Circles Globe in 40 Days.
 Cherbourg, France, Aug. 26.—Andre Jaeger-Schmidt of the Paris Hus-trated Daily Excelsior, who started from Paris 1:45 p. m. July 17, to try to lower the time around the globe made by M. Stinger, who, consumed 63 days in the journey, has completed his trip. From Paris Jaeger-Schmidt's route lay to Moscow and thence to Vladivostok. From the latter place he proceeded by steamer to Yokohama, whence he sailed for Vancouver, taking there a train for Montreal and coming thence to New York where he arrived August 18. The following day he sailed for Cherbourg on the Olympic. By reaching Paris today, Jaeger-Schmidt consumed just 39 days 1 9 hours.

Will Found New Colony.
 ZION CITY, Ill.—Announcement was made here by Elder John Taylor that Mrs. John Dowie, widow of the late John Alexander Dowie, founder of Zion City, will found a new colony of the Dowie faith at her summer home, Ben Mac Dhul, near Whitehall, Mich. Mrs. Dowie, according to her followers, will be assisted by her son, Gladstone Dowie of Detroit. She will dedicate her home and two hundred acres of ground to the new colony and will attempt to get several hundred additional acres upon which to locate the new city. Mrs. Dowie has issued a call to all residents of Zion City, Ill., who are faithful to her, to move their families to Whitehall, and join in the project.

SHINGLE MILL AT NORTH BEND BURNS DOWN

Mansfield, Ore.—The North Bend shingle mill was burned to the ground by a fire entailing a loss of \$20,000. J. A. Allen was the principal owner of the plant, which he was operating. The fire was discovered shortly after it broke out, but the fire-fighters, consisting of the North Bend department, the crews of the Porter saw mill and the North Bend iron works, could not check its headway. They could only keep it confined to the doomed plant. At one time the flames threatened to spread to adjacent property, but were checked by heroic efforts.

WOMAN APPLIES FOR LICENSE AS NAVIGATOR

San Francisco.—Captain Ida J. Ballard, the first woman in the history of the San Francisco office of the United States Inspectors of Hulls and Hullers to apply for a navigator's license has made such application. Captain Ballard, for five years has held a license as master and pilot on the Mississippi river and its tributaries and the application filed with the local board is for renewal, such as is required every five years, by law. Captain Ballard is staying in a hotel here. She did not tell the inspectors whether or not she expected to seek employment as a navigator on this coast.
