## DEMAND FOR FEED CATTLE IS HEAVY

PRICE BETTER THAN ANY TIME IN HISTORY.

Portland Hog Market Has Another Decline of Fifteen Cents—Price on Sheep and Lambs Variable—Wheat Experiences Slight Advance.

(From Tuesday's Journal.)  
Feed cattle are in heavy demand and there is little to offer. Therefore the price for stockers is better at this time, compared with finished stuff, than during any other time in the history of the livestock trade.

Good stock steers will find a welcome at North Portland at \$4.75, and cows will bring about \$3.25. According to livestock commission merchants for stockers on hand, which they are unable to fill at the moment. The scarcity of stockers indicates the small supply of feeder stuff in the country and fully confirms the recent reports in the Journal to the effect that cattle supplies at Pacific northwest points are dwindling fast.

Real good cattle are in demand at the higher price quoted, but owing to the wide range of quality, there is naturally a wide spread in the quotations.

There was a weak tone in the cattle trade at Chicago today, but prices were unchanged.

At South Omaha there was a steady tone in the cattle trade with top steers at \$9.75, and best cows and heifers selling at \$5.55.

There was a decline of 15 cents in the hog market at North Portland this afternoon, with sales of toppers at \$8.25, and other quality in proportion. Even this is 5s above the price that Missouri river hogs can be landed in this market.

The steamer Tillamook came direct from the Cheese city to the stockyard and unloaded 92 head of hogs. There were quite fair offerings of swine in the yards during the day, a total of 398 head being received. With the exception of the lot that came from Tillamook, supplies were entirely from California.

As a general rule the hog market was steady today at the drop of a dime quoted by The Journal yesterday.

At Chicago the hog trade was steady with tops at \$7.60.

South Omaha was 5c to 10c lower for swine with tops at \$7.10. This means \$7.20 to land at Pacific northwest packing centers.

**SEE STARTS FIGHT FOR HIS FREEDOM**

"Absolute Life" Cult Leader Will Ask Judge Honore for Continuance of New Trial Motion—Says Reporter Has Records.

Chicago, Ill.—Evelyn Arthur See, convicted leader of the "Absolute Life" cult, and his attorneys will begin another fight in Judge Honore's court to save him from the penitentiary.

The hearing of the motion for a new trial was set and counsel for both sides as well as See and several of the women connected with the case, were present in court.

See's attorneys will ask for a continuance on the grounds that William Snyder, a reporter, took part of the records of the case on a fishing trip to California. It will be argued that without these records the defense will be unable to prepare a full bill of exceptions.

In case Judge Honore denies the motion for a new trial, which is considered probable, the next move on the part of the defense will be to take the case to the supreme court.

Mrs. Lucile Bridges, the staunch supporter of the "prophet," was in court but refused to discuss the case. She answered every question with a shake of the head. The only other woman in court was Mrs. Denise Herendeen, friend of Mrs. See and one of See's bitter enemies. The state was represented by Assistant State Attorney Frederick Burnham.

See was dressed in a new blue suit and his hair was closely cut. He is

said to have made many women converts to his teachings since his conviction while on lecture tours. It was said that a meeting of these women was held at the home of Mrs. Rhodin, a widow, living at 3975 Drexel boulevard.

See said that his tour had proven successful and that he believed that the sentiment of the "better educated" classes was in his favor. In many of the towns visited he was not allowed to speak and attributed this to "false and misleading reports of the newspapers."

"Are you going to fight this case to a finish?" he was asked.  
"I never have been fighting and I don't propose to fight," he returned hotly.

**RISKS LIFE ON FREAK BET.**

Nearly Drowns When He Dives Into a Water Trough.

Philadelphia, Pa.—Making a bet with a number of acquaintances that he could jump into a water trough with his clothes on and not get them wet, John Miles, 30 years old, of Fourth and Oxford streets, dived head first into a trough at Third and Oxford streets and in doing so struck his head.

The force of the blow stunned him and he sank below the surface of the water and after a few minutes, when he did not get out of the trough or pull his head to the top, the onlookers became alarmed and pulled him out. He was in an unconscious condition and almost drowned.

Miles was rushed to the Episcopal hospital where the water was pumped out of him. It is said that he will recover. How he expected to accomplish the feat is a mystery. He would not explain to the physicians, but he was evidently satisfied with the experiment.
