HOGS AGAIN LOSE AT NORTH PORTLAND

BUYERS SHOWING MUCH MORE DISCRIMINATION

Cattle Market Shows Weakness and Price Takes Tumble—Sheep Hold Steady and Trading Is Brisk—Wheat Declines and Regains Loss.

(From Wednesday's Journal.) While there is a fair tone in the sheep trade, hogs and cattle are weaker and lower. The swine trade is suffering from the recent sharp decline in middle west and eastern quotations. At North Portland this morning toppers sold at \$8.15, or a decline of 10c from the high level of yesterday.

As the market drops, buyers are showing much more discrimination than ever before. Toppers must be the real stuff or there is an instant shading of the quotations. Heavy stuff has been selling at a wider discount from light stuff than ever before.

The hogs that sold at \$8.15 this morning in the local yards averaged from 145 to 203 pounds.

The run for the day was 303 head, and all from local points. The decrease in local offerings recently has caused buyers to go slow in their purchases.

Other Hog Markets Lose.

The local market was not the only one to show a loss for swine today. At Omaha there was a drop of 5 to 10c from yesterday's price which put quotations for tops down to 47. This means \$8.10 to land here, therefore even at the decline the local market is still 5c above the bids that Missouri river hogs can be landed here or at other Pacific northwest points, freight paid.

Big Run Montana Cattle.

There was a heavy run of Montana cattle in the local yards today, a total of 18 loads coming from there this morning.

The cattle market in general is weaker and sales are being made at about 15c lower than the latter part of last week. The sale of one lot yesterday at \$5.55 for steers was not an open market transaction, as the stock had been contracted by a local meat company prior to shipment. According to the seller, the same stuff would not have brought more than \$5.50 in the open market.

The lot of steers that came from Montana was of extra good quality and was sold at \$5.50 this morning. The animals averaged 1149 pounds.

At South Omaha there was a steady to weaker tone in the cattle trade with top steers at \$7.55 and the best cows and heifers at \$5.55.

Sheep Holding Steady.

While the wants of killers are quite well supplied in the sheep and lamb trade, the market is holding rather steady and practically the same quotations as in effect yesterday were continued this morning. Run of sheep and lambs for the day was 588 head compared with 248 yesterday and none last Wednesday.

Notwithstanding the weakness in the sheep trade here there has been practically no improvement over the figures at middle west or eastern centers. At South Omaha this morning the market was steady to slow with lambs \$4.90@5.25, yearlings \$3.75@4.15; wethers \$3.50@3.75, and ewes \$3.00@3.35.

NATIVES KILL MISSIONARY.

The Rev. E. O. Davis Meets His Death on Duty in Guiana.

Georgetown, British Guiana.—The Rev. E. O. Davis, superintendent of the Guiana mission of the Seventh Day Adventist denomination, at the headquarters of which are at Washington, D. C., has been murdered while proselytizing among the natives.

Washington.—A cablegram received at the headquarters of the Seventh Day Adventists here says the Rev. E. O. Davis, superintendent of the British Guiana mission, was murdered during the month of July. The message which was from the Rev. E. C. Roger of California, who had been sent to succeed Mr. Davis, contained no details.

Early in May Mr. Davis wrote that he received a call to visit some Indians about a two months' journey up the Demerara river, where no white man had ever been. This was the last heard from him. Mr. Davis was about thirty-two years of age and married, his wife accompanying him.
