"I think that all of us should join to preserve and develop the Round-Up. It will be one of the most eloquent tributes to our appreciation of what pioneer fathers have done in the West, because it depicts the open range and hardy life.

"If you want a real thrill, go out there next year and see one of those Eastern Oregon bronchos bolt across the arena, giving his back a catapult motion, which taxes the supreme energy and skill of a daring bucaroo. Then watch the boys tackle a steer, single-handed. Study the skill displayed in putting a riata onto a wild beast, bring him to the ground and tie him securely within a few moments. Buffalo Vernon did it in 45 seconds, establishing the world's record. And then see the Indians from the reservation at their weird stunts. If you do not get the Western fever in your system, you are immune from everything of an exciting nature.

"I hope Portland will co-operate with the people of Pendleton in making this Round-Up a great annual event, as permanent as the vanishing West of olden times can be."
