NEW COMET IS DISCOVERED.

Harvard Professor Is Notified by Cambridge of Heavenly Visitor.

Cambridge Mass.—A comet has been discovered by Professor Quinlan of Javelly, according to a cablegram received from Kiel observatory by Professor Edward C. Pickering of Harvard University. The comet was first seen by Quinlan on September 23d, in right ascension, 14 hours 24 minutes and 46 seconds and declination plus 75 degrees and four minutes. The daily motion is 3 degrees southwest and the comet can be seen through an opera glass.

Devine Doffs His Moleskins.

Dude Devine, the Pendleton boy who has been performing notably on the University of Washington football field during the early season, has doffed his moleskins and will not play any more this year, according to stories in Seattle papers. The Times declares that the mysterious Coach Devine had suddenly relegated his freshman punter to the ranks of the substitutes while the Post-Intelligencer states that Devine has been compelled to quit football by a stiff course of studies.

SCRUBWOMAN LOOTS STORE.

Takes Goods Valued at \$1000; Says Companions Pilfer While on Knees.

Seward, Alaska.—"Steal while you scrub" is declared to be the motto of more than a hundred scrubwomen employed in down town office and store buildings, by Mrs. Sarah Besind, who is accused by the police of having stolen a fortune when on her knees. From information obtained from her the police are making an investigation which they believe will uncover the theft of thousands of dollars worth of goods from stores and offices.

Mrs. Besind, who is 40 years of age, was employed as scrubwoman in the Colonial Arcade and other downtown buildings. Watches and jewelry to the value of \$118 had disappeared from a jewelry company in the building and Detectives Sammon and Sadler traced the goods to Mrs. Besind's home. There they arrested her and recovered property valued at more than \$1000. The police say all of this was taken from stores and offices. Perfumery, manure sets, small jewelry, clothing, dolls and even phonograph records were numbered among the articles recovered.

According to the story told the police by Mrs. Besind, she took the goods while she was on her knees scrubbing, and never reached higher than her head for anything, as she was afraid of attracting the attention of the watchman. She declared that hundreds of scrubwomen in Cleveland used the same tactics in stealing, and that it was impossible to detect them while they are pilfering on their knees.

WEALTH NOT FOR SINGERS.

Multi-millionaire's Will Makes No Mention of Wife and Children.

New York.—John A. Singer, son of Isaac Singer, the millionaire inventor of the Singer sewing machine, and himself a multi-millionaire manufacturer, carried to his grave the enmity that he felt toward members of his family.

Singer died a week ago and left a will in which he did not mention the name of his wife or his son and daughter. The children are said to be living in Chicago.

Singer was 76 years old. He executed his last will a month prior to his death and in it left to Mrs. Charlotte J. Donnelly, his housekeeper, possession of the house in which Singer died and ownership of 250 shares of stock in the Singer Sewing Machine company.

William P. Archer, a nephew, is given 250 shares of the valuable company stock and the bulk of the estate. Another nephew, Joseph S. Archer, is also named as legatee of 250 shares of stock in the Singer Sewing Machine company.

Ten years ago the elder Singer left his palatial mansion at York, Pa., and advertised in a York paper that he would not be responsible thereafter for the obligations of Adelaide V. Singer, his wife.

Word "Obey" Is Left Out.

Boston.—Members of the Boston Suffragette organization have declared in favor of a new marriage service, as drawn up by Miss Alice Stone Blackwell, leading exponent of votes for women in this city. The service is as follows:

"I take thee to be my wedded husband to have and to hold, etc., in sickness and in health, to love, honor and cherish, till death do us part.

"I promise to aid and assist my husband (or wife) in every way and to help him (or her) to uphold his (or her) political views and I agree to settle all marital difficulties out of court."

Honor Washington's Memory.

Washington.—In memory of George Washington, for 22 years warden and vestryman at Falls church, a marble tablet will be unveiled upon the outer wall of the Colonial Falls church edifice today by the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Washington was more deeply interested in the Falls church, although he was often in attendance at Christ Church in Alexandria.
