**Some Hogs Are Offered.**

There was small run of local hogs in the yards today and trade held very well at previous quotations. The run included 70 head, all but 8 head coming from Boise.

The steadiness of the hog trade elsewhere is expected to help maintain good quotations at North Portland in the immediate future. Tops sold at South Omaha this morning at \$7.40, which means that it cost \$5.50 to land these supplies here. The differential between the landed cost of Missouri river hogs and the price paid at North Portland is now so small that fluctuations at South Omaha are likely to quickly affect the trade here.

At Chicago the hog market was slow with tops selling at \$7.70 this morning.

**JOURNALISTS REACH HIGH ALTITUDE IN GLACIER PARK**

Newspaper Men on "See America First" Tour Make Important Discoveries in National Park in Montana.

Midvale, Mont.—Showing the effects of their hard journey into the wilds of Montana, the party of newspaper men who have been exploring Glacier National park in the interests of the "See America First" movement emerged from the wilderness. They have been into the very heart

of the hitherto unexplored parts of the park, making the journey on foot and on horseback. They caught large numbers of fish and shot a great deal of game, although the shooting was done with a camera, as hunting is not allowed in the new governmental parks.

The newspaper men were guests at the camps of the Great Northern railway making them headquarters from which exploring expeditions were carried out.

Two new glaciers were discovered by the party and members of it reached the highest mountain altitude ever attained in that park.

**MUTTON MARKET SHOWING BETTER**

**INCREASED CONSUMPTION HAS GOOD EFFECT**

**Cattle Market Steady With Receipts Good—Few Hogs Are Offered With Prices Holding Good—Wheat Slightly Higher But Slow.**

(From Monday's Journal.)

Steadiness is showing in the mutton division of the North Portland yards as a result of the increased consumption in the local territory. Owing to the rather low prices low quotations asked generally for dressed sheep and lambs, this class of foods has been given preference recently by retailers and therefore the demand for mutton products is fully four times as great as a year ago.

Fancy lambs sold at \$4.75 in the stockyards this morning for stock that averaged around 78 pounds. This is within 5 cents of the extreme high figure recently received for some Mount Adams offerings and therefore reflects an advance of probably a dime above previous quotations.
