The crowd attested the popularity of Manager Baker's playhouse, as the weather was somewhat chilly.

"A nifty song show" is what the press agent terms the offering of last

night at the Baker. No one who was present will dispute the allegation. The pot-pourri, hodge podge, or whatever else you choose to call it, certainly pleased the audience immensely. There were encores by the dozen.

Max Bloom, who is headlined on the bill, appeared in the part of a Hebrew peddler of clothes and livestock. LIVES 40 YEARS IN AN HOUR.

Warden Takes Prisoners in Auto to See World's Progress.

Indianapolis.—E. J. Fogarty, warden of the state prison, relates a story of an automobile ride of ten miles he recently gave four inmates of the prison whose aggregate terms of imprisonment thus far have been 195 years.

One had served forty years, one thirty-five years, one seventeen years and one thirteen years. All are "lifers."

The ride was from Michigan City to Laporte, where two of the prisoners saw for the first time trolley cars, automobiles and many other evidences of modern achievements hidden from them by the prison walls. So great was the surprise to the prisoners, the warden said, that two of them utterly collapsed from nervous excitement.

FORCE GIRLS TO DO DANCE.

Hoodlums Kidnap Pretty Maids and Compel Oriental Steps in Rain.

Pittsburg.—With revolvers pointed at their heads, Misses Bessie Henderson, Helen Hanley and Dorothy Wilson, handsome young women of this city, charge they were compelled to do an oriental dance at midnight and on a lonely road, while a high piercing wind whipped rain into their faces and through their filmy summer gowns.

This amazing performance was the culmination of a wild automobile escapade in which the young women assert they literally were kidnapped by Joseph Wright and Joseph Goldman, young bloods, and taken into the country forcibly against their will.

The victims related the story to Magistrate Saam and he sent Goldman and Wright to jail for thirty days.
