Only arrivals in the swine division of the North Portland yards today were 103 head of sloppers that were brought forward by boat by Sevier & Weed. The lot averaged 232 pounds and sold at \$8.10. This is considered a very good value for refuse hogs and indicates that the former top at \$8.35 is still being maintained here.

At Chicago today there was a loss of 5c in the prices of hogs, which puts tops to \$7.75. This was for light stock, mixed loads going no higher than \$7.70.

South Omaha trade was weak for hogs, with a loss of 5c in the price as compared with yesterday. Sales of tops were made at \$7.40, which means \$8.50 to land at Pacific north-west points.

Chicago, Aug. 31.—Wheat prices here followed the declines of foreign markets and the closing was 1-2c to 7-8c lower after an opening that was off 1-4c to 1-2c from Tuesday.

The big increase in the world's visible supply is causing some concern to the bull side of the market. Today's visible totals 135,584,000 bushels or an increase of 17,441,000 bushels over a year ago.

SHEEP TRADE LOSES STRENGTH

OREGON FLOCKS BRING MORE SATISFACTORY PRICES

Big Run of Cattle Marks Day at North Portland Market—Market Slow—Slop Hogs Bring High Prices—Wheat Shows Decline.

(From Wednesday's Journal.)

A nickel was dropped off the lamb market today at North Portland with the sale of several lots at \$4.75. One of the bunches totaled 259 head and averaged 77 pounds, while another of 282 head averaged 65 pounds. Both of the lots came forward from The Dalles and were of good quality.

Inability of the sheep trade elsewhere to maintain its strength from one day to another is causing sheep shippers to lose heart. There was a generally weaker feeling elsewhere today and naturally this had some effect upon quotations at North Portland.

Oregon sheep are the best in the country and for that reason are able to command the best prices wherever offered. A short time ago a lot of Malheur county stock sold in the Chicago market at \$5.50 for yearlings, the highest price reached this season. The sheep were shipped by Howard Bros. of Westfall. The same ship-

pers received \$4 for 2-year-olds. While the Howard lot topped the Chicago market, other shippers from the Malheur section secured very favorable returns in the east—that is, considering the general depression of the sheep trade.

At Chicago today there was a steady tone in the sheep market and prices were unchanged from yesterday.

Considerable weakness was showing in the lamb division of the sheep market at South Chicago during the day and prices dropped from 15c to 25c under yesterday. Sheep trade generally was steady there during the day with lambs \$5.45 @ 6.00, yearlings \$4.00 @ 4.40, wethers \$3.30 @ 3.50, and ewes \$3.00 @ 3.25.

The only shipment of sheep and lambs made to the North Portland yards was the lot of two cars sent forward from The Dalles by C. P. Ketchum & Son.

Big Run Montana Cattle.

There was a very heavy run of Montana cattle in the North Portland yards, notwithstanding the great differential that is existing between prices here and at South Omaha. As Montana is the dividing line for cattle shipments and the freight charge to either North Portland or South Omaha is the same, it has been generally presumed that shippers would not bring stuff in this direction until the situation had changed.

The cattle market was slow in opening today, with an advance of 5c in best offerings of steers. One lot of 52 head that averaged 1208 pounds went at \$5.65. The Montana shipment was not sold early in the day.

At Chicago today there was a weaker tone in the cattle trade, with prices generally 10c lower than yesterday.

South Omaha cattle prices were likewise weak, with a loss similar to that shown at Chicago. Top steers sold at South Omaha today at \$7.85, while best cows and heifers moved at \$7.75.

She'll be boss of the job one of these fine days."

TO FAMILIARIZE SELF WITH ALASKA COUNTRY

Spokane, Wash.—United States Senator Miles Polindexter of Spokane, who will accompany Gifford Pinchot, president of the National Conservation association, and several friends on a tour of Alaska in September, says he is desirous of becoming more familiar with the actual conditions in the territory and will investigate the practicability of these projects: Government construction of a railroad from the Alaskan coal fields to Controller Bay; opening of the coal fields by the government of the United States; and federal ownership of a line of steamships plying between Puget Sound and Alaska. It is announced here that Senator Polindexter and several progressive senators from the middle western states will present measures at the next session of congress to secure the foregoing legislation, in the event the investigation to be undertaken by the National Conservation association warrants such action. Senator Polindexter thinks this is the only recourse of the people of the United States to avoid the control of coal and transportation in Alaskan territory by monopoly.

JOHN D. GAINS \$11,000,000.

Increases His Wealth Between Breakfast and Luncheon.

Cleveland.—While John D. Rockefeller was playing golf with Captain Levi Scofield and others in a foursome at Forest Hill links, Standard Oil stock was soaring on the New York curb. It went up a total of 47 points during the morning. Rockefeller's play was interrupted several times while he received and sent telegrams. It is believed he was directing buying operations that caused the remarkable. All messages were received and sent by Rockefeller's private operator at his home. Ans-

wers as received were delivered to the cill king by a boy on a bicycle. Rockefeller's holdings increased in value \$11,000,000 between breakfast and luncheon.

Walla Walla, Wash.—Coroner Hennessy returned from Clyde, Wash., bringing the body of John Sperry, a farm laborer, who was crushed to death beneath a load of wheat.
