CATTLE PRICES HELD DOWN BY TRADE

Swine Received From Omaha Territory and Market Holding Firm—Sheep Steady—Chicago Wheat Recovers Recent Losses.

With no competition in sight, local killers were bearish this afternoon and two loads of fine steers from Weiser went begging, while best cows sold at \$4.50.

At Chicago there was a steady tone in the cattle trade with no change in quotations.

At South Omaha today there was a steady to weak tone in the cattle trade with top steers at \$7.50 and best cows and heifers at \$5.75 or 10c above the highest quotation for beef cattle here.

At Chicago there was a steady tone in the swine trade with tops at \$7.70.

Sheep Market is Holding. With practically no change in the situation from recent days and with only a small number offering, the sheep and lamb trade at North Portland was fairly steady today.

Total arrivals for the 24 hours included 114 head compared with 502 yesterday and none on this date a year ago.

Packers wants are still limited but they are inclined to support the market whenever given a chance.

At Chicago today the sheep and lamb trade was weak with no change in prices.

May Force Cattle Higher. Local packers are beginning to awaken to the danger of holding off so long that their supplies for the late winter and early spring will be endangered.

While Puget sound and California packers can get middle west interests have been scouring the country for supplies, local interests have been inactive.

The result is that the bulk of the cattle that will be available for the market late in the season has already passed out of the hands of producers and into the hands of speculators and outside killers.

Everywhere the cattle market is high except at North Portland. While prices here at this time are better than a year ago, they are far below those quoted at competitive points and for that reason the only way Pacific northwest killers can get supplies is to elevate their bids.

For instance, while top steers have sold here recently no higher than \$5.65, the same class of stuff is bringing over 2c more at South Omaha. In other words, cattle prices here are now so low even on the coast, that shipments can now be made with profit from Oregon centers to the Missouri river markets.

"OTHER WOMAN" ENTERS WIFE KILLING TRAGEDY

Prosecution Hints at Winsome Widow in Case of G. O. Golden, Churchman.

Pittsburg.—Like the Beattie case, the killing of Mrs. George O. Golden by her husband has now taken the form of a triangular domestic tragedy.

The prosecution charges that "another woman" is responsible for the killing of Mrs. Golden by her young husband, who is one of Kittanning's most prominent merchant and active church workers.

Golden protests his innocence. He maintains that he mistook his wife for a burglar and did not realize he had killed her until the lights were turned on.

Friends of the accused man have faith in him and they believe his story, but the report today that a bewitching young widow will be brought into the case as the Beulah Binford in Kittanning's tragedy, caused a sensation.

Colonel W. H. Fairman, retained by relatives of the dead woman to aid in the prosecution of Golden, declares that witnesses are on hand to produce startling testimony when Golden is arraigned.

Despite the charges, Golden has been admitted to bail in the sum of \$10,000.

The body of Mrs. Golden will be exhumed by the coroner of Armstrong county for an autopsy.

MORE MONKEY THAN MASON.

Californian Wonders What Order He Belongs To. Los Angeles, Cal.—E. W. Kinsey, a former police court clerk, who worked diligently for a year to obtain recognition from the members of a certain secret society, the members of which failed to recognize his signals, distress signs and handclaps, believes he is to have the satisfaction of ascertaining more about the initiation, which he alleges cost him \$29.

Kinsey was initiated about a year ago. He claims he was "buncoed." He told his story last June to Prosecutors McConnell and Stafford and they gave him a complaint which alleged that L. F. Stapleton, accompanied by an attorney and several friends visited the city jail building and surrendered.

Stapleton will appear in court to plead to the charge. The complaint mentions the name of "St. John's Lodge No. 8, Free and Accepted Masons." Kinsey, in his statement to the prosecutors, alleged that there was no lodge of that name in Los Angeles.

STORK HALTS RETIREMENT.

Man Who Started to Amass \$1,000,000 for Each Child Had Task. Colorado Springs, Colo.—Retirement from business, delayed for fifteen years by repeated visits of the "stork" to his home has come to W. S. Jackson, pioneer financier of this city.

Jackson declared fifteen years ago he would not retire until he had \$1,000,000 for each of his children. Before he secured \$3,000,000 for his three children the "stork" paid repeated visits until the family increased to six children.

Now that Jackson has amassed a fortune of more than \$6,000,000, he determined to retire, and sold his interest in El Paso National Bank to M. D. Thatcher, president of the First National Bank of Pueblo.

Jackson's first wife was Helen Hunt Jackson, the authoress.

POND USED WOMAN AS SHIELD IN FIGHT

He Shot Three Policemen and Escaped Without Being Hurt.

Philadelph.—Two policemen were shot and a third was seriously wounded and a third was seriously hurt when they attempted to arrest Gilbert Pond 28 years old, of West Montgomery, in a Chinese restaurant here. The injured: William Kirby, seriously; Patrick Connor, seriously; John Garr.

Pond entered the restaurant flourishing a revolver. The police were called and when the three policemen rushed into the place Pond began shooting. A fourth policeman finally subdued Pond.

Pond and a woman who accompanied him to the restaurant were committed to prison without bail. The police say that Pond used the woman as a shield during the encounter and this prevented them from effectively using their revolvers.
