from your arm. Steady, now, don't holler." Meanwhile the other robber tucked the child under the chin and made it

laugh and wriggle in the blankets. Mrs. Fath glanced up and down the street for help, saw none and handed over her hand satchel. It contained \$16 and some valuable articles.

The man with the revolver warned the woman not to make an outcry or follow them. The other highwayman patted the child's cheek once more and then they withdrew.

Mrs. Fath watched them climb into a buggy a short distance away and drive down Mission street. Then she notified the police. Detectives Maloney and O'Connell were unable to find any trace of the bandits. Mrs. Fath said neither was more than twenty-one years old. One was dark. The other was red-headed and freckle-faced.

Mrs. Fath was on her way to visit her sister at 108 Bosworth street.
