### METHODIST MEET IN CONFERENCE

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 22.—When the 28th annual session of the Columbia River conference of the Methodist Episcopal church convenes in First church, Spokane, the morning of August 23, there will be in attendance more than 320 ministers and laymen from points in Washington, Oregon and Idaho and prominent representatives from other parts of the country. Bishop Charles W. Smith of Portland, will preside. The conference will close on September 4 with the announcement of appointments for the coming year.

The principal speakers announced at the several sessions are Rev. Joseph B. Hiley, New York; Rev. Charles D. Allen, Denver; Mrs. May Leonard, Woodruff, New York; Rev. Ward Platt, Philadelphia; Rev. Dr. J. T. Wilson, Chicago; Rev. A. W. Leonard, Seattle; Rev. Dr. Edgar Blake, Chicago; Rev. Dr. W. H. H. Reese, Everett, Wash.; Rev. Dr. Fletcher Holman, president of Willamette University, Salem, Ore.; Rev. Dr. J. E. Zeller, president of University of Puget Sound, Tacoma; Rev. J. C. Kirkman, Waverly, Wash.; and Rev. M. L. Sanders, Wenatchee, who will preach the annual missionary sermon on September 3.

It is expected that the usual number of changes will be made by Bishop Smith and his cabinet, which is composed of the following: Rev. Dr. Amos A. Luce, Spokane, district superintendent of the Coeur d'Alene district; Rev. Dr. Charles E. Gibson, Spokane, district superintendent of the Spokane district; Rev. Walton Skipsworth, Portland, district superintendent of the Dalles district; Rev. O. W. Minter, Wenatchee, district superintendent of the Columbia district, and Rev. Gabriel Sykes, Walla Walla, district superintendent of the Walla Walla district.

### RUSSIA BUYS THREE WARSHIPS.

Six Submarines and Nine Torpedo Boat Destroyers Also Contracted For.

St. Petersburg.—The cabinet awarded the contracts for two battleships to be added to the Black Sea fleet to the Ivanoff Shipbuilding company, a combine of six Russian industrial machine works. The work will be done under the direction of the English firm of John Brown & Co. Each ship will cost \$9,771,933, with \$4,347,148 extra for armor and guns.

The contract for a third battleship was awarded to private works at Nikolay under the technical direction of Vickers sons & Maxim. The cost will be \$9,575,000. The battle-ships will be of 22,000 tons and carry 13 12-inch guns.

Six submarines to cost \$800,000 will be built by Baltic firms. The contracts for nine torpedo boat destroyers were given, four to the Nikolay works and the others to Baltic firms. The destroyers will cost \$1,600,000 each. The keels of the battleships will be laid at Nikolay next October.

### "STEEL KING" LONES \$140,000.

Story of Atlantic City Gambling Game Told in Divorce Suit.

New York.—The story of an Atlantic City gambling game in which an unnamed "steel king" lost \$140,000 in one lump, is told by Mrs. Anna Betts in connection with her suit here against her husband, Louis L. Betts, for a separation and \$25,000 a year alimony. The statement is made by friends of Mrs. Betts that the man who lost the \$140,000 is assisting the district attorney at Atlantic City in efforts to eliminate gamblers from the resort. This man charges that he was robbed of the \$140,000 by electrical devices which manipulated a roulette wheel. Mrs. Betts says in her suit that her husband owns property in New York, Richmond, Va., and Florida. She estimates his income at \$100,000 a year.

### AT THE PICTURE SHOWS

Interesting program for Tuesday's change:

1. "Blue Wing and the Violinist." American Pathé. A lone trapper, who finds his only solace in music of his violin, is captured by the Indians, but, as always, "Music charms the savage breast," and finally the musician goes back to civilization with Blue Wing, the belle of the tribe. Civilization, however, does not bring happiness and shortly Blue Wing is on her way back to the tribe with nothing but a broken heart and a lit-

tle baby to remind her of her life in the big city.

2. "American Field Artillery Maneuvers." Pathe. An excellent reproduction of the movements of a field battery in drill is presented on this film. It is a picture which arouses the pride of Americans everywhere. "It brings to them some indication of what their army is doing and never fails to please."

3. "Tommy, the Conqueror." Essanay. The story of an irrepressible salesman, and he sure and see how he holds three books to Mr. I. Am Easy. The film just bubbles over with fun.

4. "The Spender Family." Essanay. They endeavor to escape their creditors, but only get deeper into debt. Heads of large families will appreciate this farcical character sketch. It is very amusing.

5. "Jimmie Wears a Crown." Gaumont. A mysterious boy child left at a poor man's but wears half of a medal about his neck. He soon tires of court etiquette and pomp, deserts the palace, returns to foster parents and is happy once again.

6. "An Aeroplane Disaster." Gaumont. The fatal flight was made May 21, 1911 near Paris. The falling of the aeroplane is vividly shown.

7. "Slabides." Kalem. A story of a good hearted Indian. Jim Hillis, ranch manager, is jealous of Lord Verlane's attention to Nancy Etheridge, the young owner of N. E. ranch. Lord Verlane goes security for the horses secured by Slabides to visit his sick parents. Jim, believing that Verlane has won Nancy's love, decides to get the job and so advises her by you're.

The next morning Jim leaves. After receiving his note, Nancy rides after Jim to explain but becomes confused regarding the direction he has gone and takes the wrong trail, leading to the desert. Slabides finds Jim and Nancy in the desert and goes for aid, but his arrival in town is held for failing to return the horse he had borrowed and is shot as a horse thief while trying to escape.

"The Younger Brother." Edison drama. A story of great, though quiet dramatic strength. His self sacrifice is however discovered and the younger brother is given a chance to start fresh. The love story connected with it adds interest.

"Over the Garden Wall." Kalem. A comedy with a pleasing ending. Miss Alice Joyce and Mr. Clyde Blackwell are seen at their best in this laughable skit. Carl receives an invitation from his old bachelor uncle to come and make his home at the uncle's country place while he is away on a visit. He warns him against the cranky old maid who lives next door.

Miss Tabatha going away to visit her sister warns her niece Nellie to look out for the mean old bachelor next door. Well you can imagine how this ends, it is well worth seeing.

"Lost and Won." Selig. This love story has a very interesting background, and its chief feature is an old well in the allifornia fields—a gusher of surprising volume. Besides there are one or two very humorous scenes of "behind the scenes" in a moving picture studio. A poor young man loves a rich man's daughter. The rich man interferes and the poor man loses his job, goes west, and becomes a rich oil magnate. The rich man loses his fortune and his daughter gets a job as a motion picture actress.
