HERMISTON WILL HAVE NEW PARK

CITY TO FILE ON TWENTY ACRES OF PROJECT LAND

Acting Director of Reclamation Service Cuts Petition in Twain and City Accepts Smaller Parcel of Land for Recreation Spot.

(Special Correspondence.) Hermiston, Ore., Oct. 25.—In reply to a letter in which this city made application to the reclamation service to make entry to the NE 1-4 of the NW 1-4 of section 10, Township 4 N., R. 25 E., W. 3 M., which is located near the city and desired by the city for park purposes...

The October report of the Reclamation Herald states as follows in regard to the Umatilla government project: "Weather conditions were favorable throughout the month. The maximum temperature being 94 degrees and the minimum being 29 degrees. Delivery of water was carried on until the middle of the month without difficulty, when the water was turned out in order to begin the cement lining of the distributaries. At the close of the month the available storage in the reservoir was 14,000 acre feet. Four thousand acre feet of water were turned out of the reservoir to the distributaries during the month and 345 acre feet of water was diverted from the river through the Maxwell canal. Water right applications have been received for 13,200 acres of land. Three crews were employed on placing lining in the distributaries and another crew was engaged in cleaning out ditches and truing up and seeding the banks of the ditches. Office studies and computations for the west extension were carried on. Test pit and diamond drill work at the site of the proposed dam was completed. Mrs. Silbaugh, the temperance lecturer from Seattle, spoke to a large number of people here last evening, under the auspices of the Young Ladies Temperance League at the M. E. church. The Maxwell Land and Irrigation company have received from Portland several books of fine pictures of the project. These will be used by the salesmen of this company and are the best that have been taken of the products of the project. Mr. Otto Heim made water application today, as attorney in fact for the Terre Haute Orchard company and the German American Fruit company, for land in Section 29, T. 5 N., R. 29 E., W. 3 M., purchased recently of the Maxwell Land and Irrigation company through its salesman, Mr. C. L. Morgan. Mr. Robert Fletcher was a visitor on the project today, in the interest of the East Oregonian. While here he spent the early morning hunting ducks. Mr. Watson of the Western Land and Irrigation company of Hermiston, spent yesterday at Echo on business. Dr. Waldo Coe is a visitor here. He will stay a few days in the interest of the Orchard company, of which he is president. Clifford L. Morgan spent the day at Hermiston from Pendleton yesterday. He will start back east in the near future in the interest of his company. John Bedale, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Bedale of Hermiston, arrived here a few days ago and will make this his home in the future. Thomas Loyd has purchased 15.25 acres of land of the Anthony Wayne Fruit company, this land being in Section 4, T. 4 N., R. 29 E., W. 3 M. J. H. Redd went to The Dalles this morning on the local. He has 29 acres of timber land close to that place.

CRITIC OF CHURCH IN HORNET'S NEST

Spokane, Wash., Oct. 25.—David C. Coates, commissioner of public works in Spokane, might as well have pounced upon a cluster of hornets' nests as to attack the Christian religion in its present-day practices of the profit system, which he discussed at a meeting of working men at Carpenters' hall. The replies of the preachers, headed by the Very Rev. William C. Hicks, dean of All Saints' Episcopal church, are full of barbs and the end is not in sight.

Mr. Coates, who was at one time lieutenant-governor of Colorado, declared in his address that the church itself was the chief stumbling block to a Christian life. He charged the church with responsibility for social and economic environment of the day, which, he said, kept men and women from leading Christian lives. He also flatly accused organized Christianity of being mercenary in its attitude, saying it supports the profit system because this means money.

"If all the money in the world, multiplied a million times, were spent and all the pastors should preach without ceasing it would not alter conditions," he asserted. "The modern church, so-called, is dead. It has nothing to offer the man who works with brain and brawn, and still the preachers ask why thinking men do not attend church. The church denounces the saloon, but it does not make a move to eradicate the system which makes the saloon and other places possible. It harbors the human agents responsible for these evils and places the hand of commendation upon their heads."

Mr. Coates referred to the union revival meetings in Spokane recently, when Gypsy Smith, an English evangelist, conducted the services, adding in closing: "Until justice takes the place of charity, the church will not fulfill its mission, and it will remain a stumbling block in the way of Christian lives."

CHIDES THIEVES IN PRINT.

Tennessee Truck Gardener Vents Anger in Newspaper "Ad."

Jackson, Tenn.—Mark W. Taylor, a hedge and truck grower living in the suburbs of the city, has introduced an innovation in dealing with thieves. Several nights ago Mr. Taylor's pepper patch was visited and a quantity of his cherished green peppers were taken.

Instead of ordering the alleged thief to be put under arrest, Mr. Taylor inserted the following notice in a local paper, which he had written in the language of the Apostles, will no doubt attract the attention of the one to whom it is directed:

"Wanted.—To say to the thief giving unto himself such a hearty welcome in my pepper patch last Sunday and stealing the fruit thereof, to do it no more; for verily, verily, I say unto thee, thou art known to me and Peter, too, who was watching and is now waiting at the gate to make it hot for thee, hotter even than the pepper, when thou shalt meet him face to face over there."

VARNISHED CANDLES AND IRON CHOCOLATES DOOMED

Dr. Wiley Stiffens Backbone of Pennsylvania Crusade Against Impure Confections.

Washington.—As a result of a conference between Dr. Wiley, chief of the bureau of chemistry and dairy and food officials of Pennsylvania, it is probable that the confectionery manufacturers of the Keystone State will be required to change the coating of their Easter goods and also some of their candies.

For some time there has been a sharp conflict between the State authorities and the confectionery trade, but the officials, after their meeting with Dr. Wiley, reached the conclusion that the Pennsylvania rules were even milder than those of the Federal bureau.

The principal contention has been over the material used in the coating of confections. Much of the substance has been condemned by the Pennsylvania authorities as varnish. It is charged also that the coloring in many of the seductive Easter goods is due to iron rather than to chocolate. Two-thirds of this country's production of these goods are made in Pennsylvania.

GOES TO ALTAR IN SPLINTS.

Broken Arm Stop This Wedding? Not Much.

Westfield, N. J.—Although sustaining a broken arm in an automobile upset Monday night, Miss Mabel Willett refused to let this mishap interfere with plans for her marriage to Raymond Edwards. It was the most brilliant social wedding of the year.

"One broken arm, or two broken arms for that matter could not interfere with my wedding plans," said Miss Willett.

She was a member of a gay family party that journeyed to Washington, when the car skidded and upset.

In a dark section of Smith street he was suddenly confronted by a man with a handkerchief over the lower part of his face. The man held a pistol to Valentine's head and demanded his money. Valentine gave up \$75 in cash and the man vanished.

Valentine felt sure he recognized the voice of the man, however, and in the morning he told his suspicions to his friends. They were contemplating police action when about 6 o'clock last evening several young men called Valentine out of his store and engaged him in conversation. When he returned to the store he found the \$75 lying on the counter.

He hasn't yet seen the point of the "joke" though, and threatens trouble for those with the overgrowth sense of humor.

CHILE SEES WAR WITH PERU.

Government Prepares for Attack Said to be Planned by Neighbor.

Valparaiso, Chile, via Galveston.—Numerous rumors are in circulation regarding Peruvian animosity, and it is apparent that the Chilean authorities have reliable information that Peru is secretly planning to attack Chile next summer as soon as the battle ship Dupuy de Lome arrives or the Jeanne d'Arc is purchased from France.

In order to avert such danger Chile is taking active military and naval measures, but it is now found out that the army lacks ammunition, commissariat and modern artillery, while the navy only is in a state of efficiency.

Troops, however, are being concentrated near the Peruvian border to repel the enemy. The press is rejoiced at the government's attitude and wishes that this time Peru's quarrelsome proclivities should be crushed forever.

HARRY THAW'S RELEASE FOUGHT BY GIRL VICTIM

Boston Miss Signs Paper Saying Stanford White's Slayer Beat Her Severely in Paris.

Paris.—If Miss Ruth Lambert of Boston can help it, Harry K. Thaw who killed Stanford White, will not eat his Christmas dinner with his family. Miss Lambert, who has lived in Paris for the last twelve years, is armed with documents which, it is asserted, prove Thaw's insanity.

One of these is a statement put in legal form by Donald Harper, an American lawyer, reciting that Miss Lambert was introduced to Thaw in Maxim's by Count Bond de Castellane and accepted his invitation to drink a glass of champagne in his apartment. She was induced to go there, she says, on Thaw's plea that he wished to show her his flat.

Thaw tied Miss Lambert's hands behind her back, the statement continues, whipped her and poured hot water over her.

By means of sheets and with the help of the concierge Miss Lambert succeeded in making her escape, she says.

A certificate signed by Dr. A. Derconstre describes the serious nature of the girl's wounds and bruises.

The principal witnesses are Harry Rosenfeld of Paris, Eugene Corniche, manager of Maxim's and Miss Maude Lovell of San Francisco.

SOCIETY WOMAN SUES FOR RUDENESS ON A PULLMAN

Atlanta.—Mrs. Mary Burnhiel, prominent in society here, filed suit against the Pullman Car company, asking \$10,000 damages.

Mrs. Burnhiel charges that a Pullman car conductor awoke her and compelled her, wearing a "nightie" and barefooted, to leave her berth and walk to a berth in another car. This in the presence of many male

passengers, who thrust their heads between compartment curtains and stared at her rudely. She alleges the conductor refused to give her time to dress.

And worse—Mrs. Burnhiel declares that the conductor found various articles of adornment which fashion justifies, even demands now, known as "rats," "switches" and "puffs," which she had taken off on retiring. The conductor brought these to her and, on the way, jeeringly exhibited them to the rude male passengers, thus subjecting her to intense shame and mortification.
