

CATTLE MARKET SHOWS WEAKNESS

RECEIPTS AT NORTH PORTLAND ARE HEAVY

Support of Packers Gives Swine Situation Better Outlook — Receipts Decidedly Light—Sheep Market Over Run and Prices Low.

(From Monday's Journal.) There was a big offering of cattle in the North Portland yards today, and the tone of the trade was somewhat weaker than last week, with the price lower.

Contrary to expectations, Montana cattle are again offering in this market. Two loads from Red Rock came forward this morning. The high price of cattle at South Omaha and Chicago is expected to shut the Pacific coast off from that territory until it elevates its views and prices.

At Chicago today the cattle market was steady, with receipts of 25,000 head, and no change in prices from Saturday's market.

At South Omaha there was a slow and weak tone in the cattle trade today, but nevertheless top steers were still selling up to \$7.50 and best cows and heifers at \$6.

Position of Swine Stronger.
The position of the hog market was elevated in all sections of the country today. This was due to the better support given the markets by the big packers. Locally there were no arrivals over Sunday, and therefore prices were not tested. It is the general opinion of the trade, however, that at least a dime above the present quotation would be available for selected swine at North Portland. This would put best stuff to \$8.35.

At South Omaha there were arrivals of 2400 head in the hog market over Sunday, and closing prices were 5c to 10c higher with tops at \$7.45. This means \$8.55 to land here.

At Chicago the hog market was strong with a similar advance, tops selling up to \$7.85.

Another Big Run of Sheep.
There seems to be no let up in the movement of sheep to the Portland market and the trade here is getting greater supplies than ever before. Total offerings here this morning were 4185 head, compared with none either Saturday or Friday and 1822 head last Monday.

The sheep market has been the cause of more financial reverses to shippers during the recent weeks than in the history of the local market. Almost every shipper has lost money. Still the run keeps up.

At South Omaha there was a slow to weak tone in the sheep and lamb trade, with the following prices quoted: Lambs, \$6.40@6.85; yearlings, \$4.15@5.75; wethers, \$3.15@3.50; ewes, \$3.25@3.70.

Chicago sheep trade suffered from a run of 28,000 head today, and the market was weak with average quotations 10c lower than on Saturday.

Chicago, Aug. 22.—The sharp upturn in wheat market prices was not maintained yesterday, although quotations at the closing were 12 to 58c higher than Saturday.

Shorts were responsible for the early bulge of nearly 3c in the wheat market, which put September to 93 1/4; December 97 7/8 and May \$1.01 5/8.

The heavy buying of cash wheat at Minneapolis was a strong influence for the buying side of the option market.

Liverpool gave no encouragement, being 1-8d lower to 14d higher at the opening and 3-8d to 1-2d lower at the closing.

RUSSIAN STATESMAN DENIES HE CRITICISED ROOSEVELT

Count Sergius Witte, in Letter to H. Bernstein, Declares Rumors Without Foundation.

New York—Count Sergius Witte, the former Premier of Russia, has written to Herman Bernstein, the author, the following letter which Mr. Bernstein made public:

"Rumors emanating from St. Petersburg have been published in some European and American newspapers to the effect that I have written a pamphlet criticizing Roosevelt for the part he played during the Portsmouth conference.

"These rumors are absolutely false. I have never written any pamphlet about anybody—I do not occupy myself with the writing of pamphlets—and I could not have written a pamphlet against Mr. Roosevelt, of whom I have retained the best remembrance and for whom I have the sincerest and deepest respect as a man, as a public-spirited statesman and as the great and sympathetic American nation."

BELIEVE QUAKER MOB LYNCHED GEORGIA BLACK

Negro Burned at Coatesville, Pa., Titled to Description of Wes Brewer.

Athens, Ga.—The police department here and the chalang officials in Clark county are very confident that the negro, Ezeziel Walker, who was burned upon his cot by the Quaker mob at Coatesville, Pa., for the killing of a special white police officer, was Wes Brewer, a negro with a long criminal record here and in North Carolina.

Brewer, after several minor offenses was accused, tried, convicted and sentenced in this county for stealing cows. He escaped from the gang and fled to North Carolina, where, near Asheville, he was again apprehended for the same offense—cattle stealing. There the officer was hurrying him to prison when the negro whipped out a pistol from his bosom hid in some manner so that the officer did not find it when the arrest was made and the negro searched. Brewer shot the officer in an auto and death was almost immediate. The negro leaped out and escaped the second time.

The search has been long and thorough, but the negro could not be actually located, though he was tracked to the Coatesville neighborhood. His description tallies remarkably with the rather meager description given in the accounts of the affair.

ALLEGED SPY WILL NOT BE DISCHARGED FROM ARMY

Major General E. D. Grant Declares Accusations Against Private Petr Are Incoherent.

New York—Major General Frederick D. Grant, commanding the department of the east, has given his approval to the retention of Private George Petr in the army. Petr was recently accused by a young woman acquaintance in the west of being an Austrian spy.

General Grant thinks that the conductor of Private Petr since he has been stationed in the New York city coast defenses is a sufficient test of his status.

"I don't know what there is to spy on at Fort Totten," says General Grant. "The letters which I have read are incoherent and mean but little. It is possible that the young man is Count Windich-Gratz. I believe there was such a nobleman who did not get along very well in his own country and may have gone into our army."
