NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

Lester Blane Begins His Term.
Colfax, Wash.—Lester Blane, who killed James Silvey at Palouse, July 3, 1910, and who was sentenced from 10 to 25 years in the penitentiary, left to begin his term.

Conyard Sells Lacrosse Clipper.
Lacrosse, Wash.—The Clipper, a Lacrosse week's newspaper, has been sold by the owner and editor, W. F. Conyard, to Thomas M. Brown of Centerville, Wash., who has taken charge.

Leg Severed, Alien Succumbs.
Missoula, Mont.—Orville Trunman, a Finlander, was thrown from a freight train near this city when the train parted and his left leg severed at the hip. He died in the charity hospital before noon.

Hit by Train, Woman Dies.
Wapato, Wash.—A woman, whose name has not yet been ascertained, was instantly killed by being struck by the Walla Walla express on the O.-W. & N. railway near Flint, a small station between Donald and Zillah.

No Wheat Burned in Field.
Ho, Idaho.—A field fire originating from embers from the furnace of a threshing engine destroyed 840 sacks of wheat on the U. R. Warnacutt farm, two miles west of town, entailing a \$1200 loss, partially covered by insurance.

Harvest Hand Goes to Jail.
Harrington, Wash.—Jim Murray, a harvest hand, who attempted to rob his companion, was arrested and fined \$50 and costs and given 30 days in the county jail by Police Justice C. C. Grimes. He was taken to DuPont yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Keith.

Lacrosse Blacksmith Drops Dead.
Lacrosse, Wash.—John Lumberg, aged 44 years, employed by George J. Schader, dropped dead of heart failure. He was a skilled blacksmith and had been employed here for three weeks. The coroner of Whitman county was notified and will take the body to Colfax.

Seven Ho Horses Burned.
Ho, Idaho.—A barn on the L. R. Randall farm, four miles west of here, was totally destroyed by fire and seven out of eight horses stabled in the structure were burned to death. The loss is \$2500, with \$800 insurance. The origin of the fire is a mystery.

Laborer Shoots Companion.
Benge, Wash.—From an unknown cause H. A. King, a laborer, was shot through the right arm by Peter Teari, an Italian laborer, working on the section at Benge. After the shooting he was taken by a deputy sheriff, who tried to find out why he committed the crime, but he would not talk. Teari is about 35 years old and has a family in the east.

Twisp Farmer Hangs Self.
Twisp, Wash.—David Henry Bennett, 38, a homesteader living on Cub creek, was found hanging by the neck, dead, in his brother's barn on an adjoining farm. Deputy Coroner Couche was notified. No inquest was held. It is believed he took his life during a temporary fit of despondency. His financial affairs are in good condition. Mr. Bennett came here four years ago from Missouri.

Stores Burned at Kita, Mont.
Kallispell, Mont.—Fire of unknown origin destroyed the Cunningham store at Kita, 13 miles west of here,

and badly damaged the store, warehouse and dwelling of F. N. Haines adjoining. The stock of goods in the Cunningham store is a total loss, although the building is covered by insurance. Haines' loss is partially covered by insurance. The estimated damage is about \$3500.

Start Federal Building at La Grande.
La Grande, Ore.—La Grande's \$60,000 federal building will be begun, according to a statement given out by G. F. Campbell of the Campbell Construction company, upon arriving here Saturday. Mr. Campbell says the work will be pushed as rapidly as possible that the roof may be on before bad weather sets in so that the winter may be spent finishing the interior.

ELEVEN MEN IN OPEN BOAT FOR TEN HOT DAYS

Survivors of Wrecked Bark Arrive; Two of Crew Marry South Sea Islanders.

San Francisco.—First Officer H. H. Hatfield and ten of the crew of the British four-masted bark Puritan, which sprang a leak and sank in the South Sea, 500 miles off the coast of Tahiti on June 26th, arrived in San Francisco on the Royal Mail liner Aorangi.

A story of intense suffering from lack of water, heat and loss of sleep, as they sat huddled together for ten days in the small boat from the time they were forced to abandon the sinking ship until they reached Anaa, 300 miles from Papeete, was told by the men. During the last six days of the voyage the men were allowed only a spoonful of water at intervals during the day and even this allowance was stopped on the morning of the last day at sea, when their water gave out entirely. The boat reached Anaa that afternoon.

The natives, who had seen white men only on rare occasions, roasted the fattest pig and fed the almost delirious men on the best of the land. In fact, so well were they treated and so popular did they become with the dark-eyed maidens that two of the crew, Harry Smith and Marshall Peters of San Francisco, decided to remain there and married native women.

HAINES SEEKS DIVORCE.

Army Officer Serving Sentence for Murder to Appear in Court Today.

New York.—From behind the bars in Sing Sing, Captain Peter C. Haines, Jr., army officer and inventor, has begun his battle for freedom against his beautiful wife Claudia, for love of whom he shot and killed his former friend William E. Ames, at the Bay Side Yacht club on August 18, 1908.

The victim of the tragedy is named in the action, which is on the calendar for trial in Brooklyn.

Whether Captain Haines, whose heroic old father, General Peter Haines, arrived in New York last night to assist his favorite son, will be permitted to doff the convict's stripes long enough to testify cannot be ascertained tonight.

W. C. Percy, counsel for Captain Haines, declares his belief that the defendant will not contest.

BOXCAR SMASHES THROUGH BEDROOM

Family Hurled Through Partition Is Unhurt When House Is Wrecked.

Santa Barbara, Cal.—Smashing its way through a house after having left the railroad track, a boxcar, which broke away from a freight train collided with a bed in which John Fields, his wife and their baby were sleeping. The bed was driven through a

wall into another room, but none of its occupants was hurt. Fields' house, however, was almost completely wrecked. The car was one of a string being shunted onto a switch which but its iron frame withstood the shock runs near the Fields place. It leaped the rails and after ripping a wing off the house, plunged into the bedroom. The trucks struck the bed and forced it through an adjacent partition wall, and saved the lives of its occupants.

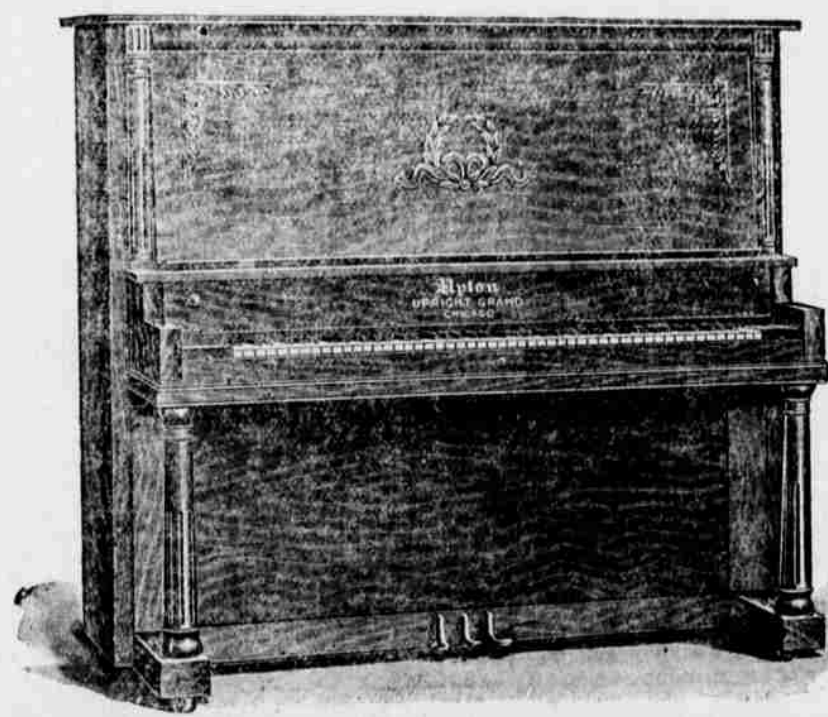
