HEAVY RUN OF CATTLE AT PORTLAND

PRICES MAINTAIN FIRM DURING DAY

Advances of Ten Cents in Price of Cows—With No Sheep Coming Forward, Market is Steady—Wheat Takes Decided Drop at Chicago.

(From Friday's Journal.) There was a very heavy supply of cattle offered on the North Portland market today but trade was good and prices were firm.

At Chicago there was only a small run in the cattle division but prices continue weak.

At South Omaha cattle were slow and dull with a run of 1400 head for the day.

No Sheep Come Forward. With the absence of additional supplies during the past 24 hours the mutton market is firmer.

At Chicago there was a steady tone in the sheep and lamb trade with no change in prices.

At South Omaha trade in sheep and lambs was steady with a run of 6000 head for the day.

Hog Market Nickel Up. There was an advance of a nickel in the hog market with the sale of one small lot of extra fine stuff at \$7.30.

At Chicago there was a run of 15,000 hogs in the yards today. Market was steady.

At South Omaha there was a lower market for hogs with tops at \$6.25. This means \$7.00 to land at Pacific coast points.

Be it resolved, by the Common Council of the City of Pendleton that it is expedient to improve and it is hereby proposed to improve Main street in the City of Pendleton from the north line of Main street bridge to the south line of Jackson street, by constructing concrete sidewalks along the east side thereof where there are at present no concrete sidewalks, such sidewalks to be constructed according to the charter and ordinances of the City of Pendleton and the plans and specifications therefore prepared by the City Surveyor and filed with the Recorder of the City of Pendleton on the 18th day of October, 1911, and

Be it further resolved, that such plans and specifications so filed be and the same are hereby approved; and

Be it further resolved, that the costs of making such improvement shall be a charge and lien upon the parcels of land especially benefited thereby, proportionately as so benefited, and the owners of such parcels of land so specially benefited shall be liable for the payment of the costs thereof in proportion as they are so specially benefited; and

Be it further resolved, that an assessment district is hereby created, embracing the property to be assessed for the payment of such improvement, which assessment district shall include the property lying and being within the following bounded and described district, to-wit: Commencing at a point on the line between Sections 3 and 10, Township 2 North, Range 32 E. W. M., 58 feet east of the intersection of said section line with a southerly projected east line of Main street, thence south 35 degrees 30 minutes, east 187 feet more or less to the center of the channel of the Umatilla river, thence up the said center of the channel of the Umatilla river to the northerly projected east line of Main street, thence following said northerly projected east line of Main street north 23 degrees 36 minutes, west 140 feet more or less to the said section line; thence continuing in the same direction along the same line 17 1/2 feet, thence south 88 degrees W. 84.7 feet, thence south 35 degrees 30 minutes east 16.9 feet to place of beginning.

Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution, together with a notice that there is on file in the office of the City Recorder the Surveyor's estimate of the proportion of the cost of said work to be charged against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land, be published for a period of ten days in the East Oregonian, which newspaper is hereby designated by the Common Council for the publication thereof.

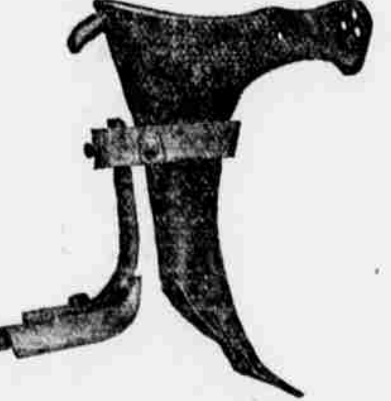
