TENTED CITY TO RISE FOR ROUND-UP

SANITARY CAMP GROUND PROVIDED FOR FESTIVAL.

Grove in City Limits at Disposal of Visitors Who May Care to Live in Open While Guests of Pendleton During Week.

Persons coming to the Round-Up with their own accommodation outfit are to be provided with sanitary camping grounds within the corporate limits of Pendleton and it is expected that a tented city will spring up during fair week.

Cress Sturges has been appointed to take charge of these grounds and prepare proper accommodations such as feed racks and temporary stables.

Already signs have been put up on the roads leading into the city directing campers to apply at accommodation headquarters in the East Oregonian block for assignments of space in the grove.

Smith, an employe in a logging camp was arrested here at the request of the Burns' Detective agency, on suspicion of complicity in the murder at Ralnier, Wash., July 19, of Archie Coble and his wife who were found dead in their bed with their skulls crushed by an ax and for whose murder George Wilson, a section foreman, is now held at Olympia.

Wilson, now held for the crime, is a desperado. He has made a confession, in which he says that while he has no knowledge of the crime he thinks he probably committed it.
