AFTER ATWOOD'S RECORD.

St. Louis. Aviators Planning for Trans-Mississippi Flight.

St. Louis.—Plans for a trans-Mississippi hydroplane flight next month of not less than 1500 miles, sufficient to eclipse the world's record just established by Harry N. Atwood, are under way here.

Two courses are under consideration—to start at St. Paul and finish at Vicksburg, a distance of 1511 miles or to start at Dubuque and finish at New Orleans, 155 miles.

The purpose of the flight is to focus attention on the Mississippi on the eve of the deep-waterway convention at Chicago, and to promote aviation interest in the middle west as well as to establish a new world's record for distance.

NEGRO FIEND WEARS SKIRT.

Disguised as Woman, Attacks Wife of White Farmer, Threatens Child.

Durant, Okla.—After searching 18 hours for an unknown negro who attacked Mrs. A. Wilkerson on Saturday evening at Colbert, 15 miles south of here, the pursuit was dropped this morning by Sheriff Hamilton. The negro was dressed in woman's clothing. Mrs. Wilkerson fled when she discovered that the negro was a man. He seized her three-year-old child and threatened to kill the child if she did not return. She ran to her husband in a neighboring field and gave the alarm. After carrying the child some distance toward the Red river, the negro dropped it.

NEW COLONY SOUGHT BY WIDOW OF DOWIE

Relief of the Founder of Zion City to Found New Colony.

Zion City, Ill.—Announcement was made here by "Elder" John Taylor, that Mrs. Jane Dowie, widow of John Alexander Dowie, founder of Zion City, will found a new colony of the Dowie faith at her summer home, Ben Mac Dhui, near White Hall, Mich.

Mrs. Dowie, according to her followers here, will be assisted by her son, Gladstone Dowie, of Detroit. She will dedicate her summer home and the 200 acres of ground to the cause

of the new colony and will attempt to secure several hundred additional acres on which to locate the new city.

Mrs. Dowie has issued a call to all residents of Zion City, Ill., who are faithful to her to move their families to White Hall and join her in this colonization project. Beginning early in October, Mrs. Dowie personally will open a series of meetings in Chicago with the purpose of securing new converts and followers to join her in establishing the proposed second Zion City.

Since the death of her husband, several years ago, and her withdrawal from the Illinois colony, Mrs. Dowie has been living in retirement on her Michigan estate.

DIRECT LEGISLATION CAMPAIGN IS UNDER WAY

Los Angeles, Calif., Aug. 29.—The campaign for direct legislation is today under way, following the firing of the opening gun last night by United States Senator Clapp, who spoke to an overflow audience here.

He said that immediate action in bringing about this form of legislation by the people themselves, was necessary.

He praised the initiative and referendum and said that legislators acted in the same capacity as agents and should be expected to do what the people expect them to do, in every respect.

UNITED STATES AND IDAHO MAKING BIG LAND TRADE

Federal Government and State Will Exchange 600,000 Acres, so as to Make Holdings More Compact.

Washington, D. C.—The state of Idaho and the United States government have agreed to exchange about 600,000 acres of land in that state so that each may have its lands in a more compact body than at present.

Acting Secretary of Agriculture Hays signed a co-operative agreement with the state for the examination of unsurveyed school lands in the national forests of Idaho so as to exchange them for lands of equivalent area and value along the boundary of the national forests.

It is contemplated that lands valuable for forest purposes will be maintained as state forests. The forestry officials here believe this move will result in closer co-operation between state and the forest service in the protection and maintenance of timber lands. They hope furthermore that other states will follow Idaho's example.

TRAPS FOR "REVENUES" SET BY MOONSHINERS

Winston-Salem, N. C.—Internal revenue officers in search of illicit distilleries have discovered that a new weapon is being used to discourage their investigations. It was admitted today by two revenue officers that they had just missed stepping into a large steel trap presumably set for them by "moonshiners" in Iredell county last night.

The officers had destroyed an illicit still recently and were pursuing their investigations last night in the same neighborhood, when one of them happened to see the trap just in time to avoid their being caught in it.

MAN'S HEAD IS SENT TO DEPOSED SULTAN

Grim Discovery Is Made in British Postoffice in Constantinople.

Vienna.—Of a grim discovery in the British postoffice in Constantinople stories are appearing in the Austrian newspapers.

A wooden packing case consigned to the ex-Sultan Abdul Hamid was discovered in a heap of undelivered parcels. Inside the case was a leaden casket, which when opened, was found to contain a shriveled, withered human head.

A laconic note also was inclosed in the case saying that the head was that of the murdered Midhat Pasha, the first Turkish premier, forwarded according to instructions to convince the sultan of his death.

Thimbles appear to have been known by the Romans, as some were found at Herculaneum.

SOCIALIST, BUT DOESN'T KNOW IT

Congressman Stanley So Characterizes Steel Trust Chairman Gary.

Chicago.—Congressman A. O. Stanley, chairman of the house committee investigating the so-called steel trust, declared that Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the executive committee of the United States Steel corporation, is a socialist. The only difference between Gary and Congressman Victor Berger is that Gary does not know he is a socialist.

"If we endeavor to follow out Mr. Gary's ideas of government supervision we are going to land, in Mr. Berger's fantastic heaven of government ownership," said Mr. Stanley. "The idea of taking up Mr. Gary's plan of government supervision of corporations is like thinking one could leap from the roof of one of these skyscrapers and stop at the fifth floor," said the congressman. "It can not be done. The result would be complete government ownership within a short time. And to that I personally am radically opposed. I believe in competition."

Congressman Stanley reached here last night on a tour of all the steel companies' plants. He will spend tomorrow at Gary, Ind., and will probably leave next day for Lulu.

O'BRIEN DISPUTES WOMAN.

Ambassador O'Brien Says Mrs. Drury Is a Stranger to the Truth.

Tokio.—Thomas L. O'Brien, United States ambassador, has taken occasion to deny as "shamefully unjust and untrue" a story printed in certain American newspapers which have arrived. The story originated in San Francisco and quoted Mrs. Carl F. Drury of Ohio as condemning the ambassador for his failure to take proper steps for her protection in a controversy so had with certain Japanese garment-makers at Yokohama. Mrs. Drury complained that she had been assaulted by a Japanese tailor when he served papers on her in a civil suit as a result of her refusal to pay for garments that had been returned to the makers for alteration. Mrs. Drury is quoted as having criticized the ambassador severely, as asserted that she could get no satisfaction in her appeal to the embassy.

Ambassador O'Brien said that Mrs. Drury had called upon him once only and that he had treated her with the utmost consideration.
