Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., Oct. 6.—The first football game of the season at O. A. Six other games have been given dates thus far, those on the home field being with Pacific University, Oct. 14; Washington State College, Nov. 11; and Willamette, Nov. 18. In Portland the Beavers play the Multnomah Club Oct. 28; Washington University at Seattle Nov. 4; and Whitman at Walla Walla Nov. 30.
