### HARD ON SUFFRAGETTES

Wife of Gen. Edwards Raps Women Who Would Vote.  
Washington, D. C.—"The suffrage cause is a fad and an unwomanly one; women do not have to vote, don't need to vote, and don't want to vote," according to Mrs. Clarence R. Edwards, wife of General Edwards of the bureau of insular affairs, close friend and frequent golf opponent of President Taft. Mrs. Edwards has just returned from a trip around the world, which confirmed her in the belief that the American woman is the most efficient and progressive in the world. Reminded that President Taft has recently expressed his approval of the cause of votes for women, Mrs. Edwards said:

"I think that women politicians are disgusting, especially the suffragettes. Women ought to learn vocations, but not professions. Personally, I would never care for the services of a woman lawyer or doctor. But there are many vocations to which women are better suited than men, and for her work in those she should receive the same salary.

"Better far go earnestly to work than enter into an unhappy marriage and later mistake oneself to the divorce court. It is neither desirable nor prudent for a woman to marry for the sake of a home or for the protection of a husband.

"Good health and an occupation are the two things in life worth while. Every woman should have some work or vocation, if only to keep her out of mischief. I believe that the society women who have taken up the suffrage fad have done so because they are bored. They soon tire of it and leave the disagreeable aftermath to their deluded sisters. I don't believe in women being conspicuous, and that's why I dislike suffragettes. They are certainly that.

"Marriage is the natural sphere of women—not commercial life. Every woman should marry if she can and if she wants to, but she should be so independent that she is not compelled to."

### CALIFORNIA WOMAN HUNTS AFRICAN LIONS

Mrs. Stewart White, With Novelist Husband, Sought to Capture Python.  
New York.—Stewart Edward White, the author and Mrs. White of Santa Barbara, Cal., returned on the steamer Cadric from a lion hunting expedition in British East Africa.

During the eight months they tracked the king of the forest Mr. and Mrs. White were in danger of losing their lives on twenty-one different occasions.

"My wife does not shoot, but she was interested in the hunt and wanted very much to capture a python," said White. "She did not succeed, but I killed ten lions, four leopards and have brought back with me the heads of a hundred antelopes, elk, deer and other horned animals.

"The variety of the game in the Mombassa country is inconceivable. On one occasion we watched a string of game four miles long going down a hillside to water. But I hunted lions mostly, and just before we left the country I shot what I believe is the largest lion ever killed.

"He measures 11 feet 6 inches in length and stands 2 feet 9 inches in height. I tracked him for five miles and finally killed him 200 yards from the railroad on the Kapita Plains, near Nairobi.

### ONE MAN ROLLED SHIP OVER.

Sailor Threw Big British Tramp Steamship on Beam Ends.  
Tacoma, Wash.—While the basic cause of the accident to the British steamship Damara, which rolled over on her beam ends recently, cannot be ascertained without a survey, the mishap was precipitated by a Chinese sailor, according to Old Town stevedores.

The big freight carrier was evidently trembling on the verge of rolling over when the Chinaman hoove in sight. He was returning to the ship. As he jumped on the gang plank to go aboard his weight proved the last straw that broke the camel's back. The liner rolled over on her starboard side, the one next to dock, spilling

nearly 700,000 feet of lumber into the bay, righted herself, rolled over to port and then swung back to starboard, retaining a list of twelve degrees.

### IMAGE OF A GOD UNEARTHED.

Queer Marks Believed to Be Writings of Forgotten Race.  
Preston, Kan.—What is believed to be the image of the god of a prehistoric race was unearthed here by Frank Kelly, a contractor.

It was in a formation of very hard yellow clay, seventeen feet deep. The figure is made of material resembling plaster of paris, though it is much harder.

The supposed idol shows the head and bust of a man and on the front and back are queer marks that may be the writings of a forgotten race. The find will be sent to the state university.
