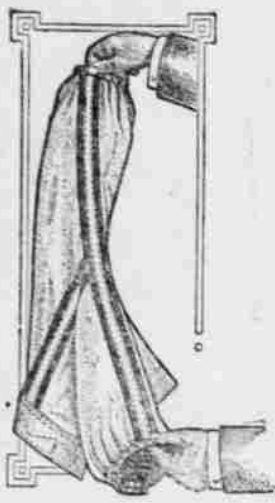

NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

Thrown Off Train; Asks \$1975.
Davenport, Wash.—J. W. Meade, a horseman of Sprague, has brought suit against the Northern Pacific Railway company for \$1975 damages, claimed by reason of being ejected from a passenger train.

Church of God Campmeeting.
Freewater, Ore.—The Church of God campmeeting in the Freewater City park for the last week, in spite of the continued heavy rains, is scoring a great success. The Rev. Mr. Eailed of Spokane is the evangelist and is assisted by the Rev. H. Coover and O. K. Goodman, both of Sunnyside.

Soft Drink Emporium Closed.
Joseph, Ore.—The council has revoked the license of the soft drink emporium of Bass & Martin. Several days ago the marshal arrested one of the proprietors, a bartender by the

name of Upton, together with a crowd of loungers about the place, for disorderly conduct, having created a disturbance in the place during the early hours of the morning.

Merge Mills of Two States.
Portland, Ore.—First steps toward the closer linking of the lumber interests of Oregon and Washington were taken at a private dinner where Henry J. Pierce of Spokane presented his proposal for the merger into one company of the tidewater mills of the two states to representatives of a number of western Oregon sawmilling companies. Neither Mr. Pierce nor any of those present would discuss the definite result of the conference, which follows closely upon that of the western Washington lumbermen at Aberdeen last week.

Vale Builds Up Rapidly.
Vale, Ore.—The council ordered cement sidewalks on a street grade from the new \$12,000 depot at Vale, the full length of Main street. The walks are 19 feet wide. The city also straightened Main street, making the Hope addition to conform to the main part of the city. Several new brick buildings are being built, the largest by the Boswell dry goods store, the Vale hardware store and

the Vale Saddlery company. This building will be 129 by 94 feet.

Mayor Ousted by Union.
Pleasant, Ore.—Mayor Rushlight, when caught in his office at 5:30 this being 30 minutes after the regular civil service or union hours, confessed to W. H. Fitzgerald, a prominent labor leader and member of the executive board that he had been thrown out of the plumber's union for working overtime without charging the city extra pay.

Lightning Kills One Hog.
Davenport, Wash.—The lightning during the severe thunder storm performed a remarkable feat when a bolt which struck a wire fence was transmitted some distance where two hogs in the pasture of G. K. Birge, one mile west of Davenport, were struck, resulting in the death of one and rendering its mate both blind and deaf. Both swine were registered Duroc Jerseys, and for the one killed Mr. Birge had refused \$50.

"Klick" Department Installed.
North Yakima, Wash.—A klick department has been added to the numerous equipment of the Pacific Power and Light company, which furnished electricity, water and gas

to residents of North Yakima. T. A. Noble has been put in charge, and has begun his work by sending out return post cards to all patrons of the company, asking whether they have complaints against their service.

AMERICA USES MANY PAIRS WOODEN SHOES.

Washington.—Wooden shoes usually associated only with variety shows and pictures of street scenes in Holland, are, in fact, worn by thousands of people in this country. A single shipment from Amsterdam to Grand Rapids, Mich., mentioned in a report by Vice Counsel De Young, consisted of 600 cases containing several thousand pairs of the lumber footwear. A similar shipment was made a few months ago.

Also the report reveals the sections of the United States addicted to the habit as follows:
"It is stated that the United States is the best foreign customer of the Netherlands for this article of manufacture, many hundreds of pairs of wooden shoes being worn in Michigan, Iowa, Illinois, Missouri, New Jersey and a few other states. In fact it is claimed that there are more wooden shoes in Chicago, Grand Rapids, or Holland, Mich., than in the city of Amsterdam. Paterson, N. J., St. Louis, Mo., Lancaster county, Nebr., Marion county, Ia., and numerous other smaller settlements import large quantities of this practical article of dress every year.

"The wooden shoe industry in the Netherlands is generally decentralized, logs being hewn out to the measure of the customer's foot in the village shop. The local price depends largely upon the amount of lumber used and the market price of the raw material. There are, however, a few large factories using modern wood-working machinery and exporting the most of their product. The principal countries to which they export, in order of their importance, are the United States and Canada, West Indies, Germany and South Africa.

MONUMENT TO COLUMBUS ERECTED IN WASHINGTON.

Washington.—A memorial to the memory of Christopher Columbus, widely known as a bold and inquisitive sailor, will be unique in Washington from the fact that the statue and accompanying emblematic embellishments will be of chaste white marble.

All the other heroes, whether afoot or on horse back, that adorn most of the open spaces in Washington are celebrated with statues of bronze or other metal.

In the case of the great discoverer, the marble work will include the heroic statue of Columbus, two figures of ancient and modern American inhabitants, the shaft which forms the background of the statue, the globe and two eagles which surmount the shaft, the caravel on which the statue stands and its allegorical figure-head, the two lions which decorate the ends of the semi-circular fountain which provides a setting for the statue, and the superstructure of the fountain basin.

The memorial will adorn the plaza in front of the union station, at the head of a short vista looking from the Capitol. It was designed by Lorado Taft, of Ohio, a cousin of President Taft. He won in a competition in which American and European sculptors participated. The cost of the memorial will be \$70,000.

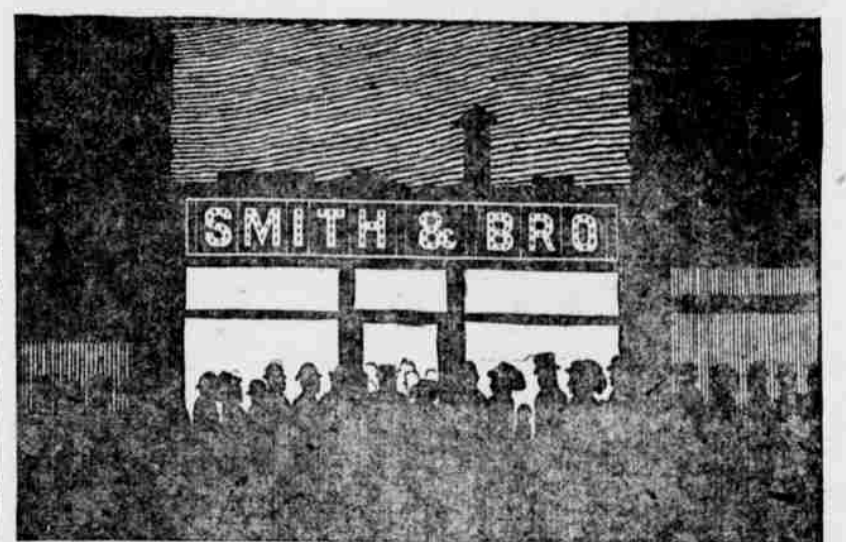

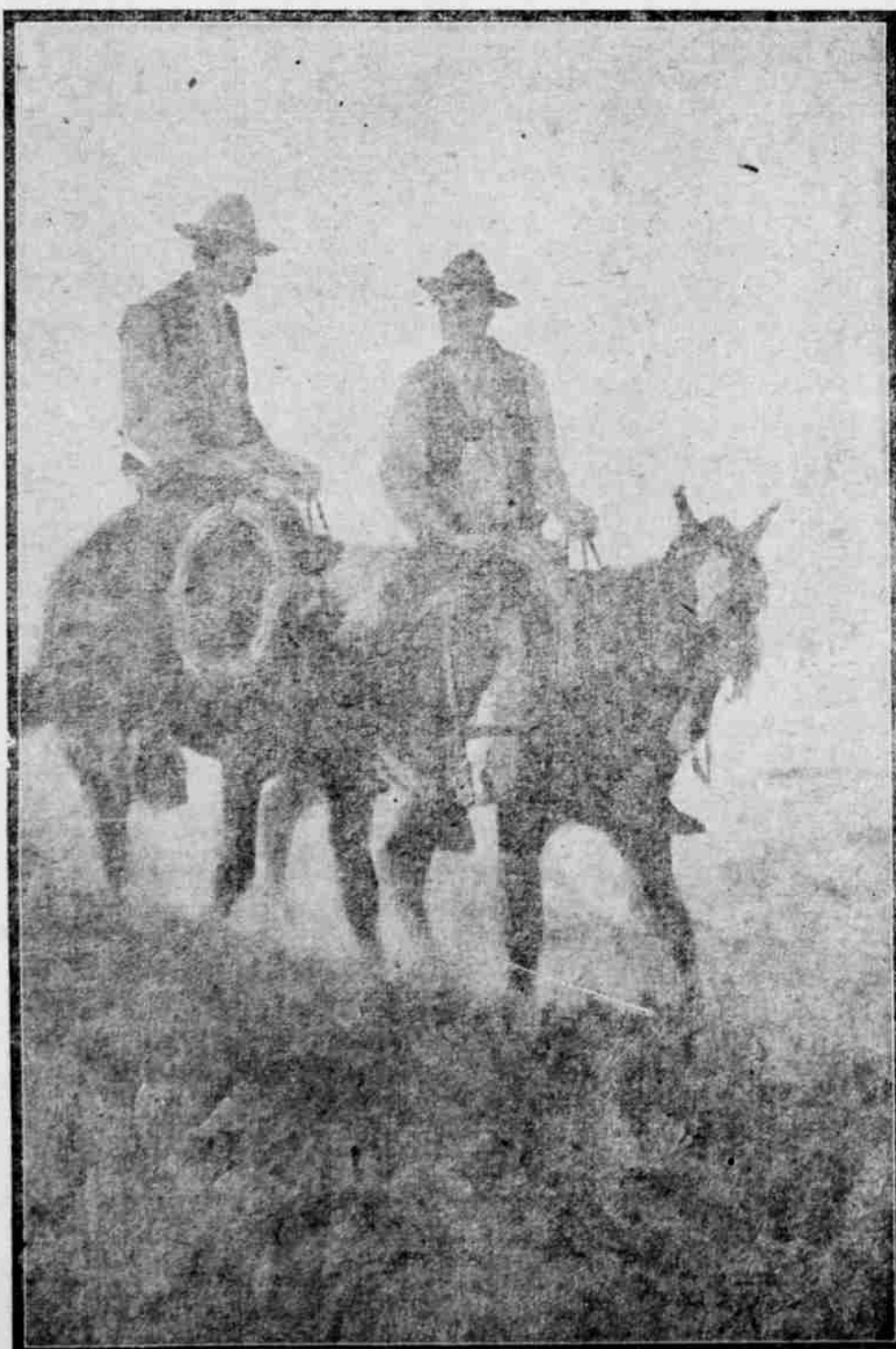
