HUNTER CUT TO RIBBONS BUT FINISHES BRUIN Pours Shot After Shot Into Rushing Bruin Until Gun Is Empty, When Animal Strikes Opponent Down—Saved by Two Small Pups.

Cottage Grove, Or., Oct. 21.—Lee Whitmore, a prospector in the Bohemia mining district, was dangerously injured in a fight with a bear in the mountains and was brought to this city where physicians dressed his injuries. Over 40 cuts were sewed up and dressed in the man's body.
