NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

Peacock Mill Buying Grain.
 Milton, Ore.—The Peacock mill, through their agent at Blue Mountain station, has already received 18,000 sacks of grain, principally barley, and it will take three weeks longer to haul the grain from that section.

Injured by Runaway Team.
 Milton, Ore.—J. B. Louman, while driving a team along the river road, was injured. The horse became frightened and ran away, throwing the man from the high seat to the ground. He was picked up unconscious. Although sustaining several severe injuries he will recover.

Fifth Horse Kills Him.
 St. John, Wash.—John Velores, a Greek, employed on the ranch of Moody Jordan, was kicked by a horse in the abdomen and killed. This is the fifth serious accident that had happened to Velores in five years, the last one being at Malden on the 4th of July, all caused by horses.

Bad Checks Bane of Howard.
 Pasco, Wash.—Deputy Sheriff Hilbert of North Yakima has returned, accompanied by John Howard, wanted there for passing bad checks. Howard was just getting off a train when Chief of Police T. V. Davis accosted him with "Hello Howard, when did you get here from North Yakima?" Howard evidently took him for an acquaintance, and they chatted until they had reached the police station,

when the chief informed Howard who he was and why he was wanted. Howard admitted passing the checks.

Gordon Found Guilty at Baker.
 Baker, Ore.—D. H. Gordon, charged with complicity in the attempted robbery of the Frank O. Anderson home near Haines, August 5, was found guilty by the jury in the circuit court here after the jury had been out 20 minutes. Gordon defended himself and spurned the offer of the court to appoint an attorney.

Injury to Grain Slight.
 Weston, Ore.—Reports from the mountain district say that the damage to the grain crop from the rains was not so heavy as feared. Threshing is again in progress and the stacks are found to have shed most of the moisture. Some of the barley will be off grade.

Baker Fair Attracts Many.
 Baker, Ore.—The Baker county fair opened and indications are that it will be the most successful county fair ever held here. The pavilion is full of agricultural exhibits and extra stalls have been found necessary for race entries. More than 60 horses are entered and it is believed 75 will be entered before the event is over.

Tries to Kill Self With Nails.
 Murray, Idaho.—James O'Neill, a miner, said to come from Butte, Montana, was brought here from the Blackhorse mine, where he was going to work. He appeared demented and was put in jail. During the day he attempted to tear the building down. Falling in this, he attempted to commit suicide by tearing and cutting his wrists with tin nails. He was placed under guard in the Mur-

ray hospital, and will be taken to the Wallace county hospital.

Tramps Shoot Brakeman.
 Cheney, Wash.—Three tramps, who had broken into a boxcar on the S. P. & S., stealing merchandise, were taken by surprise by the brakeman, six miles beyond South Cheney. They pounded the brakeman over the head with a club, cutting several gashes in his head and then shooting at him at close range. He was not seriously hurt. The tramps got away.

White, president of the Standard Paper company and containing F. L. Hale, E. Walker Foster and F. A. Rice, all prominent Tacoma men, and E. J. Wyman of North Yakima. Before the auto could be stopped young Van Horn was crushed beneath the wheels.

MYSTIC ORDER TO ENROLL PRESIDENT.

Spokane, Wash.—President Taft will be made a member of the Mystic Order of Enakops "on sight," on arrival in this city the evening of October 7, according to a proclamation issued by officers of the organization which has 3112 members. The ceremonies will be performed by W. S. McRea, imperial kopsane; ex-Mayor Herbert Moore, mysterious senkops, and Dr. H. W. Allen, high pesanke. John F. Meagher, high keopo, will invest the president with the insignia. The Enakops order is an auxiliary of the National apple show, which will have its fourth annual competitive exposition in Spokane November 23 to 30, and it has charge of the street parades, harvest festivals and Mardi Gras during the week. It has a fund of \$20,000 for this year's celebrations and, according to the by-laws, every dollar must be expended before the morning of November 20. Twenty thousand dollars also will be awarded in prizes and premiums at the show, at which more than 2,000,000 specimens of the commercial apples from the United States and Canada will be on exhibition.
